Bones of Amelia Earhart Believed Found on Saipan

Guam, Nov. 24 (AP)—Skeletal remains of two bodies, possibly those of famed American aviatrix Amelia Earhart and her navigator, Fred Noonan, who disappeared over the Pacific during a round the world flight in 1937, were found recently in a grave on Saipan island, it was disclosed today. The remains, including dental plates and bones discovered in September, were in a box being flown today to the University of California at Berkeley for anthropological study. The box was on a Pan American plane due in Honolulu at 4:00 p.m. EST. Willis Snyder, Pan American district manager at Guam, related that he had been informed of the discovery, but knew nothing about the bones or dental plates. In McHenry, Md., Mrs. Albert Morrison, Amelia's sister said she had been advised of the Guam finding but expressed little confidence that it was that of her sister. To Show Freedom from U.S. Brazil Renews Ties With Soviet Union

Rio de Janeiro, Nov. 24 (AP)—Brazil renewed diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union yesterday in a move apparently intended to demonstrate its freedom from U.S. domination and to court support for the wobbly young government of premier Tancredio Neves. After a 14-year break, Foreign Minister Francisco Santiago Dantas announced the resumption of formal ties with Russia during a tumultuous session of the chamber of deputies in Brasilia. Anti-Communist deputies almost shouted him down. Angry congressmen—some of whom jumped to their feet with boos and shouts of "shame"—condemned the Communist already had a strong enough hold in Brasilia without the presence of Soviet diplomats in Rio de Janeiro and the inland capital. "This government is lighting one candle to God and another to the devil," one deputy shouted. Neves told newsmen that the renewal of relations did not mean that Brasilia, which is 95 percent Roman Catholic—is selling out its democratic Christian ideal. There has been no concession on the part of the Brazilian government, said the chief executive who took office Sept. 8 with the promise that he would follow a foreign policy of "pure tradition." Relations with the Soviet Union have been a hot potato for Brazilian politicians since President Eurico Gaspar Dutra angrily broke with Moscow in 1947 because of Soviet newspaper attacks on him and Brazilian army general. President Juscelino Kubitschek toyed with the idea of restoring relations during his 5-year term that ended last January. He finally decided that Brazil should side formally with the West in the Cold War, but he did set up commercial relations with the Russians. 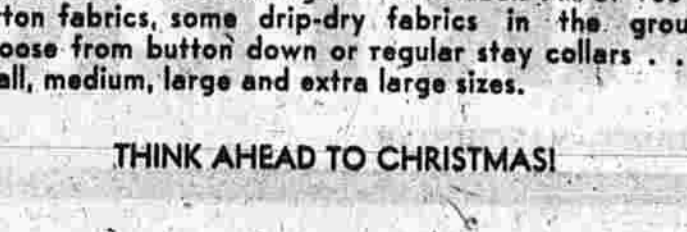

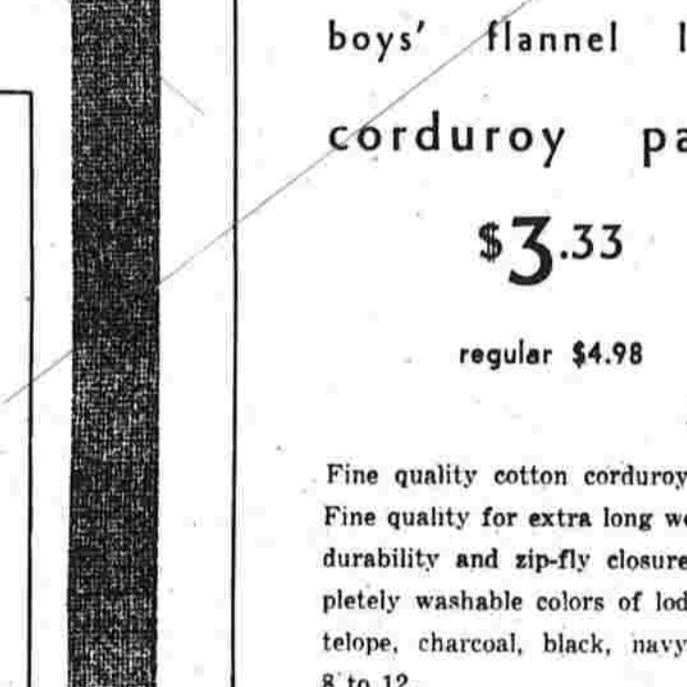

The Doctor Says

Dr. Robert H. Lawson, chairman of the Department of Pediatrics at Miami University's School of Medicine, asks, "Do we physicians have to give some form of treatment to every child brought to us? Should we prescribe a medicine just because the family expects it?"

Answering his own question, he urges restraint under at least the following circumstances: (1) when treatment may prove more harmful than the disorder itself; (2) when failure to treat would result in limited variations from the normal may lead to (unwarranted) insecurity on the part of parents; and (3) when undue emphasis on treatment may exaggerate the problem it is meant to control.

