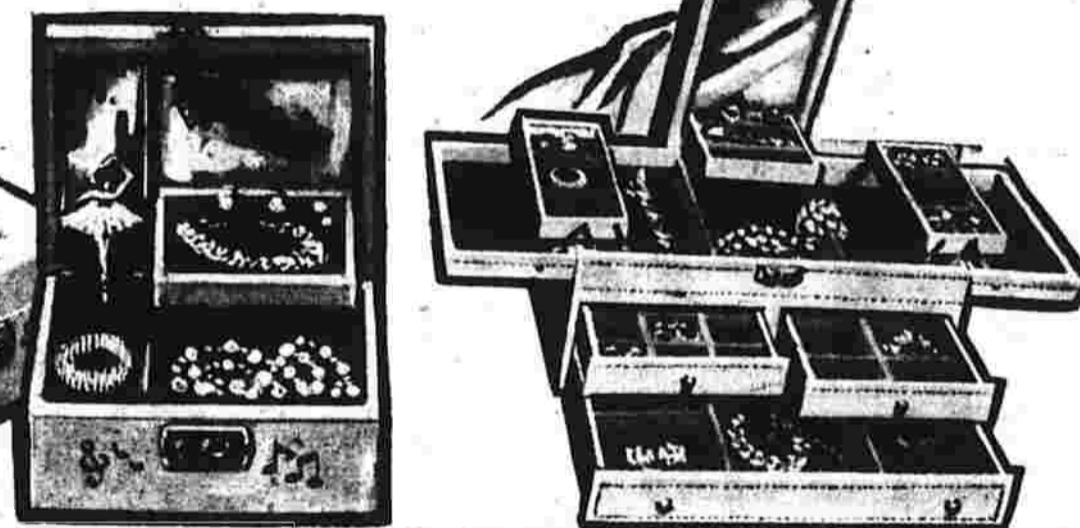

Grandma Moses Dies At 101; Noted Artist

Honesick Falls, N. Y., Dec. 14 (P)—Grandma Moses, spirited 101-year-old painter, died today. Her work has appeared on 100 million Christmas cards. She died 12 days before Christmas. Grandma, who achieved worldwide fame after taking up painting in her late 70s, suffered from a chronic heart ailment. But on her 101st birthday, Sept. 7, the spry, 100-pound farm woman vowed: "I'm going to live to be 100." She was alone with nurses when she died at 8:15 p.m. yesterday, her physician, Dr. Clayton Shaw, told newsmen. She had recently expressed a desire to go home, he said, but she was sort of indifferent to her surroundings lately. Only a few weeks ago, however, friends had described her as "bright as a button" and in the prime of life, despite her confinement and doctor's orders against walking. Officials Aim to Settle Sewer Plant Contract

A meeting set for Monday in a Rockville-Vernon sewer plant. A meeting of the city council will be held Monday to settle the claims and award final payment for construction of the new \$11 million sewer plant.

Corporation Council Edwin M. Lavitt said he expects to meet with representatives of the general contractor, the contractor's surety company, and various city officials and advisors attempting to iron out the problem.

The meeting will be held in his office.

At the moment, the city is withholding payment of \$104,000 owed the contractor, Plantations Construction Co. of Rhode Island, which has placed a claim against the city for an additional \$50,000. The claim is for extra and alleged delays in providing certain materials for construction.

The original contract was for \$600,000 but has since risen to a little over \$800,000 because of work changes.

The claims situation has been simmering about three months.

Lavitt told the city council in September the city and its engineering consultant, Howe-Albertson and Associates, have categorically denied all but a small amount of the \$50,000 claim. The remaining portion is being studied.

Lavitt said "It is known to note the contractor's claim is nearly equal to the five per cent security the city can withhold under a year under terms of the contract."

When the claim was made, a number of subcontractors had already notified the city they had not been paid by Plantations. Their claims amount to \$97,000.

The city stopped further payment at that time. There was \$104,000 still owed.

Since that time, one subcontractor has lined the sewer plant and another has brought a \$50,000 suit against the surety company, located in New Haven.

The Brewster Mechanical Contracting Co. of Glastonbury is bringing suit against the surety company because the bond written by the company for "Plantations is for material and labor as well as performance."

In the midst of this situation, the city has taken the position Plantations failed to meet the Oct. 1960 deadline for completion of the plant. It swung into full operation in April.

If the matter is settled, the contractor will be in line to receive the \$104,000 held by the city. The subcontractors would presumably be paid their \$97,000 out of that amount.

However, the city can withhold about \$50,000 of the \$104,000 for a year after formal acceptance of the plant.

The effect would be to cut the \$104,000 to about \$54,000, not enough to pay subcontractors in full.

Because of this, the city is looking warily at the contractor's \$50,000 claim for extra work.

