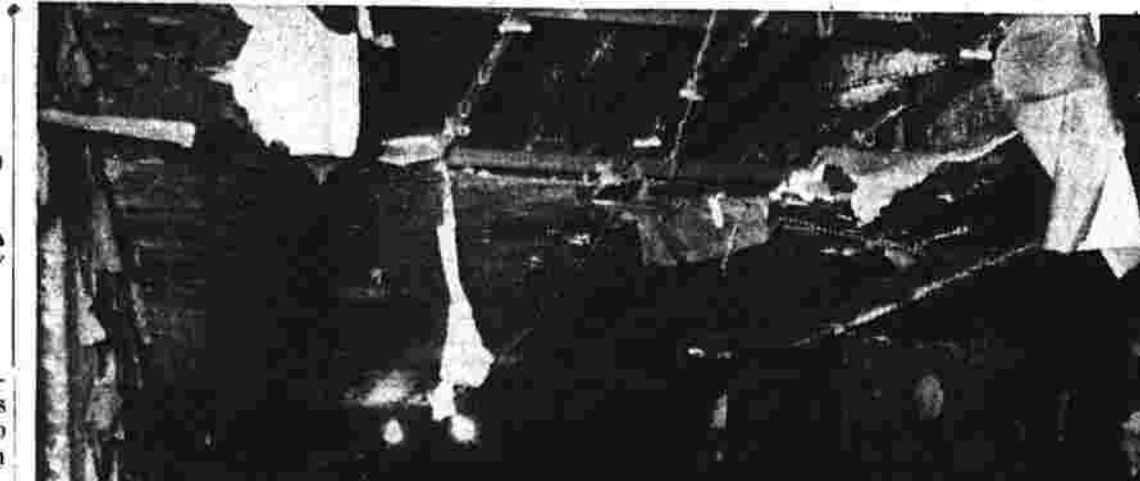

Local Woman, 60, Among 15 Dead as Fire Sweeps Ninth Floor of Hartford Hospital

Trapped with Three Others Calm Visitor Saves Patients from Blaze

By ALEX GIRELLI (Herald Assistant City Editor) In the confusion of the holocaust at Hartford Hospital yesterday, some remained calm. One person who kept her wits about her was Mrs. John Mukiziev, 238 Charter Oak St., who was visiting her father, a patient on the ninth floor, when the fire broke out. She helped protect him and two other patients in the same room from smoke and then assisted in evacuating others from the floor. "I got frightened when I found out that they lost people," Mrs. Mukiziev said. Before that, everyone remained calm, she said. Mrs. Mukiziev was visiting her father, Joseph Ramonka, who was recovering from a stroke. Ramonka, originally scheduled for discharge Wednesday, is one of the many patients sent home last night. He lives at 128 Birch St. When she first saw smoke coming from the ninth floor kitchen, Mrs. Mukiziev closed the door to the room. She stuffed a blanket along the bottom of it. Later, as the smoke got heavier she opened windows and then put a wet face cloth over her father's face. "I began to get a little concerned when smoke came in around the radiator," she said. She pulled down one drap and wet it so that she could use it to smother out a flame if it burst through. She didn't get a chance to use it, however. A few minutes later interns, orderlies and doctors rushed onto the floor and gave instructions to get all patients out. They used wheel chairs, straight chairs, stretchers and any furniture they could grab. Mrs. Mukiziev helped one of the other patients in the room down to the floor below where her daughter, Gloria Trakas, helped Ramonka. Then they assisted other patients being brought down from smoking-lift floors. "When people got to the stairwell it was clear," she said. Putting the anxious moments when they were confined to the ninth floor, she asked rhetorically, "What are you going to do with these patients?" "You can't start pushing them around."

