## OAS Ministers Vote To 'Block' Castro's Cuba from Councils

Punta del Este, Uruguay, Jan. 29 (AP)—The Foreign Ministers of the American states agreed in principle today to "suspend" Fidel Castro's Cuban regime from hemisphere family councils.

A U.S. delegation source disclosed the breakthrough on this toughest issue of the conference, which has prolonged its deliberations here beyond the scheduled closing today. It came when Argentina and Chile—members of the so-called soft seven bloc led by Brazil and Mexico—accepted the majority view on the suspension procedure.

The U.S. informant speculated that the United States would get 17 to 18 of the 20 available votes for a policy statement that the Castro regime is unfit to sit in hemisphere councils so long as it embraces the Communist philosophy. The Council of the Organization of American States (OAS) will be instructed by this conference to decide "without delay" just how Cuba can be suspended.

Mexico and Brazil and possibly one or two other nations still held out, clinging to a go-slow approach. The two leaders of the soft seven want the council to achieve the suspension only by amendment to the OAS charter. This could mean a year of delay while the amendment was being ratified by two-thirds of the governments involved.

Under an apparent compromise reached by the majority, the OAS would be free to choose one of several methods ranging from swift action to the tortuously slow amendment process.

## State News Roundup

### Troopers Check 1,982 Cars, Hold Only 13 Drivers

Hartford, Jan. 29 (AP)—State troopers staged spot checks along the Connecticut-New York border Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights for the third weekend in a row—stopping 1,982 cars but arresting only 13 drivers.

Not a single arrest was for drunken driving and only eight of the 262 warnings issued were for driving after drinking. Driving after drinking warnings go to teenagers, with followup letters to their parents.

Since the checks were started by State Police Commissioner Leo J. Mulcahy—because three of the first six traffic fatalities of the year involved teen-age drinking—there has not been a single traffic fatality in the area.

Border checks were designed to curtail drinking by Connecticut teenagers in New York State, where the legal limit is 18. The limit is 21 in this state.

Connecticut's traffic death toll increased by one over the weekend.

## Kowalski Bids Party Leaders Air Neutrality

Hartford, Jan. 29 (AP)—The Democratic State Central Committee meets tonight to consider a request by Congressman-at-Large Frank Kowalski that the party leadership state its neutrality in the race for the U.S. Senate nomination.

Kowalski made the request to State and National Chairman John M. Bailey, saying that both he and party headquarters should "stay scrupulously fair" in the Senate race.

## Excessive Speed Blamed Ranger Craft Doomed To Eternal Sun Orbit

Pasadena, Jan. 29 (AP)—Ranger 3, the moon shot that missed its target by nearly 23,000 miles, is doomed to spend the rest of eternity in futile flight—an accidental satellite of the sun.

Of its four objectives, the \$7 million space craft apparently accomplished only one.

The biggest disappointment, of course, was that it missed the moon by 22,862 miles. This happened because it was hurled into its trajectory at excessive speed after it was launched Friday from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

That failure brought on others. For one thing, the 727-pound space craft was unable to bounce radar signals off the moon. And, since it did not land its capsule on the moon, it was unable to bring its sesamometer into play and measure moonquakes.

It also failed to get close-up pictures of the moon, and the long-range shots it got as it sped past apparently will be of little value.

The one thing Ranger 3 did do was collect gamma radiation data. These data already are being analyzed.

Ranger 3 raced by the moon and into oblivion yesterday afternoon, beginning to tumble as it went into solar orbit. Only one of its transmitters was working. But, during periods when that transmitter's antenna was pointed toward Earth, scientists were able to pick up the signal and chart Ranger's progress. This transmitter probably will run out of power in a few weeks.

An official of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, operated here for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said Ranger 3 will

### May Hits Rent Gougers

Hartford, Jan. 29 (AP)—Edwin H. May Jr., candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, called today for improved public housing practices which he said should benefit the needy and not the rent gougers.

The state and local welfare departments, he said, are being limited by rent gougers who charge high prices for sub-standard housing for welfare families.

In a statement from his campaign headquarters, May said full use of existing housing must be made to provide better conditions at lower rental costs.

He said he knew of cases in which rents up to \$125 a month are paid by the welfare department for 2-bedroom apartments in areas that can be described only as "undesirable."

Adequate housing for all families in the state, including those on welfare, is necessary, May said, adding: "The state should support the needy, not the rent gougers."

# U.S., Britain Seek to Mend Broken N-Test Ban Parleys

## Senators Ask Help For NHRR

Washington, Jan. 29 (AP)—New England and New York senators appealed today for presidential and congressional help in keeping the New Haven railroad going.

Their jointly signed letters to President Kennedy and House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., are part of a series of moves to prevent collapse of the bankrupt carrier.

