### Bolton General Fund to Receive All Recreation Unit Revenue

A day was taken at a meeting of the board of finance last night to bring the accounting methods used by the park and recreation department in line with those used by other town departments.

After reviewing a financial report of last year, the board, presented by Park and Recreation Commissioner Fred Gal, the board discussed the fast-growing recreation program.

Gal has now agreed to handle all revenues and disbursements through the general fund of the town. For the remainder of this fiscal year, the board has agreed to reimburse the recreation department for all revenues received previously handled through the general fund.

Gal's accounting for 1960-61 indicates the amount involved last year was approximately \$900.

About 80 Bolton property owners failed to file their tax lists last month and will be penalized the lawful 10 per cent. E. Pierce Harker, clerk of the board of assessors has announced. He could not estimate the total value of the property involved at this time, but said the number of properties is about the same as last year.

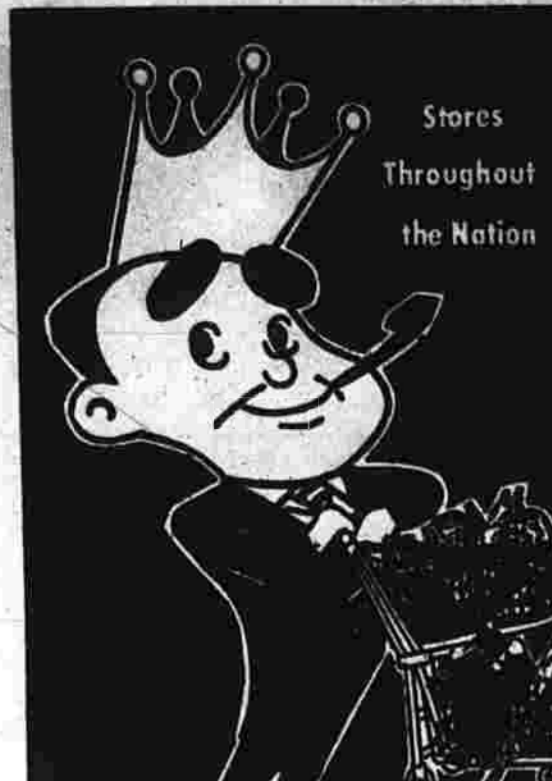

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**The Interview**

President Kennedy, it seems to us, did an extraordinary and persuasive job of presenting an American position in his interview with Khrushchev's journalist son-in-law. And we think the resulting document, published in full inside Russia, without change, in the newspaper which makes it easily available to all Russians, may prove to be the most effective approach, not merely to the Russian people, but to the Russian leadership as well. This country has yet managed in all the cold war years for this interview to be the first time since his own inaugural address. President Kennedy addressed beautifully to the standards of civility, dignity and positive outlook he set up in that address. He never once shouted, or threatened, or used any of the devices by which diplomacy or policy statement can do these things. Yet no analysis of the interview can find a single spot in which he turned soft, or yielded an essential point either of strategy or of principle, or failed to parry, positively and effectively, the smartly-aimed thrusts of his interviewer, who was also, of course, his opponent in this verbal duel between East and West.

In his inaugural, in his Seattle speech a few days ago, and now in this interview, President Kennedy has spoken for the kind of America in which we all believe, and for the kind of leadership which we all desire. He has shown us a policy which can be questioned only by the most extreme fringe of American opinion and which, given such an opportunity to speak to the Russian people, no one could have done better. But we believe the interview, its reasoning, its analysis of present policy situations, and its spirit, should be considered as one of the most important for the American people themselves.

**Restitution?**

When Monday evening, that cold front dispersed with the usual formality of a line of rain and began blowing hard straight at the old moon, making stars alive and shakle, and sleeping the chest of anyone who ventured out to see what was happening to Indian Summer, the inference was that something fundamental and at least semi-permanent was taking place.

When the same wind blew, the next morning, but a little colder, and then the next afternoon, stronger and colder still, our bones began to get the message.

We had had our last reprieve. This dream-like, whimsical fall of ours, so false to itself, so kindly to us, so full of surprise reinventions, so pleasantly illogical, had itself been called to order and to discipline, and forbidden to be unreasonably kind to us any more.

After all, it had done more than any one could expect. It had carried us up to the very brink of the shortest days of the year, until it threatened to trespass on winter itself. The weather it provided was out of harmony with the rising and setting and the slant of the sun. Every moment it was pursued.

We only hope that, when the weather stales from itself, there will be no firm and inescapable law which requires restitution, at the expense of those who have already enjoyed the stolen days.

purchase laws enacted in 1943, 1949 and 1961.

