to Save With Food Freeze Reep Cool and Pinn Well Q-Will a food freezer plan save oney?-A. M. A-Dear A. M.: On the basis of personal experience I can assure you that having a freezer can cut food bills if you use it intelligently.

For a small family a good-sized freezer compartment in a refrigera-tor suffices.

Savings come in keeping that freezer stocked with items bought on sale or in quantity. A freezer can save you time, too. Cook a large batch of something and freeze half or two-thirds for

Whether a food freezer plan will save you money depends on the plan. Bome, of course, do. But sadly enough I hear there are such promotions making the rounds that actually cost you money! Some plans fail to explain all the costs, and you end up paying more than you had anticipated.

Watch hidden financs charges, look for weights on the foods sold.

Q-Can you deduct on your fed eral income tax for expenditures for painting and home repairing? —D. E.

A—Dear D E.: The only time you may deduct for such expenditures on a federal tax return is if your home has been damaged by "an act of God," meaning fire, flood or wind damage. However, if you own a home which you rent and your home then produces income you may make such deductions.

Q—Can I have an air travel accident policy written into my life insurance policy? What would this cost?—B. S. A—Dear B. S.: You cannot have an air accident policy written into your life policy, but you could add to it an accidental death provi-sion covering air accidents and all other kinds of accidents. If you have a \$25,000 life policy, for instance, you could add a \$25,000 accidental death benefit provision, paying an extra \$25,000 in case of death by accident. The annual cost would run around \$25. If you do quite a bit of air travel, say 12 round trips a year, this would cost but about \$1 per trip. You would get full coverage all year for all other types of accidents at no added cost.

Q—When you apply for a Na-ional Defense Education Act loan, now do the lenders define need? — A—Dear J. J.: You apply for such a loan at the college of your choice—providing, of course, the college offers such aid. It is then up college offers such aid. Dear Nancy: Congratulations on your excellent question. If more folks were concerned with their own health there would be less trouble with people who are unable to pay their own medical bills. The Health Information Founda-tion reports that recently persons 65 and over spent more than twice as much for medical care as persons under 65.

Those figures are for private expenditures of older persons who are not in institutions. They do not include cost of terminal illnesses or

On the average, persons under 65 spent \$86 and persons 65 and over spent \$177 per year for medical care. Since no one ever pays the average amount, you may want to budget more than \$177.

If you don't have to spend it — and let's hope you won't — at least you will have it. I will be happy to answer in my column other questions of general interest about health problems. Just write me in care of this paper.