Rockville-Vernon Court Settles Sunline-Rady Land Dispute

The 6-year-old Sunline versus Rady land title dispute in Rockville has been settled.

Thomas F. Rady Jr. said today "All I can tell you is it's been settled and everyone is happy."

The settlement was reached last night after a day long hearing before State Referee Samuel Melina.

Actually only two of three cases involving Sunline Realty Corp. and T. F. Rady and Co. were settled over a period of years.

The third case, involving an alleged trespass, will have to be taken back to the Superior Court as a separate action, according to attorneys representing the Sunline.

The title dispute began in 1955 over a pie-shaped strip of land 21 feet long at the east end of Rockville's Boardwalk block and west of the Rady printing shop. The case has been docketed from time to time in Superior Court, but has never come to trial.

The printing firm contested Sunline's claim to the land, to which title has never been cleared.

Sunline held it could use the land as right of way to a parking lot it was constructing at the end of the Boardwalk and behind the Rady building.

The Rady interests claimed ownership of the land by adverse possession. The Rady firm had maintained the land as though it owned it over a period of years.

Attorney Jerome I. Walsh, representing the Rady's, said title is not clear in old land records and

Widow Carries On for Utrillo

Paris — (UPI) — As long as there is a Lucie Valore, there will be a cut for her artist husband, the late Maurice Utrillo.

Utrillo since the end of World War II Pauline and Lucie took an interest in the unhappy, tortured artist who had been known as a drunken lunatic who danced and gibbered about Montmartre before he was 20. Utrillo's drinking caused him to dash off paintings in return for a bottle of wine.

This explains the appearance of so many faces. Actual number and quality of some of these slapdash works can never be determined.

It was Lucie who took him away from the easy temptations of Montmartre to a rambling house with a large garden in a residential suburb 10 miles outside Paris. There, because she knew Utrillo's intense religious feelings, she had a small private chapel built where he would pray for hours.

However, he inspired her new-found career.

One day while she was doodling waxes painting the street in the Montmartre section of Paris so loved by Utrillo were set afire in Lucie's courtyard. "They were never painted by my dear Maurice," Lucie said.

Times alleged Utrillo works painted by obscure artists were valued at \$140,000. Paul Pauline, Parisian art gallery owner and a Utrillo expert, said:

"The bonfire is just the beginning of a long, drawn-out pursuit of fakes who have been especially active since the war. However, there were fake Utrillos around during the artist's lifetime. Recently the French police seized around 100 paintings, drawings

and gouaches signed Utrillo. They presumably had been done by one man — not Utrillo — who was condemned "in absentia" to five years in prison.

Lucie has kept watch on such forgery attempts while fighting to preserve the cult ever since her husband's death at 71 in November 1950. She herself started painting seriously after he died.

She has been compared to the primitive painter Rousseau.

Lucie successfully exhibited her works, some of her husband's and some of her mother's in the United States in 1955. But then, as now, Lucie's primary occupation was devoted to preserving the artistic name of her husband.

They married in 1935 when Utrillo was 51, after the death of her first husband, Belgian-born financier and art patron Robert Pauwels. Pauwels had collected

Expert Hired To Check on Boston Police

Boston, Dec. 14 (AP)—The Boston Finance Commission hopes to engage a nationally-known expert to direct its investigation of an alleged alliance between racketeers and some Boston policemen.

Edward W. Brooke, chairman of the commission, said last night he will confer in Washington Friday with Quinn Tamm, special services director of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. Tamm directed an investigation of Chicago police which led to a cleanup of the force.

Brooke said he will outline the Boston situation to Tamm, a former assistant director of the FBI, in the hope of obtaining his services. Tamm indicated he will accept.

The Boston Herald quoted him as saying he had seen the film—"Biography of a bookie joint"—which was telecast nationally by the Columbia Broadcasting system with Boston and Southern New England blacked out.

The newspaper quoted Tamm as saying he thought the film reflected bad law enforcement in Boston. The picture depicted Boston police allegedly entering and leaving a bookie shop before federal tax agents and state police conducted successful raids on the establishment.

The film led to a controversy which prompted Gov. John A. Volpe (R) to demand the resignation of Police Commissioner Leo J. Sullivan. Sullivan refused.

Sullivan was named to the post by former Gov. Foster Furcolo (D) and can be removed only with consent of the executive council. The executive council is entirely Democratic.

The Herald quoted Tamm as saying he thought the CBS broadcast "was done in rather good taste" and that it was objective.

The Finance Commission was created by the legislature as a "watchdog" of Boston's fiscal affairs. The commission insists it has the right to investigate the police department.

Meanwhile, Det. Atty. Garrett C. Byrne continued to collect evidence which he expects to present to a grand jury next month.

Railroad Charged With Bad Service

Battleboro, Vt., Dec. 14 (AP)—A commuter representative has accused the Boston & Maine Railroad of providing poor service and poor trains on runs between Springfield, Mass., and Windsor, Vt.