These laws put a floor under the market price of silver by requiring the Treasury to buy any new U.S.-minted silver at 90.5 cents an ounce. The stockpile of free silver was built up during times when the purchase price was artificially high.

The 1961 law also gave the Treasury the power to put a ceiling on the price of silver by allowing sales of free silver to users. The department fixed the selling price at 91.5 cents.

In recent years the Treasury has bought virtually no silver because mine operations could get a better price elsewhere, a step having developed between consumption and production. The Treasury has sold silver steadily, however, because the 91.5 cent ceiling was abnormally low in view of market conditions.

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### Water Aides to Test Flat Fee Against Past 5-Year Costs

The water department is going to prepare a report on how much would have been gained or lost on water and sewer installations in the last five years, if a flat fee had been made to property owners, based on a front-foot basis, instead of varying charges based on the cost of each project.

The board of directors at an informal meeting last night with Fred Thrall, superintendent of the water and sewer department, asked for such a report.

The figure on which the flat fee will be based will be the average front-foot cost of water and sewer installations in the last five years.

This department feels that the average annual front-foot cost would be of much value in the public hearings held for new construction, as well as valuable for property owners in the present reconstruction period.

Thrall said in a written outline of costs.

Facilities such as pump stations and force mains will be treated individually, he said.

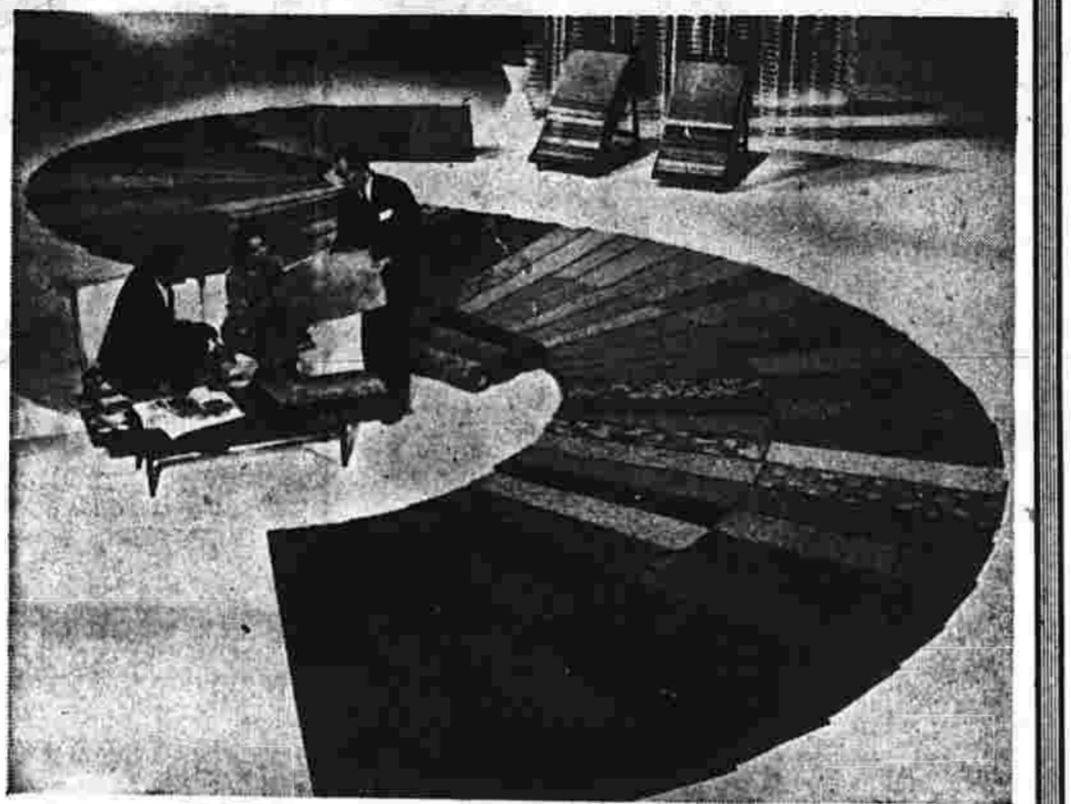

### The Artificial Tree Harvest

Manitowoc, Wis. (NEA)—U.S. Patent No. 2891818 is one of the simplest inventions on file in Washington, but it has cost millions for a firm in this town on the shores of Lake Michigan.

The firm, Aluminex Specialties Co., produces metal Christmas trees. It's a plastic tree made of aluminum.

The firm's product is a cardboard box. You carry it home, open it up, and—whingo—it springs into shape.

