Five Planning Policies Pond, Parks Figure In North End Plans

"Redevelopment" and "consolidation" are the key concepts applied to the North Center area of Manchester by consultants drawing up policies to guide the town's future development.

"Redevelopment" as applied to North Center (Depot Sq. and its environs) essentially means development for high-density residential use and local shopping and industrial activities.

Suggestions on the North End redevelopment plan, as seen by Planning and Renewal Associates, include the following points:

1. A concentration of high-density development along W. Main St.
2. A new neighborhood shopping area.
3. A civil cluster comprising a library, community center, and a new school facility.
4. Expansion of Robertson Park to include facilities for all-day family recreation.

The report also said that correction and improvements in Union Pond and its ultimate development for recreational use, coordinated with an expanded Robertson Park and the civic uses along Main St., "could contribute to the most pleasant environment."

The town completed the six-acre Union Pond purchase in March of this year at a cost of \$8,300 after prolonged debate by officials and residents on the merits of the purchase. Previously, the pond, then owned by the Hartford Miscellaneous Light Co.

The statement announcing the break with Yemen said the two governments had nothing in common "to make the federation between them an effective political struggle."

In posing as the symbol of the new wave in the Middle East, Nasser could hardly afford to remain tied to the feudal Red Sea monarch, who published a poem last week attacking Arab socialism after the break with Syria.

The association between Nasser and the Imam — theoretically co-presidents of the Arab League — approached the working relationship that Nasser had with Syria. It was a limited association in defense, cultural and economic affairs. The Imam's throne has been eroded, Yemen exiles in Beirut are a limited association with the prince, and the U.A.R. would contribute greatly to the development of the desert kingdom.

A Tableau Of Princes

This is the age of the computer, and the missile, and electronic progress and modernization and democracy.

One is disconcerted, now and then, to see, from some actual photograph, that a modern Laotian prince may look more like some French businessman than an oriental potentate. But that soon proves merely a visual illusion as in their actual dealings with one another, they follow the long, leisurely and devious code of oriental politeness.

They are supposed to be meeting in Laos now, the three princes, to settle up a coalition government they agreed upon a few weeks or months ago. But no one has better try to rush them. Even in this miracle age, no present Laotian prince is to be hurried. The deal is a coldly business one.

No Thieves' Picnic

Despite the acknowledged marvel of crime detection, it has to be admitted that the United States in getting ready to make atomic tests in the atmosphere, support it perhaps to the extent of loaning Britain's Christmas Island in the mid-Pacific as a test site.

\$5,000 Added To Funds for Storm Drain

The \$5,000 additional appropriation needed for the W. Middle Tpk. storm drain project was approved last night unanimously by the board of directors at a special meeting.

The appropriation brings to \$155,000 the amount to be spent on the project.

Directors appropriated \$150,000 for the project two months ago, but the apparent low bids submitted amounted to \$155,000.

Public works department officials pruned some parts of the installation to reduce the bid totals, but were only able to reduce the cost to \$151,000, and this amount did not include any allowance for contingency.

\$4,000 for contingency.

Four thousand dollars of last night's appropriation will be for contingency, such as an unusual amount of rock, or coping with other utility pipes which force a change in the level of the storm drain.

Whatever money is not used will be transferred to the general fund.

Democratic Director Paul Fessell referring to his party's traditional offering of bonding for capital improvements rather than paying for them out of income, said that the project could have been done at least cost two years ago, when it was that program.

Drain were paid for with bond money, the money spent on interest during the two-year period could have prevented the additional construction cost, he said.

Later in the meeting, Republican Director Robert Gordon said that while Fessell's reasoning might be true for the two-year period, the bonds which would be issued would be for many more years.

Bonds Changed

The apparent low bidders for the project are the Jarvis Construction Co. to install pipe from Hill and Pond east to Hagedorn's Service Station on W. Middle Tpk. and the A. Deen Construction Co. to install the pipe from Hagedorn's east to S. Alton St. on that street for a distance, and then east to Army St. behind Manchester Memorial Hospital.

The Lock Joint Co. of Newington is the apparent low bidder to provide pipe for the project.

One change which the commission over the bid totals brought about was a change in the route of the storm drain, near Eastern Pond. Instead of crossing the turnpike near the water department's existing station and proceeding west to Hill and Pond, the pipe will cross the turnpike and head north to a brook bed which now handles another storm drain from Fessell St.

Deaths Last Night

London (UPI)—Robert Fessell, 78, noted electrical engineer, who invented the electron microscope, died Tuesday after a brief illness. He retired from Harvard University in 1952 as Gordon McKay professor of electrical engineering and had been visiting Princeton at several universities. He was born in Hanover, Germany, and was a teacher of engineering at Georgetown University and at the Berlin Institute of Technology. He joined the Harvard faculty in 1935.

Tarzana, Calif.—Al Jennings, 50, headman of the Chicago territory who claimed he robbed 15 or 20 trains, died Tuesday. Jennings was convicted in the 1930s of a train robbery and sentenced to a life imprisonment but was paroled after serving five years. Later he became an attorney, a lecturer, evangelist and a motion picture technical adviser. He was born in Thaxwell County, Va.