Daun of... Reconciliation

Vatican City, Dec. 9 (AP)—Pope John XXIII today made the most powerful plea of his reign for Christian unity in the modern world. The Pope made his appeal in issuing an encyclical on Pope Leo I, the great Fifth Century pontiff. Appealing for the unity of all Christians, Pope John expressed the hope that the day bringing "the dawn of universal reconciliation" would come soon. Leo, who became a saint of the Roman Catholic church, stood up to Atilia, the Hun, demanding him from attacking Rome. But the great pontiff was especially noted for the fight for church unity at a time when the church faced heresy both in the East and the West and the declining power of the Roman Empire faced the assaults of barbarian hordes. Vatican sources said that the pontiff obviously intended his encyclical on the great Leo as a call to the world's Christian forces and the church together against the threat of atheistic communism today. The encyclical, from its opening words in Latin, is named "Aeterna Dei Sapientia"—The Eternal Wisdom of God. Its issuance in advance of the Roman Catholic church's first ecumenical council in nearly 100 years emphasized Pope John's deep concern with Christian unity, a sub-

Heroes Were Born on 9th Floor

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Young Dr. Norman B. Hedenstedt, a big, strapping man, was very popular at the Hartford Hospital, particularly on the ninth floor where he did much of his work. At 33 he could look back on 16 years of work dedicated to helping the sick and the study of medicine. He got his first hospital job at 17 in Worcester, Mass., where he was born, as an orderly in the Worcester City Hospital. He worked as a lab technician while a student at Holy Cross College. After getting his medical degree from New York University at the Brooklyn Medical Center in 1930, he returned to his home town to intern at City Hospital. He transferred to Hartford Hospital earlier this year to serve as an assistant resident in internal medicine. But he didn't plan to stay away from Worcester for long. He was scheduled to return to City Hospital next July to become chief of medical residents. And he had a wife with him. He married last August. Yesterday, Hedenstedt was performing a post-mortem on the third floor of the hospital when a fire broke out in the hospital. He dropped what he was doing and rushed to the ninth floor, where the fire was raging. This was his ward, this was where his duty called him. He was trying to close the doors at one end of a corridor in the danger area when the smoke and flames engulfed him. He was found dead in the corridor where he had fallen. A 15-year-old boy helped carry away the dead. A 14-year-old girl died in her hospital room. These were the young on the ninth floor of the Hartford Hospital yesterday when flames and smoke snuffed out the lives of 15 persons. The boy, William W. Cumberford, of Ridgewood, N. J., went to work at the hospital as an aide only a week ago. The girl, Diane Page of Hartford, was trying to close the doors at one end of a corridor

Trash Chute Blaze Sets Off Explosion

By PATRICIA PLATT (Herald Staff Writer) A Manchester woman who was a supervisor in the Hartford Hospital housekeeping department died yesterday in the ninth floor fire which killed 15. She was Miss Grace O. Hatch, 60, of 31 Green Rd., an employee of the hospital for 15 years. Miss Hatch was among three hospital personnel and a private duty nurse who perished with six patients and five visitors in flames and smoke on the hospital's ninth floor center.

Hartford Fire Chief Thomas Lee said that the only thing that had been established was that the fire started in the trash chute between the first and third floors. The chute fire touched off an explosion of undetermined source which rocked the floor, blasting billows of thick black smoke through the eighth and ninth floors.

More than 100 persons were trapped in hospital rooms as the fire transformed one cleaning room into a mass of charred debris. Patients broke windows in their rooms, jumping for breath and screaming to gathering crowds of police and ambulance men and fire engines which roared to the three-story blaze. It was a time of horror and heroism. Firefighters fought through smoke and fire as they carried helpless patients to safety down stairs or by a few elevators still working. Nurses remained with their patients to prevent panic, to stoke smoking and approaching flames. They ran through corridors, opening doors shut as they forced by fire to seek refuge in rooms.

Rescuers evacuated all patients from the eighth floor in the 810 million, 15-story hospital. But most of the patients who were trapped on the eighth floor were carried to safety while plasma bottles still were attached to their arms. The chaos of the rescue operation, which may have been an explosion which occurred at about 2:45 to 3:00 p.m. last night and went to Hartford Hospital to confirm identification. Yesterday, a man who speaks so quietly you have to bend down to hear all his words, fought both for his life and for the lives of others. He was in the hospital to reach the ninth floor of Hartford Hospital yesterday. He was carrying a patient to the ninth floor. Both fires were quick and intense, he said. "They were similar because patients died in their beds" in both.

Shortell has been with the Hartford Fire Department 25 years. He took part in fighting the holocaust at the Ringling Brook, Racum and Bailey Circus tent on Barbour St. in 1914, considered the worst in Hartford's history. He shunned its comparison with the hospital fire.