Here are some examples of what Dr. Lawson means:

1. In the second year of life, babies are apt to develop day-day swings in appetite. If vitamins and tonics are prescribed because of the parent's unwarranted concern over a normal variant, treatment may be not only unnecessary but actually harmful.

The child's continuance of the normal variant, regardless of the treatment, may cause anxious parents to lose confidence in their doctor and start on a medical "shopping tour."

2. Certain minor defects and variations in development tend to correct themselves without recourse to needless surgery. Illustrative of these are umbilical hernia, port wine stains, strawberry marks, tongue-tie and flat feet. Some of these may be corrected by the "beneficial" progress of normal growth some time before the first birthday.

3. The common viral infections of respiratory and intestinal tracts are not responsive to treatment with antibiotics. They are self-limited invasions except under unusual circumstances. The excuse that the family demands a "shot" or a "pencil" does not justify the unwarranted use of potentially harmful and costly drugs.

4. So-called "innocent" heart murmurs are frequently encountered in early life. These must be called to the attention of the doctor as matters of fact. Not as threats. If restrictions are placed on the child's activities and/or the family is warned to keep a close watch on the youngster so that he doesn't "overdo," this state of overprotection and anxiety can only be harmful.

What Dr. Lawson is urging is normal concern and intelligent observation. Not neglect. And not a policy of therapeutic nihilism. It is his enlightened view that "the list of good medicines is to practice the art of intelligent, planned neglect."

To do this, the physician should not yield to the pressure to "do something" and advocate treatment when treatment is not necessary. And may even be harmful.

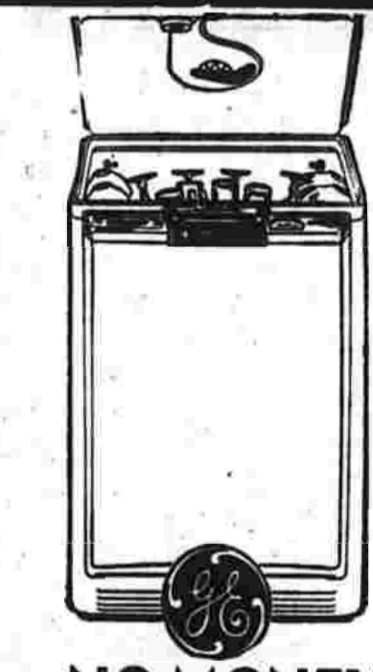

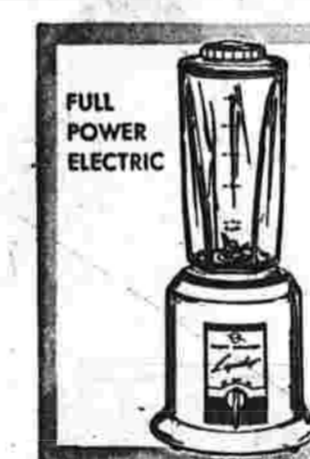

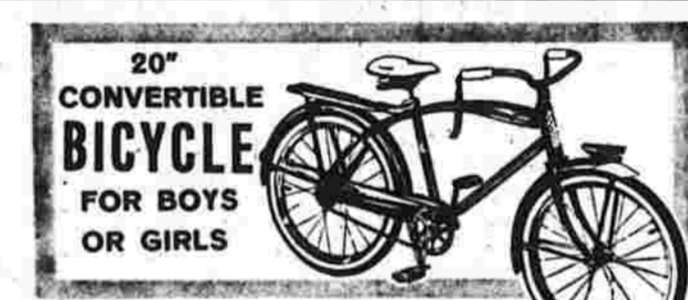

Your Pocketbook

If Moving Van Is Visiting Your Home

Are you thinking of selling your home?

More families are on the move right now than in many a past year, say appraisers in the trucking industry. They cite improved business conditions as the reason.

If you and your family are one of those being transferred or relocating, it is safe to assume your greatest problem might be finding a place to live. However, if you are settled in an area where you have lived and might be interested in switching homes, this could be a good time to put your house on the market, especially if new people are coming into your area.

Favoring both buyers and sellers is the larger supply of somewhat lower cost of mortgage money compared with a year ago. Favoring the seller, especially the one that has lived in his house for at least the past 10 years, is the way land prices in the period have risen—as high as 3,700 per cent in certain locations, according to figures from "Houses and Home," a magazine for builders.

The soaring cost of land, it is pointed out, is the prime reason for the high cost of housing and a major factor in contributing to the slow-down in home sales. Land prices have risen fantastically not simply because of the demands of an exploding population with more money to spend, but because of the talk of scarcity. Housing economists are now predicting, however, that land scarcity won't last forever and that we might well see a trend to lower prices for land.