Only yesterday it was disclosed that the White House had asked the Governors of New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island to suggest ways in which the line can be saved. This letter, written by the President's deputy special counsel Myer Feldman, was in response to a telegram from the four governors asking aid.

The senatorial letter followed conversations between the three court-appointed New Haven trustees and New England and New York members of Congress here within the past few days.

The letter to the President urged that he appoint a personal representative to work with the governors "in this critical matter."

"It is clearly in the public interest to preserve the facilities of the New Haven railroad and other northeastern railroads similarly affected," the Senators said, "then clearly public support will be essential."

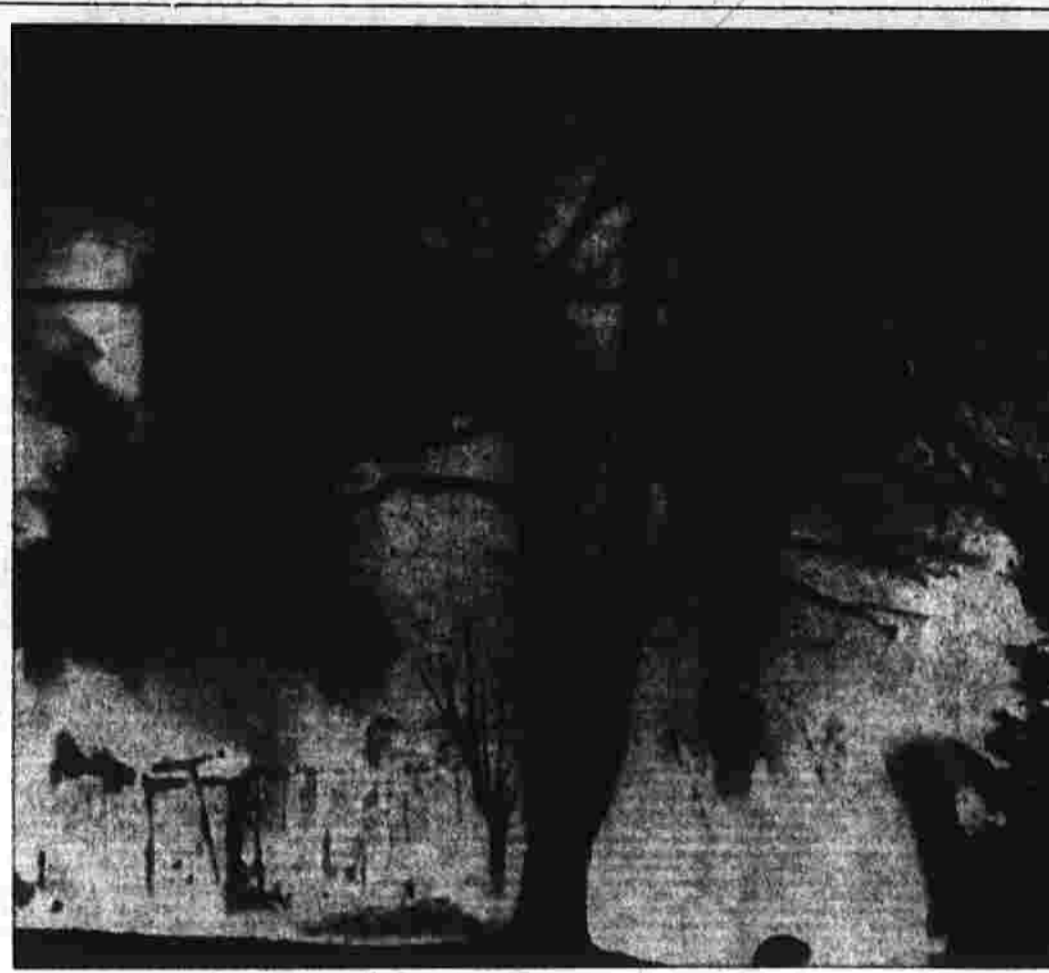
In their letter to Mills, the senators said the trustees are convinced that the present depleted cash reserves of the railroad will not permit operation beyond June or July of this year. They said the trustees report it is essential to secure a fare increase equivalent to the amount now collected by the passenger excise tax.

"It is for this reason," the senators said, "that repeal of the passenger excise tax is of vital and immediate concern to both the trustees and ourselves."

In his State of the Union Message to Congress, President Kennedy called for repeal of the excise tax. The senators appeared to Mills to speed action on a repeal measure.

"We can only, therefore, express to your office our strong conviction that legislation to repeal the excise tax should be approved at the earliest possible time."

The Senators told the President that the governors of the four affected New England states had

## Rarely Practiced Fritz Kreisler Dies; Famed Violinist, 86

New York, Jan. 29 (AP)—Fritz Kreisler, one of the great violin virtuosos of the last half century, died today. He was 86. Many music lovers knew him as "Mr. Violin."

