# "THE WAY I HEARD IT"

by John Gruber

New symphonic works are presented frequently, and with some degree of success, as a rule. New operas, are seldom encountered, and then they don't meet with great enthusiasm. People frequently wonder why, or perhaps I can give you some information in this regard.

A symphony requires about half an hour for performance, and will require not over half a dozen rehearsals by an orchestra, before it can be played in public. An opera requires anywhere from three to four hours for performance, and will require about a hundred rehearsals.

Obviously, it is cheaper to present the symphony, both in time expended by the composer and in time expended by the orchestra. With opera, you have to add the fact that there must be a proper libretto to begin with, containing sets of scenery, costumes, chorus, orchestra, stage hands, etc.

If you intend to commission and produce a new opera, you need to have close to \$200,000 at hand for the venture. Incidentally musical comedies cost about the same. And when you get done, it may not be a flop, something that runs for half a dozen performances.

Two very noticeable exceptions to this situation, however, are "The Barber of Seville" and "Elektra," surrounded by such operas as "The Marriage of Figaro" and "The Marriage of Figaro."

A musical has to run to good houses for a year in New York City before it begins to return profits. In the time it will receive about 400 performances and 400 paying audiences. If the Met did more than 10 performances of the same opera in a year, there would be a net profit of \$100,000. The Met has had a net profit of \$100,000 in the past year.

This assumes that the opera is sufficiently successful to last 50 years of course. If it is a flop, the fortune has gone down the drain. In Europe, governments subsidize new operas and happily in this country, the Ford Foundation does likewise.

They recently underwrote a new opera by Norman Deakin (1910-1958) which was produced by the San Francisco Opera and staged in October. It was a success, but since it was not the intention of the opera, it was not performed again. The London Times was representative of the chorus, and even the Herald was not, neither were other Hartford area papers generally so unresponsive. I'm not sure, but I suspect it is because of the opera's nature. Modern composers naturally write modern operas. This makes their music suitable for modern plots. However, opera audiences don't seem to want modern plots. Let's take a couple of examples.

Recently we've had "The Saint of Smeeth" which you may have seen on television, and "Street Scene" which New York's City Center Co. offered last year at the New York City Center.

My reply was in keeping with the simplicity of the man: "Nobody ever asked me."

## Soloists Fine In 'Messiah'

The Manchester Messiah Chorus gave its ninth annual presentation of Handel's oratorio which they take their name, last night at the Manchester High School Auditorium. Usually the house is packed but this time there were numbers empty seats in evidence.

The chorus remains the same year after year, numbering about 150. It is a very competent job under the direction of C. Albert Pearson. There is a tendency to take it for granted that it would not be damaged here in the past. It is a great deal of this size to make attacks and releases with precision, and to declaim the words so they do not become monotonous. The chorus sheers weight of numbers.

While the personnel of the chorus remains substantially the same, the soloists vary from year to year. I suspect it is because of the number of soloists who had been heard here the year before. He was Roger Loucks, tenor of an inconceivable attainments in the field of oratorio.

As in the previous presentation, Mr. Loucks demonstrated a voice which is more than adequate. He has good technique, better than average timbre, and sympathetic understanding of the music.

Francine Falcon was heard in the alto portion of the work. She although it is several years since she made a local appearance. Her voice is somewhat larger than her previous one and she approaches being a mezzo-soprano. This her presentation was somewhat warmer than we have heard here for a while. Her technique and phrasing were good, but without the truly excellent finish that we have sometimes heard here in the past.

Another change brought Robert Davis to sing the bass part. He has a very resonant voice, which proved feasible and well worth hearing. He is really a "basso cantante" or baritone, and so had a little difficulty with the extremely lower notes, but this was easily forgotten in his truly excellent performance of the remainder.

This leaves us only with the soprano, and I have a hard time to make. I did not hear her. I had been previously committed elsewhere, and was able only to hear about three-quarters of an hour of the presentation.

The work in hand is so designed that the soprano was not heard by 8:10, which time had to be left. Assuming she was as good as her cohorts, the members must have heard an excellent performance throughout.

The orchestra, made up of Hartford Symphony personnel, was heard to advantage in the opening overture and Philip Tregger, formerly of the Hartford Symphony, was the conductor in the job, incidentally proved excellent accompaniment to the soloists throughout.

## Shainwold on Bridge

CHOOSE YOUR PLAN

When you need some advice on how to make your plan of play and then stick to it. Don't wobble from one plan to another, and then wind up with nothing.

West opened the king of clubs, hoping the trick. West continued with the queen of clubs to dummy's ace not suspecting that a trick to South would eventually develop a diamond ruff for East.

It would be easy for South to go down by taking the top hearts and ruffing a heart with dummy's small trump at once. West would refuse to take the king of spades. Now it South tried to get back with a diamond, East would step up with the ace of diamonds and return a diamond to make sure of a ruffing trick.

If South tried to get back by ruffing a club instead of leading a diamond, he would be forced to ruff clubs twice and would run out of trumps.

Change Mind

When the hand was played a few months ago in the European Women's Team Championship, the South player started off on a winning line of play by leading the king of spades from dummy. She could have made the contract by continuing with trumps and then developing dummy's diamonds.