The Niles St. and Hartford Hospital fires are shockingly similar. Fifteen people died yesterday; six patients, five visitors and four employees. Seventeen people died at Niles St., 15 patients and two employees. Both fires came in December. The Niles St. blaze on Christmas eve. Some bodies were burned beyond recognition.

Yesterday, State Police Commissioner Leo J. Maloney began an investigation of the blaze while firemen still sought to bring it under control. In 1945, State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey began an investigation while firemen battled the flames.

Smoke rolled into the bedrooms and corridors of both hospitals on the hospital's ground floor. The fire burst into flames and spread in seconds to the woodwork of the old three-story building. A probe of the city building code was begun after the Niles St. hospital was gutted. Officials proposed a tightening of building regulations.

The new section of Hartford Hospital, where yesterday's fire occurred, was dedicated and opened for use three years later. Perhaps the construction of

There were no injuries and only minor damage to the car the trooper said. Gilbert was alone in the car.

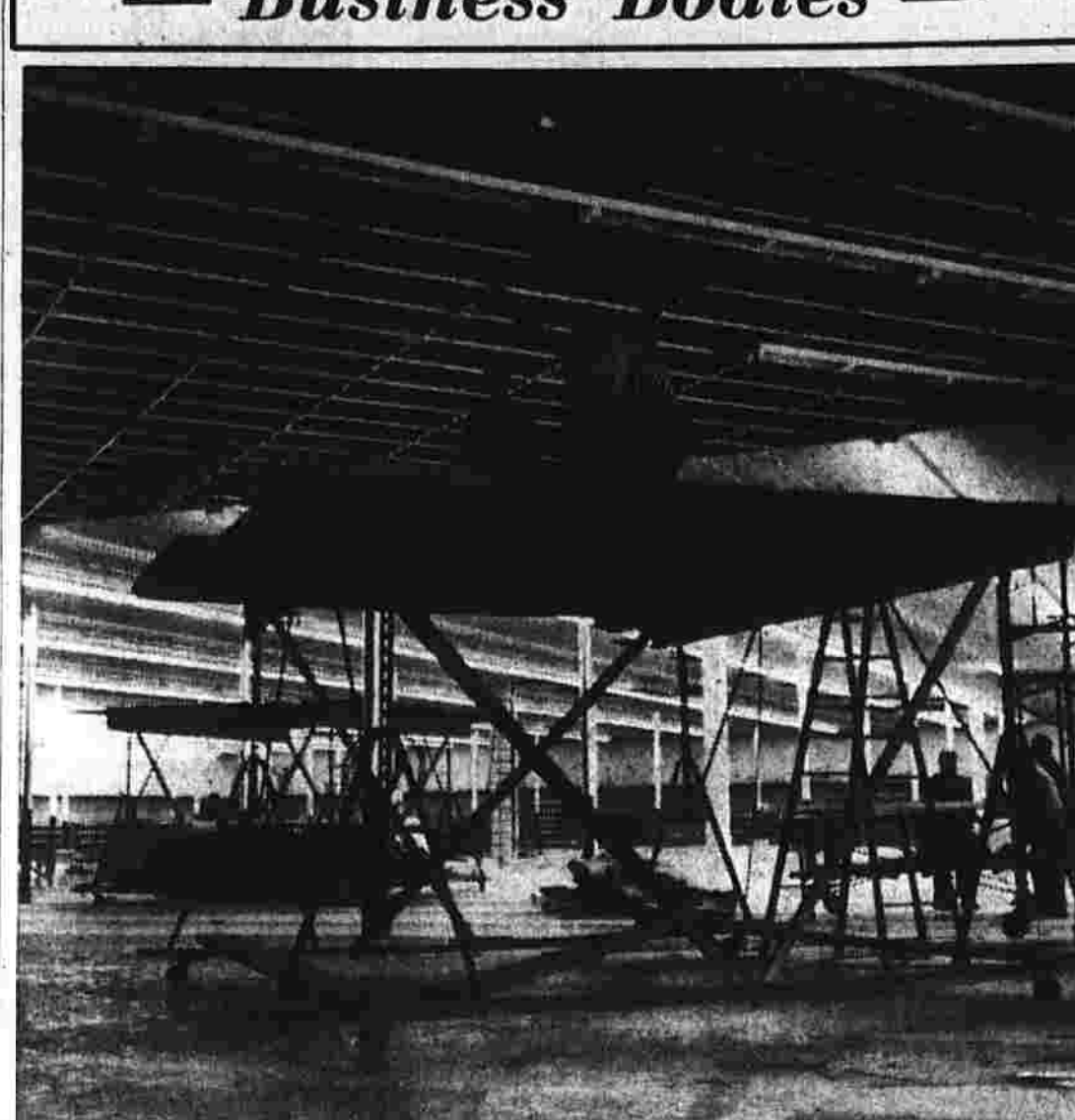

Within a few years, Monique established herself as a top attraction in night clubs. Her throaty voice and obvious allure kept the customers coming in.

"But I still wanted to act," she said. "So I went to Europe."

"If I'm lucky, people will forget what I look like," concluded Monique. "They will think, instead, of what I can do. Then I'll be happy."

When a woman is as consummately beautiful as Monique Van Vooren, it's difficult to forget her looks entirely. But if that's what you want, Monique, we'll try.

TV Notebook

New York—(NEA)—Maybe what television needs is more programs in "the gray area." That's the spot on the entertainment spectrum which Donald Hyatt aims for with his magnificent Project 20 programs on NBC. He calls it "the gray area" for lack of any other term.

"We're between news and public affairs on the one hand," says Hyatt, "and strictly entertainment shows on the other."

The Project 20 programs of the past, and the ones planned for confusion this season in the Show of the Week series, have more entertainment than a purely news-public affairs show and more informative value than a run-of-the-mill entertainment program.

Looking at this problem of nomenclature another way, as Hyatt does, he objects to calling his shows "documentaries." He prefers the term "nonfiction" for such shows as his programs on Lincoln and Will Rogers and the "Laughter U.S.A." program which kicked off the Show of the Week.

