The airborne assault force. moved into the attack in three successive waves, totaled one battalion of Vietnamese infantry and a company of rangers-perhaps 500 men.

Only women, children and two old men occupied the village by the time the copter fleet last touched down and three Vietnamess army units, each with American military advisers, closed in. U.S. soil. Lt. Col. Robert B. Olson of The mo



**De Gaulle Hits Foes** In Algiers

> PARIS (AP) - President Charles de Gaulle said tonight that despite "subversive and criminal" resistance by rightwing opponents, France is moving rapidly toward peace in Algeria.

The French president, in a radio-television speech to the nation, declared he "positively hoped" he would attain this goal very soon. He added that France would soon make public in detail her latest proposals to end the more than seven years of savage nationalist insurrection.

De Gaulle scoffed at efforts of right-wing European activists, grouped in the clandestine Secret Army Organization, to seize power in France. He recalled previous unsuccessful efforts of the rightwing Europeans in Algeria to undermine the Paris government.
