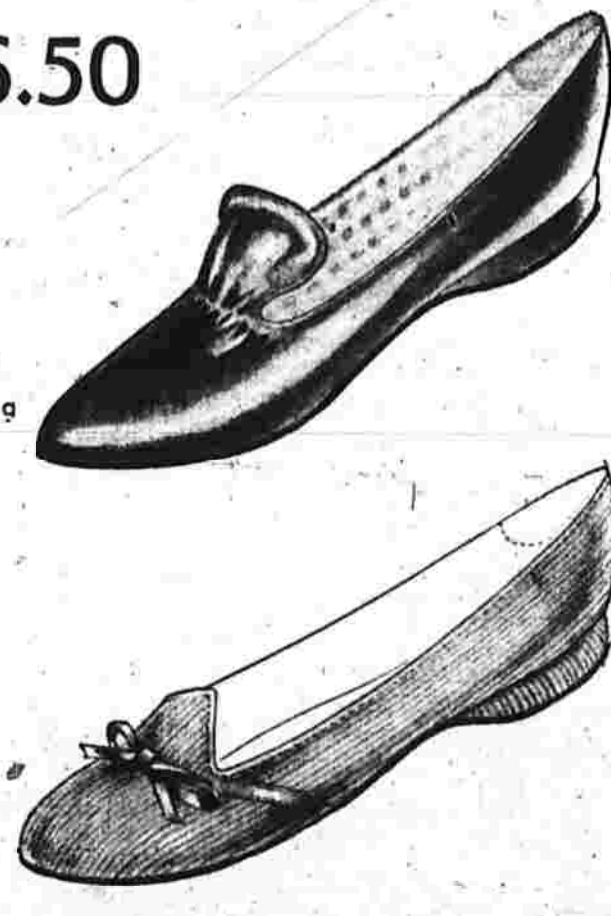

Democrats Will Reconsider Town Committee Distribution

The existence of two vacancies on the Democratic Town Committee, one of which occurred after the last night's meeting, was noted by the committee members when they met last week, contributing to a decision by the committee to reconstitute the whole system of representation from the five districts.

One of the vacancies, caused by the resignation of William A. Vena, was filled by the election of Arnold Clough from District 2.

The other vacancy, caused by the death of William Lang, was left vacant until the next meeting.

Disagreement on the filling of the vacancies was observed because earlier in the meeting Atty. David Barry suggested that the committee vote to suspend the committee members governing the advertising of vacancies before election.

There are five districts. The bylaws call for a minimum of 10 members from each district, thereby providing a guide for what districts 10 of the 50 members shall come from.

There is no bylaw spelling out what districts the remaining 10 committee members shall represent.

Another cause of friction last night was the remaining 10 members of the town committee, who represent one district, have moved away from that district into another district. Since there is no provision for removing a member from the grounds that he no longer represents the district for which he was chosen, some districts have a dearth of members on the town committee and some districts have a plethora.

Districts 2 and 3 have been depleted, while Districts 1 and 5 have been increasingly represented.

Before the election of Arnold Clough last night, the representation of the various districts was as follows:

District 1 — 14.
District 2 — 10.
District 3 — 12.
District 4 — 12.
District 5 — 12.

The disagreement began when Mrs. Janet Bychozki, temporary chairman of District 3, nominated Theodore Brundom from her district for the post made vacant by the resignation of Vena, former chairman of the district.

Henry Becker, chairman of District 2, protested that since his district had only 9 members on the committee, whereas District 3 had 10 members, the post should be filled by someone from his district.

Karp supported Becker, and Mrs. Bychozki withdrew the nomination.

Becker nominated Clough, and the vote making him a member was unanimous.

Chairman Cummings then suggested the committee consider filling the post made vacant by the death of William Lang Monday.

Committee members were reluctant to consider filling the post at first, since the number of members from Districts 2 and 3 was tied at 10.

Becker then said that as long as the committee had seen fit to fill his district's vacancy, he was willing to have District 3 nominate its next member.

Edward Nordin, town clerk, said he was against filling the seat of the vacancy because the notice of the meeting mentioned only one vacancy.

Karp said he would have agreed that the item should be tabled, except that Becker had yielded to District 3, and all the district chairmen were present, plus more than 40 of the 60 committee members.

Atty. David Barry suggested that the committee vote to suspend the committee members governing the advertising of vacancies before election.

Rockville-Vernon Court Ups Prison Term For Rodgers

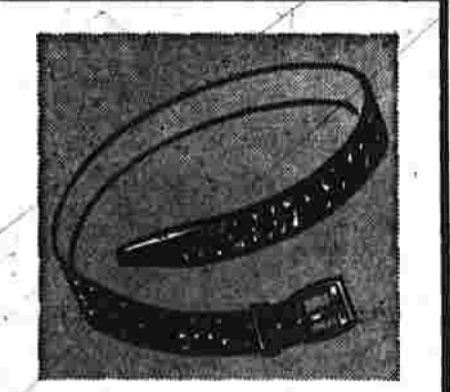

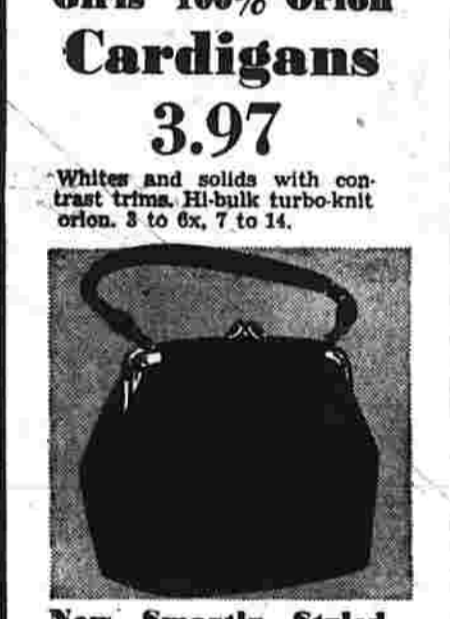

Amended Rule on Bonus Players Seen Passing

Tampa, Fla. (AP)—Despite strong opposition by the Los Angeles and San Francisco National League clubs, the minors were expected to vote favorably today for an amended bonus rule designed to short circuit what minor boss George Trautman has described as "the road to financial suicide."

At least 14 of the 22 existing minor leagues, expelled by the wild spending which cost baseball a reported \$12 million in 1961 in bonus payments to untied youngsters, have indicated they would vote "yes" for a proposal recommended by a committee of major league officials.

- 4. The farmed out player, although he would be on the roster of the club to which he is loaned, would be counted on the parent club's roster.
- 5. A player who is not claimed by waivers would be subject to draft the following year for \$5,000.

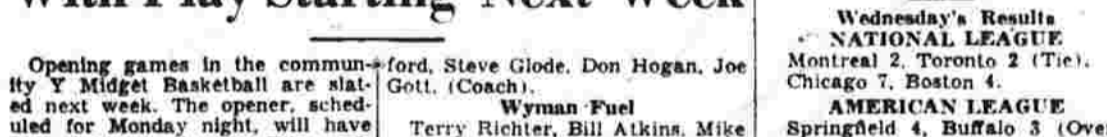