How do the traditional "real" tree merchants plan to answer the challenge of the artificial? The answer is simple: they don't.

Max Berg of New York City's Farm and Garden Nursery, feels that the traditionalists have one big point on their side: beauty.

His trees are sold in a number of sizes, from 10 to 12 feet. The 10-foot tree is just looking for an easy way out.

You can't beat a fresh tree for appearance and fragrance. In my humble opinion, the artificial tree is a number one loser.

The wooden center stalk of the tree comes with its own tripod and is merely erected in place in the home. Then the aluminum branches are slipped on and secured. Several hundred, depending on the size of the tree—are placed in holes drilled at various angles in the center stalk.

The secret here is that all branches conveniently are the same length. Thanks to the patented arrangement of the holes, the branches when assembled fit perfectly about the center tree.

Without the patented construction technique the trees might be harder to assemble, and customers could be lost in more ways than one.

Price for a standard six-foot aluminum tree is about \$15.

Said Ronald Minchin, of the company's sales department, "Our sales this year will be up about 28 per cent over last year. And the sales in 1960 was about 28 per cent over '59."

"Older people like a fresh tree—ones that's cut in the forest. But younger families are turning more and more to aluminum trees. They keep them year after year. There's no fanning around with dead needles, and they are trouble-free."

An increasingly larger share of the artificial tree market is being controlled by the plastic industry.

Nicholas Bell, an executive of one young firm in the plastic tree business (B & S Novelty Co., of Stouffville, N.Y.), explained that last Christmas—their first year of business—compared to this year, he sees sales reaching 25,000. His firm makes artificial trees from a plastic fiber called Rovana.

### Santa to Carry Pack Full of New Books

New York (AP)—If you—or some of the people on your gift lists—would like Santa Claus to bring a bright, sumptuous book that will look fine on your shelves or your lap, fear not. The bookstores are crammed with them this fall. The October and November publishing lists are crowded with "gift books," those impressive volumes designed to interest people who are avidly devoted to special subjects.

Art, music, nature, archeology and history, for example. Usually these books range in price up to \$50, are filled with illustrations—both black and white and color—and are very impressive.

Life magazine and its editors are among the publishers of several of the most impressive books. One of the most impressive is "The World's Great Discoveries," a 600-page compendium of maps, pictures, aerial representations and text, published by Rand-McNally. The Golden Press is responsible for "The Life Treasury American Folklore" and "Prentice-Hall has brought out 'The Epic of Man,' a lush volume also by the editors of Life.

A book that combines both art and history is "The Horizon Book of the Renaissance" (Doubleday), the first book to develop out of Horizon magazine with 300 pictures in black and white, 180 in color, and texts by eminent scholars.

A sister publication, American Heritage Book of the Renaissance, 125 of them in color, is also available. For anyone interested in early culture there is "The World's Great Discoveries," with nearly 1,000 illustrations, maps and charts, published by McGraw-Hill. Also "Four Thousand Years Ago," by Geoffrey Bibby, published by Knopf.

Musical lovers should find interest in "Covello's Handbook of World Opera," an encyclopedic type of book edited by conductor Frank Leslie Moore for Crowell, with information on more than 500 operas and 1,000 personalities.

They also might be interested in "The Treasury of Music" (Simon and Schuster). Or in "The Family Music Book" by Grosset and Dunlap, containing more than 300 pieces for voice, piano and organ.

Potterton's also has several encyclopedic works to its credit—"The Larousse Encyclopedia of the Earth," and "The Larousse Encyclopedia of World Geography." "The Larousse Encyclopedia of World Geography" is illustrated. Random House has issued "Continents We Live On," a beautifully illustrated volume by naturalist Ivan Sanderson.

There also is a "Larousse Geographical Encyclopedia" edited by Crown, and published by Viking Press, for chefs and epurated alike. A basic compilation that includes out from the flood of cookbooks and table topics. With 8,000 recipes and 1,000 illustrations as large as an unbridged dictionary.

Nature lovers will find an interest in "The Complete Guide to Garden Flowers," edited by Herbert Asquith, a project of A. S. Barnes, at \$12. It contains 2,000 subjects and 1,000 color photographs. Macmillan has released "Wildflowers," by Homer D. House, which has been out of print since 1944. It has 622 pages and 364 color photographs newly reproduced. And for bird lovers there is "Birds of the World," by Oliver Austin, with 300 paintings in full color by Arthur Singer, published by Golden Press.

At Ford Station, Warrenton, Ore., the Remote Control Jet Bomber Kill. Remotely controlled, it has nothing to do himself. The toys can do it themselves for him.