New York—Dr. Otto Loewi, 88, who won a Nobel prize in medicine in 1936, died Monday. Dr. Loewi, research professor of pharmacology at the New York University School of Medicine, was awarded a Nobel prize for his discovery of the chemical transmission of the nervous system. He was born in Germany and came to the United States in 1940.

Old Saybrook—Walter Drew, 88, attorney for more than 50 years for the National Erectors Association, a trade group of leading steel companies, died Monday. Drew, who also had served as counsel for the National Association of Manufacturers, was born in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Pasadena, Calif.—Mrs. Ann Collins, 85, New York, who as Ann Whelan appeared in many Broadway plays, died Tuesday. She had a cerebral hemorrhage. She began her Broadway career at the age of 8 when she played in "Peter Pan" with Maud Adams. She retired from the stage in 1924.

Atlanta—Dr. John Jeter Hurt, 88, a former president of Union University at Jackson, Tenn., who devoted more than 60 years to the Baptist Church, died Tuesday. Hurt, who was ordained to the ministry in 1901, was born near Richmond, Va.

Poughkeepsie, N.Y.—Miss Mary Virginia Hillman, 58, head of the Yvonne College Drama Department since 1942, died Monday. She was born in Bridgeport, Ohio.

London—Isaac Flower Hatch, 70, American industrial singer who had been living in London since 1925, died Tuesday. He had been singing in the same London night club for the past five years.

Providence, R.I.—Rhode Island scientists have devised an apparatus that measures the velocity of rivers with ultrasonic waves. Waves are sent down and across a river to a receiving device so sensitive it can measure the extra speed the river's flow adds to the sound waves.

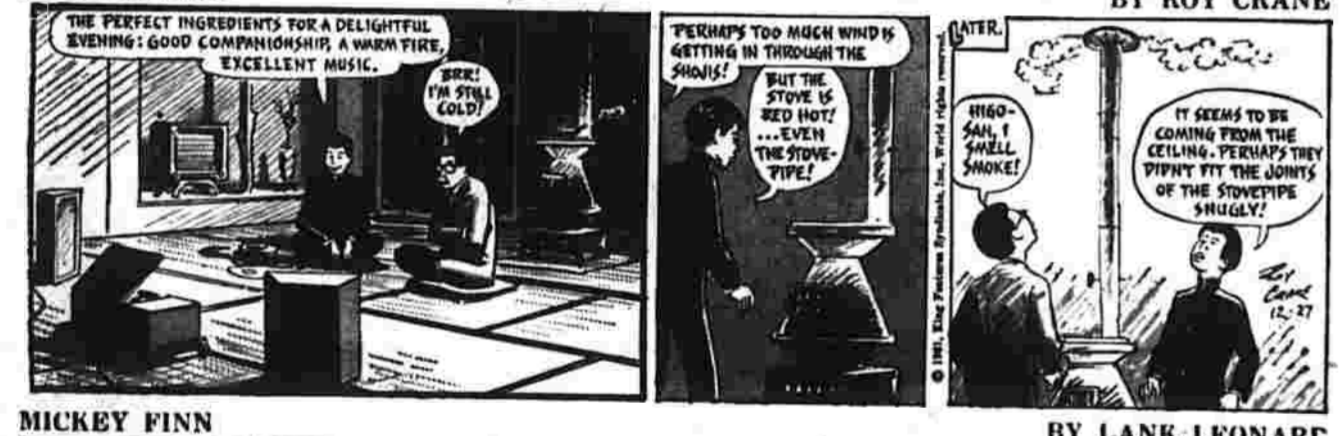

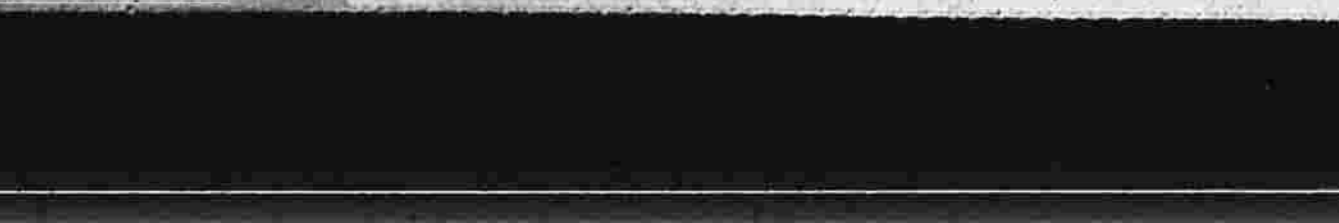

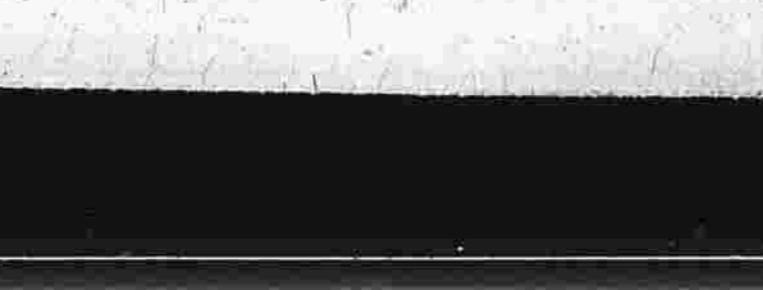