When the king of spades won, South changed her mind. She switched to hearts, intending to ruff the third heart in dummy. But she was wrong. The king of trumps to shut down East, and she was out of trumps.

Perhaps the moral is that if you're not in the mood to play it carefully, or perhaps it's fairer to say that we can all play a hand better on paper than the experts can at the table.

Polaris Marchers Home

New Haven, Dec. 11 (AP)—Nine Yale students nursed burnings and blisters today after walking 50 miles in support of the Polaris missile program.

But they had happy memories of their reception in Groton, objective of the march and home of General Dynamics Corp.'s Electric Boat Division.

The students demonstrated briefly in front of the program in favor of Electric Boat shipyards where Polaris is being constructed.

They received a hearty welcome from Electric Boat employees and were treated to doughnuts and coffee at union headquarters.

For more than a year, pacifists have frequently staged protests at the shipyards and urged the workers to seek other employment. The pacifists also included many college students.

Leading the Yale group was a 19-year-old sophomore from Groton, William Johnson, who said the work at Groton does more to insure the peace than years of fruitless negotiations.

Johnson and the other marchers were members of young Americans for Freedom, a Conservative group. They set out on Friday, stayed overnight in Old Saybrook, and continued the rest of the way Saturday in bone-chilling cold.

At Groton, they were joined by 10 members of a Liberal group, the Yale Liberals, however, did not walk.

How did the pacifists feel about the demonstration?

"We're glad to see them using our methods," said Robert Swan of Norwich, a pacifist leader, who was opposed to their beliefs.

He challenged the Yale men to a debate on the merits of the Polaris program but they rejected the idea.

Polaris Marchers Home

New Haven, Dec. 11 (AP)—Nine Yale students nursed burnings and blisters today after walking 50 miles in support of the Polaris missile program.

But they had happy memories of their reception in Groton, objective of the march and home of General Dynamics Corp.'s Electric Boat Division.

The students demonstrated briefly in front of the program in favor of Electric Boat shipyards where Polaris is being constructed.

They received a hearty welcome from Electric Boat employees and were treated to doughnuts and coffee at union headquarters.

For more than a year, pacifists have frequently staged protests at the shipyards and urged the workers to seek other employment. The pacifists also included many college students.

Leading the Yale group was a 19-year-old sophomore from Groton, William Johnson, who said the work at Groton does more to insure the peace than years of fruitless negotiations.

Johnson and the other marchers were members of young Americans for Freedom, a Conservative group. They set out on Friday, stayed overnight in Old Saybrook, and continued the rest of the way Saturday in bone-chilling cold.

At Groton, they were joined by 10 members of a Liberal group, the Yale Liberals, however, did not walk.

How did the pacifists feel about the demonstration?

"We're glad to see them using our methods," said Robert Swan of Norwich, a pacifist leader, who was opposed to their beliefs.

He challenged the Yale men to a debate on the merits of the Polaris program but they rejected the idea.

### Israel Convicts Eichmann Of Crimes Against Jews

(Continued from Page One)

The court said the trial served to record the history of a program which had been carried out in international law. In this sense the Israeli law of 1950 under which Eichmann was tried was more agreement with all other laws of "civilized states," the court said.

Regarding Eichmann's complaint that he was kidnapped, the court described at length a case in Vermont in 1953 in which a man was kidnapped from a car in Canada and brought to justice in the United States. The Vermont Supreme Court ruled that the method of bringing the man there was unimportant. This in effect was what the Israeli tribunal did.

The judgment recalled that as a Gestapo officer, Eichmann could not put the blame for the Nazi crimes on Hitler and the Nazi masses.

Defense Counsel Robert Servatius of West Germany, who made his plea to be allowed to speak in his own behalf.

The court rejected Eichmann's defense plea that Israel had no right to try him for crimes committed elsewhere and under a law passed years after the crimes.

The court found the law in the "tradition of international law" and said that international crimes were tried as far back as the ancient Ages in areas where the guilty were caught.

More than half of all Europe's Jewish population.

Eichmann is sentenced to death. His counsel can appeal the verdict to the supreme court.

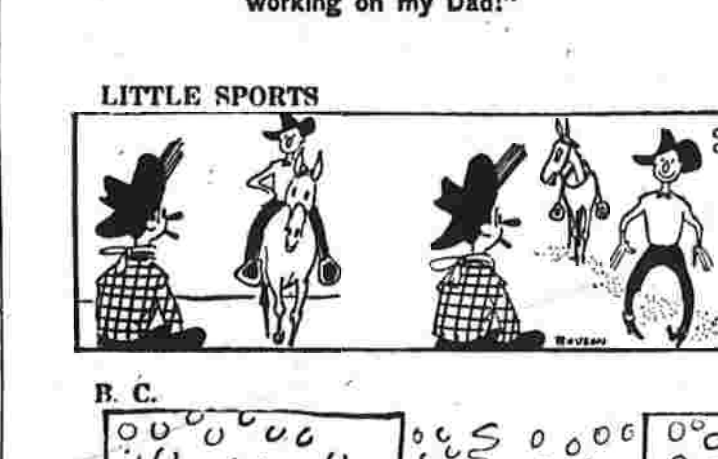