"After all," he says, "in the book field, you might call an encyclopedia a documentary, but not Shirer's book, 'The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich.' That's non-fiction, not documentary. It has so much entertainment value along with its information. The word 'documentary' sounds too solemn."

Hyatt raises a good point: Too often, the viewing public is frightened away from programs which are good entertainment because they are given names which smack of pedantry. There have been few dramas which carried as much impact as some of the White Paper and CBS Reports programs, yet their names made millions shy away.

Hollywood long ago learned this lesson. Every picture out of the movie snauage factory gets a lively label no matter what the content. They could take a little item about higher mathematics, call it "Danger: Curves and Angles," and make a fortune.

This is not to suggest that TV should go overboard on this. But a bit more of Hyatt's kind of thinking would be proper. Television must recognize that it is an entertainment medium, and that non-fiction is a great entertainment medium if handled well.

Hyatt has big plans for his unit. When it was first organized, it went slowly and painstakingly, producing things like "Victory At Sea" after months and occasionally years of work. Gradually, the demand grew and Hyatt says:

"I had to ask myself if my group were the only people in the world who could turn out good shows. Obviously, the answer was no. So I began building up the staff, hiring others who felt the way we did about television."

This season there will be five Project 20s—the "Laughter" show, others on the circus, beauty, religion ("He Is Risen") and one on cops and robbers narrated by Edward G. Robinson. There will be 30 other programs from his department which will not carry the Project 20 name.

Hyatt has two long-range pet projects which he admits are Utopian but he hopes to do them anyway. One would be a program examining love—man's love for his fellow man—and the other one on children. Both of these would require great patience and care, but that's what Hyatt and his team specialize in.

G. W. Ball Guest Of 'Meet Press'

George W. Ball, who was appointed Under Secretary of State last week in a shakeup of the State Department, will be the guest on "Meet the Press" Sunday, Dec. 10 (NBC-TV Network color broadcast, 8 p.m. EST; NBC Radio Network broadcast, including WNBC, 6:30 p.m. EST).

Ball, who had been in charge of economic affairs, is now second in command in the State Department. He is one of the administration's chief strategists on trade policy and has been playing a leading role in the preparations for the coming battle over reciprocal trade agreements. He has long been considered one of the country's top experts on the European Common Market.
