Judge Denies Demurrer in **Bolton Case**


The demurrer entered by the defense in the suit alleging mishandling of Democratic party funds in an intra-party dispute in Bolton. has been overruled by Judge Searles Dearington of the 12th Circuit Court.

The demurrer was claimed by Atty. Harry Hammer, counsel for Vincent Krzesicki, Democratic town chairman and other town committee members, in action brought by rival party members who won the party caucus, a primary and seated their candidates on the board of education in the town election.

The complaint of the plaintiffs in the suit, heard in the Rockville is the suit, heard in the Rockvine session of the court on Oct. 17. listed misappropriation of \$100 of the party's funds in forcing a pri-mary and asked for return of the

mary and asked for return of the money and an accounting of how the funds were spent. The suit also sought \$350 damages. Hammer contended the suit was factional; and that it was not properly brought in a civil court. Atty. Leo J. Flaherty Jr., rep-resenting the plaintiffs, said if the court could not rule on the case, then the party "could take funds then the party "could take funds to build a verandah or contribute to the Socialist cause." Judge Dearington, in his memo-randum of decision on the demur-

rer, noted the plaintiff's alleged two causes of action and said "The demurrer is not addressed to either or both . . . As it stands the demur rer neither encompasses both caus es of action nor singles out either o them. Since the demurrer is addressed to the complaint as an entirety, the latter survives ..., and he demurrer is overruled.
