Doctor Says

By HAROLD T. HYMAN, M.D. Written for Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Not many of us reach "years of

scretion" without suffering the ches and pains of back troubles caused by faulty body mechanics and even faultier shoeing. Since, for the most part, our troubles are due to errors dating back to infancy and childhood, we have an obligation to protect the rising generation from repeating too many of our mistakes.

Here are some suggestions that may keep your youngsters from the later development of foot miseries and back strains;

Don't urge the infant to stand or walk until he indicates that he's ready for weight-bearing. Never mind what the book says about when he ought to make the effort. Instinct is a better guide. Don't start with a mechanical walker. Straddling places weight-bearing on the inner part of the foot when it should be on the outser. Don't encourage bare-foot walk-ng. Especially if you have a souse pet. Sooner or later your hild is going to have to wear hoes. And there's no sense ex-toning him to contaminated floors

Buy stockings one-half inch longer than the length of the foot. Make your measurement with the youngster standing.

Observe these specifications for shoes: '& inch wider and '% to 3/4 inch longer than the measurements of the foot in the standing position, broad toe, straight inner margin, adjustable laces, widest at ball of foot, fiexible but firm sole that is not alippery.

Make frequent examinations of the shoes. If they are worn unevenly, especially along outer heels, have a lift added and correct the walking stance. Teach the heels, have a lift added and cor-rect the walking stance. Teach the youngster to point his toes in the direction for which he's headed, to keep his feet parallel and to shift weight along the outer border. Don't let him walk like a penguin with his toes pointed east and west while he's traveling north or couth.

Bathe his feet morning and night with soap and water. Dry carefully, particularly between the toes to prevent ringworm. And keep the skin amouth by anointing it with an unmedicated prepara-tion such as cream of albolene. As soon as the toenalis extend beyond the fleshy portion of the toes, cut them straight across Don't round the corners. And be shows signs of unusual wear or the growing foot appears to be get-ting growded, provide a new pair. The old cry of "baby needs a pair of shoes" didn't just come out of thin sir.
