1. Containment of urban development within the built-up area of town.

2. A new focus in the northern part of town through redevelopment of the north center.

3. Consolidation of industrial and wholesale activities in the Hilliard and Regent Sts. area (in conjunction with the north center redevelopment).

4. Another focus for the central-

4. Another focus for the central-downtown area of Manchester "for region-serving commercial uses, high-density residences, and related civic and public facilities."

5. An industrial park in the vicinity of the interchange of Interstate Rt. 291 and Rt. 15 in the Buckland area.

The policy guide urging containment of urban development within the built-up area of town is mainly aimed at the preservation of much of the existing rural, low-density greenbelts now found mostly around the perimiter of Manchester where rural zoning is in effect.