Robert G. Averill of Woodstock, acting vice president of the newly formed Northern New England Passenger Transportation Conference, also told an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing yesterday that scheduling was poor and that the line failed to advertise for passenger business.

The hearing was one of a series held on the railroad's petition to discontinue six runs between the Massachusetts city and the Vermont community.

The ICC examiner gave the railroad and opponents of the petition until Jan. 17 to file briefs. The ICC is expected to announce its decision March 17.

Charles R. Duncklee, managing director of the Battleboro Chamber of Commerce, said curtailment of passenger service would have a serious effect on efforts to get new industries for the area.

George A. Bemis, owner of the Hotel Brooks at Battleboro, said it would cost him \$50,000 a year, principally from skiers.

Railroad employees disputed management's contention that on occasions more than 100 persons, including railroad workers and members of their families, are free riders on the run.

Luthuli Replies To Louw's Attack

Ola, Dec. 14 (AP)—Nobel Prize-winner Albert John Luthuli today brushed aside South African foreign minister Eric Louw's criticisms of him and said "The world knows all about Mr. Louw and what he stands for."

"If it was left to Mr. Louw and his party to pronounce judgment on the conduct of people of human standards and values would be reduced to a tragic mockery," the South African leader said in a statement.

Louw said yesterday that Luthuli during his stay in Norway to receive the 1960 peace prize had "slandered and abused South Africa," and that "his conduct must have convinced even his Norwegian hosts that he is no man of peace."

Luthuli's associate Oliver Tambo, who was vice president of the African National Congress until it was banned, said Luthuli does not expect more difficulties with South African authorities when he gets home than he had before he left.

"Strange as our laws are, there is really nothing more the government can do to him," Tambo said. "They can forbid him to take part in meetings and they can banish him to confinement in some specific area. But they have already done this, and there is nothing more they can do."

"Anyway, he is not alone any more. The Nobel Prize has meant that the whole world goes back to Africa with him."

NEW TEST SHOT FIRED
Washington, Dec. 14 (AP)—The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission has announced the firing of a sixth underground nuclear test shot.

The detonation yesterday at the AEC's Nevada test site was described as a low yield blast. This would indicate a strength equal to about 20,000 tons of TNT. The brief AEC announcement gave no further details.

Five previous nuclear detonations have been announced by the AEC since the United States resumed its testing program.

Another reason the United States is following the policy it is in the Congo is its conviction that, if President Thombes is allowed to contemplate the spectacle of one of the greatest being halted and arrested enough to ward off the Russian propaganda venture is obvious. So, we should say, are the conditions, and the uneasiness in some Western minds, about the question of remaining nuclear tests in the atmosphere.

Not Too Big To Pause... One tends to think of big nations as all-powerful, and one often begins, in fact, to think that maybe the biggest ones have grown too big for their own good and that of the world.

The United States is in such a position, whether by accident or design, on the question of remaining nuclear tests in the atmosphere. Judging by reports from Washington, almost every policy question involved in such a resumption of testing is a matter of debate whether it is our solemn task to promote a great nation's policy is, for an instant or two in time, quite paralyzed.

Such slight considerations as these are, according to reports, complicating our approaching decision with regard to atmospheric testing. We hate to defile our trusteeship. Two-Headed Farm Cure

By RAY CROMLEY
Washington (AP) — Agriculture Department experts see two possible ways out of the farm over-production problem. Despite the fact that the experts are not sure either will work, the Kennedy Administration is going ahead with a substantial farm program that covers, in part, both alternatives. It will be put before Congress in 1962. The first plan would require a sharp shift in the types of U.S. produce. There would be a big increase in dried beans, peas and soybeans, and a cut-back in wheat, corn and cotton. U.S. farmers would produce considerably more rice and could figure out how to sell the extra butter. These ideas result from a new Agriculture Department world food study to determine shortages of specific foods and where they exist. This survey was made to prepare for a planned expansion of U.S. government gifts and subsidies shipments of farm foods abroad. Roughly half of U.S. farm exports now are so subsidized. The Agriculture Department at an early date will begin to plan increased production in the food deficit nations, so countries will be less dependent on imports of American farm foods. The Agriculture Department's marketing experts are not quite certain how to meet these two programs. The second Agriculture Department plan is for developing a wide variety of new products to tempt the housewife to buy more of some kinds of foods. The Agriculture Department notes the per capita decline consumption of grain and dairy products, fresh and canned citrus fruits, leafy green and yellow vegetables and sweet potatoes. The Department's research men note that the national decline in potato eating was halted by the development of potato flakes. Here then are some of the products the Agriculture Department believes will be on the market shortly or within a few years. Sweet potato flakes — says marketing expert Philip B. Dwan: "The sweet potato flake is an excellent product—nutritious, easy-to-use, with good fresh-like flavor.