Death came to him in the Harkness Pavilion of Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center where he had been a patient for 16 days. His agent said a heart attack, along with old age, brought the end.

Over the years, his name had become almost synonymous with violin music. A man with a huge affection for the common man, he had helped popularize good music among the masses.

He made Dvorak's "Humoresque" one of the best loved compositions of all times.

Kreisler not only was a master performer, but also a versatile composer, his works ranging from chamber music and operetta to folk dances that have become classics.

In the last several years, Kreisler and his wife, Harriet, lived in virtual seclusion in their Manhattan apartment. With his hearing

## Mother Defies School Official On Bus Ruling

Hamden, Jan. 29 (AP)—Mrs. Herbert Fay said today she was determined to keep her two teenage children out of school despite a threat of legal action.

## Offer Reds 3 Methods At Geneva

Washington, Jan. 29 (AP)—The United States and Britain have proposed to Russia three possible ways of resuming negotiations for a treaty to ban nuclear tests.

This was announced by the State Department today on the heels of the indefinite breakup of the 3 1/2 year old test ban conference at Geneva.

The department said the United States and Britain informed the Soviets at Geneva that they were willing to seek a common basis for re-establishing test ban negotiations.

1. Under the auspices of the 18-nation General Disarmament Conference starting at Geneva March 31.
2. Through normal diplomatic channels.
3. Through informal discussions between the test ban delegations at Geneva.

U.S. officials said Charles C. Stille, head of the American delegation at the test ban conference will remain in Geneva at least until March 14 and with sufficient aides to enter into further talks if the Soviets decide they want to seek a common basis for negotiations.

Officials acknowledged, however, that prospects were dim for a chance in the Soviet position. They also noted press reports that the chief Soviet delegate, Semyon Tsarapkin, is leaving for Moscow.

The gap has been widening between the western atomic powers, who have been pushing for a test ban with controls to enforce it, and the Soviets who say self-policing by treaty signers is sufficient for a test ban treaty.

## Odium Given Jail Sentence On Tax Counts

New Haven, Jan. 29 (AP)—Hartford Attorney Frank H. Odium was sentenced today to a year in jail on each of three counts of failure to file income tax returns.

Judge Timothy Timbers specified that the sentence run concurrently and that they be suspended after three months on condition that Odium comply with requirements set by the state.

Timbers ordered two years probation for Odium, a former assistant state attorney general, provided he pay within six months of probation Odium file his tax return, and that within one year of probation he pay all taxes due.

Timbers also barred Odium from practicing law before the federal court.

Odium, 57, was convicted last Nov. 28 of failing to file income returns for 1954, 1955 and 1956.

## Boy Escapes, Nine Die in Fire 'There's Nobody Left but Me'

Buckland, Mass., Jan. 29 (AP)—"They're all gone. There's nobody left but me."

That panicky cry, sobbed by a pajama-clad 11-year-old boy pounding on a neighbor's door, was the first alarm of a fire that took nine lives early Sunday morning in this western Massachusetts village.

Six children and three adults—all in one family—perished in the flames that whipped through a 2-story farmhouse two hours before dawn.

The sole survivor was Robert Deane Jr., mentally retarded, who escaped the flames by plunging through the glass of a rear door.

Those who died included his mother, Mrs. Robert Deane, 32; a brother, Charles, 6; the children's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond R. Crandall, 66 and 63, respectively, and five first cousins ranging age from 2 to 10.

The cousins were the children of Everett Crandall of Springfield and Mrs. Wilbur Rogers of Greenfield. Police said Crandall's parents had custody of the children since a divorce. The children's

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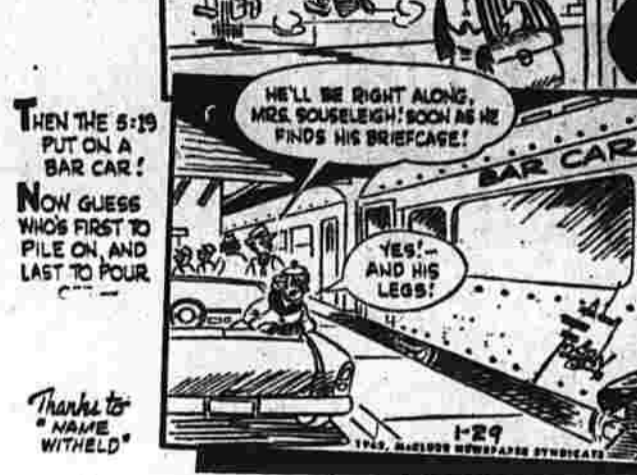
