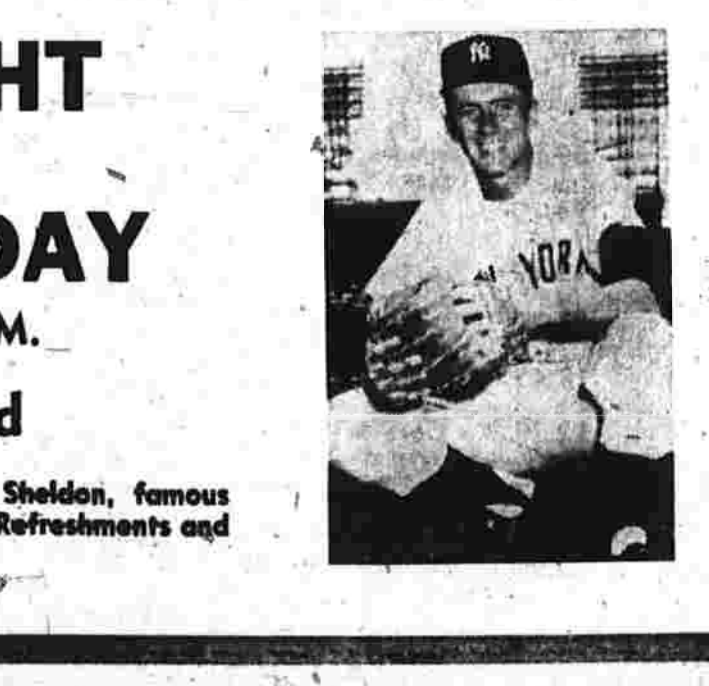

The meeting will begin at 8 o'clock in the hearing room of the Municipal Building.



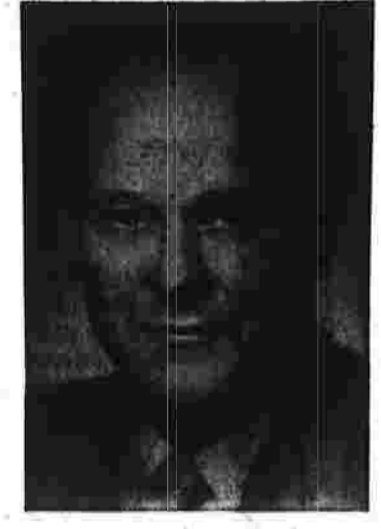

**Judge Denies Demurrer in Bolton Case**

The demurrer entered by the defense in the suit alleging mishandling of Democratic party funds in an intra-party dispute in Bolton, has been overruled by Judge Charles Destrington of the 12th Circuit Court.

The demurrer was claimed by Atty. Harry Hammer, counsel for Vincent Krasnicki, Democratic town chairman and other town committee members. In action brought by rival party members who won the party caucus, a primary and asked their candidates on the board of education in the town election.

The complaint of the plaintiffs in the suit, heard in the Rockville section of the court on Oct. 17, listed misappropriation of \$100 of the party's funds in forcing a primary and asked for return of the money and an accounting of how the funds were spent. The suit also sought \$350 damages.

Hammer contended the suit was frivolous and that it was not properly brought in a civil court. Atty. Leo J. Fitzhery Jr., representing the plaintiffs, said if the court could not rule on the suit, then the party could take funds to build a war chest and contribute to the Socialist cause.

Judge Destrington, in his memorandum of decision on the demurrer, noted the plaintiffs' alleged reasons for action and the demurrer neither encompasses both causes of action nor singles out either of them. Since the demurrer is addressed to the complaint as an entirety, the latter survives, and the demurrer is overruled.

## Nike Zeus Backed by President

Washington, Dec. 2 (AP)—President Kennedy and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara have decided to ask Congress for money to start tooling up for production of the Nike Zeus antimissile missile.

Information sources said today that McNamara agreed on this at their conference in Hyannis Port, Mass., last week. They conferred on the new military budget to be submitted to Congress next month.

It was understood a recent string of test successes influenced the decision. It represents a victory for the Army in its long battle to get the missile killing system into production.

The Kennedy administration, and the Eisenhower administration before it, had refused to allow even a start on limited production of the controversial antimissile system pending additional tests.

Earlier this year, McNamara told Congress there was wide spread doubt as to whether the Nike Zeus system should ever be deployed.

Now, it has been learned, Kennedy and McNamara decided there is enough evidence of limited success to go ahead with limited production of long lead time items for the system.

A factor in the limited effort to develop an antimissile system is the Army's contention that a start of production could cut from four to two years the expected time in which an antimissile defense could be deployed against a limited number of cities.

In the past, there have been estimates that would cost \$4 billion to \$15 billion to provide adequate protection for most major production and population centers and important military bases in the United States.

## Estimate on Neutron Bomb U.S. Sets Date, Time For 5 Kiloton Blast

Washington, Dec. 2 (AP)—Scientists throughout the world are being notified that the United States plans a five kiloton, underground nuclear blast Dec. 10.

The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission set the date and time—8 a.m. EST—yesterday. The AEC said scientists, experts in measuring earthquakes, were notified so they can record and study the resulting shocks.

A countdown for the blast will be broadcast by short wave radio to 120 selected radio stations in the United States.

The explosion will be the first in the Flathead Program to test peaceful uses of nuclear energy.

This initial test, designated the United States' first, will be set off in a 200-foot shaft, 1,200 feet underground, 25 miles southeast of Carlsbad, N.M. It will be equal to 5,000 tons of TNT.

The experiment is designed to produce information on the possibility of recovering useful power from the heat of a nuclear blast, and the feasibility of recovering it.

## Jury Charges American Reds Soviet Agents

Washington, Dec. 2 (AP)—The Communist Party of the United States has been indicted for failing to register as an agent of the Soviet Union. Conviction could mean hundreds of thousands of dollars in fines.

The indictment was returned here yesterday by a federal grand jury at the request of the Justice Department. The 12-count charge accuses the party of failing to register by Nov. 20 as required by the Internal Security Act of 1950. The act was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court earlier this year after a 10-year court battle between the party and the government.

In announcing the action, Attorney Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the party apparently has been beating a hasty underground retreat from America so they could avoid the participation of the indictment.

Future indictments against party officers and party members also are possible. The law requires party officers to register by Nov. 30, which they did not do. Party members are supposed to register by Dec. 20.

If convicted, the Communist Party could be fined \$10,000 for each day of non-registration. Party officials could be fined \$10,000 a day and sentenced to five years in prison for each day. And if party members ignore the law after their deadline, they could be subject to similar fines and prison sentences.

There are believed to be about 10,000 party members in the United States at the present time.

There was no comment from Communist Party leaders.

The Justice Department said Attorney John J. Abt of New York and Joseph Forer of Washington would be served with the indictments. They represented the party during much of its attempt to have the Internal Security Act held unconstitutional.

Abt could not be reached for comment.