During the decade of fantastic increases in land prices, the cost of building materials has risen some 24 per cent and building trades wages some 60 per cent. These three factors have pushed the cost of the \$12,000 house up to \$18,000 in just the past five years, says "Houses and Home."

Also pointing up housing costs has been the turnover in sales—people on the move. On housing economist points out that the family that bought a \$20,000 house now will today have to pay close to \$30,000 just to cover the costs of closing which include legal fees, surveying and appraising fees, recording costs and mortgage and title policy fees. While closing costs vary by locality, it is advised that you also consider the time you will spend at home and buying another one.

What is the best way for the family being transferred to find the best location for their needs is a new area?

The first people to consult, the experts advise, are those who work for the same company as you will be working for. Let them advise you on which will be the best location for you. If they are unable to help, let a local bank suggest several good real estate agents. Finally, you might seriously consider renting for at least a year before you buy.

Dad hurries through his meal because there's something on TV he doesn't want to miss. Mom has to hurry through hers in order to get to a PTA meeting. And if there are dinner guests and the meal is to be a leisurely occasion the children are fed ahead of time and sent to their rooms, instead of having dinner with their sisters.

So, perhaps today's young people have been short-changed in the matter of gracious dining. Perhaps, in many homes their table manners have been neglected. If so, maybe what we need is the return of the old-fashioned dinner hour.

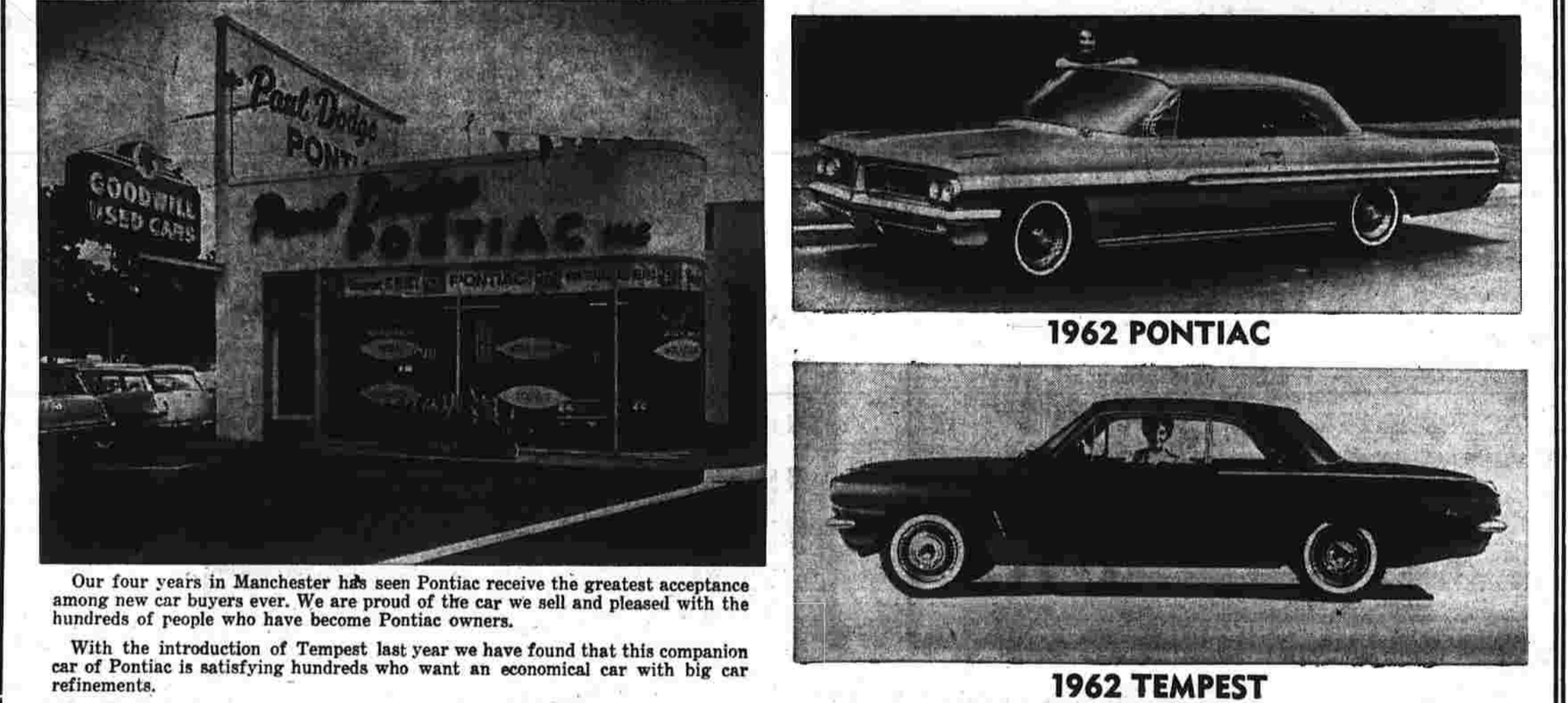


