He said projected high school enrollment has been based on conservative predictions. The school population is expected to increase by 200 students in 1962. Registrations for next year are expected to total 1,075.

The 40-classroom school is expected to be full by 1963. Enrollment can be held to 1,300 maximum.

### Lack of Time May Halt MEG Charter Proposals

A handful of Municipal Employees' Group members set in dwindling hope of their charter revision proposals reaching the polls this fall, as last night they heard the Charter Revision Commission say it is unlikely that there is enough time to complete a study of the proposals and make recommendations on them by the time of the commission's public hearing next month.

Fred Naasir, a member of a commission subcommittee studying the proposals, said he is not sure if he can complete the commission's suggested charter changes at last night's commission meeting in the Probate Court hearing room. The other subcommittee member, Atty. Leon Podew, did not attend the meeting.

Naasir asked the employees' group last week to furnish more information on one of the group's proposals to place a residency requirement on town employees.

Mrs. Adela Wroblewski, secretary of the employees' group, said the additional information requested by Naasir regarding the residency requirement "will be submitted soon."

"It might not be soon enough," said Atty. Victoria Diana, chairman of the commission.

Diana agreed to Naasir's request of calling a special meeting before the public hearing to consider the proposals in the event they should move out of town. The other would provide for the appointment of only one assessor, rather than as many as three as the charter now permits.

No word on Manager Aldo Diana observed that the mayor's letter to the commission did not include a request that the commission consider a charter change that would require the board of directors to recruit and appoint from within the town an assistant general manager.

Nor has the commission received any such communication from the board since the proposal was introduced on Dec. 20. The charter now provides for out-of-town appointments to the position.

Naasir said the commission decided to hire a general manager to fill the position in the event it is approved.

Naasir said he would like to see the commission's recommendation on the adoption of a central financial department for the town.

A report on the proposal submitted by Atty. David Barry and Gilliam, announced a favorable impression of a centralized financial system, but was inconclusive as to whether it should be adopted.

Naasir said the proposal is so far-reaching that it isn't something that can be jumped into. He called the information provided by the group last week "unimpressive," but said that he hoped a final report by the subcommittee would be more conclusive.

In other action at last night's meeting, the commission decided that it might be unwise to make a last-minute recommendation on the adoption of a central financial department for the town.

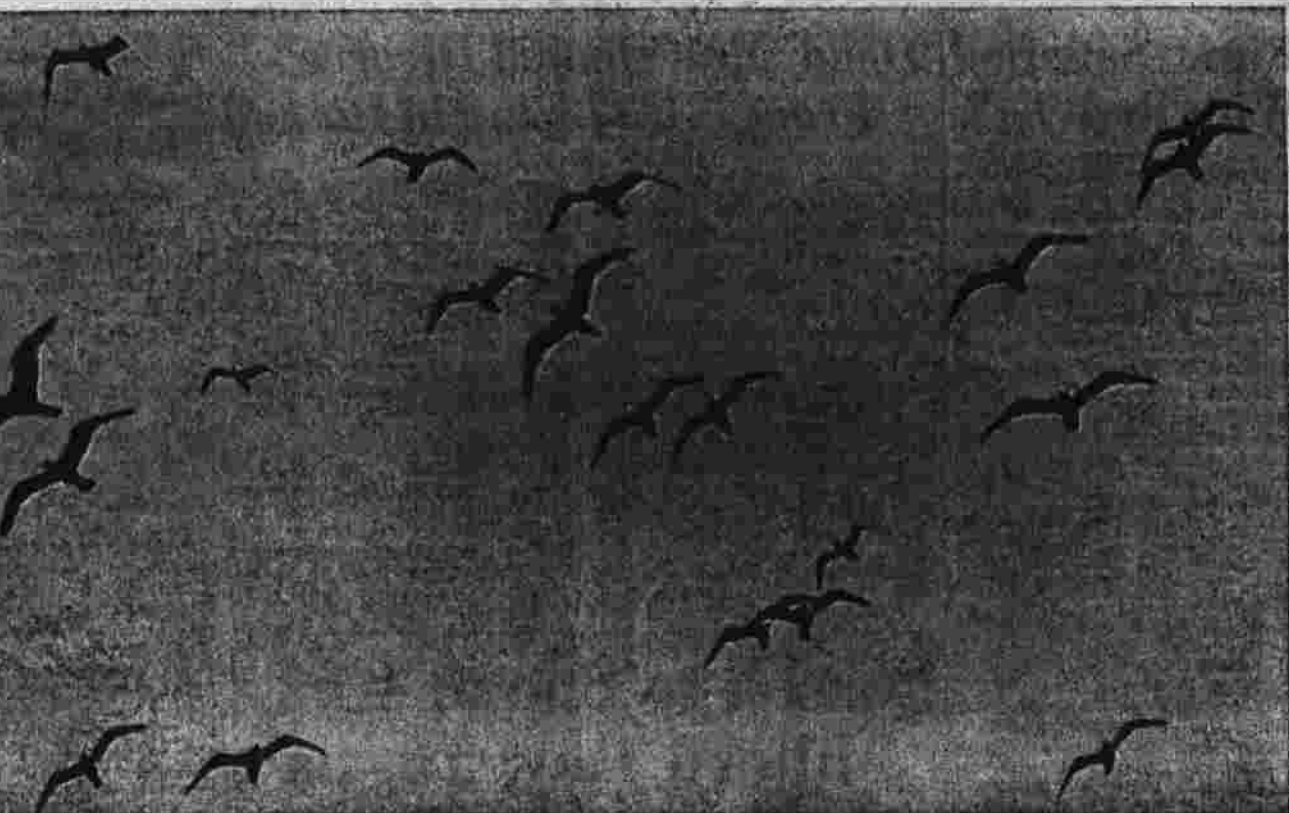

### MEA Members Split On Anti-AFT Moves

In a meeting marked by tempers and confusion yesterday afternoon, the Manchester Education Association found its membership not wholly in favor of measures some members have proposed to thwart the powers of the proposed Manchester local of the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO.

A majority of the MEA voted to deny union members of the committee position in the MEA, 47 dissenting votes were cast by teachers who felt the two groups were being "violated" after a second motion, which would have appointed the MEA as the sole representative of Manchester teachers in important issues with the board of education, was abandoned when AFT local members walked out, leaving the MEA with less than a quorum.

"I think the MEA had better look into its own organization," said MEA President Lador Wolf when the meeting was adjourned after the walkout.

One hundred twenty-six teachers were present at the start of the session in the Manchester High School cafeteria, and 114 are members of the MEA. After several non-union members had drifted out, the union members had left 100 teachers remained.

A committee of five teachers, headed by Robert Wolfert, had suggested that MEA leaders be non-union members. Also on the committee were Mrs. Mellic C. Fox and Leo Deane, national officers.

Immediate objection to the suggestion was raised by the superintendent, who said the MEA should "take means to maintain a high level of communication" and "prevent any undue pressures" between the groups.

Arthur Glaeser, moved that the measure be dropped by the committee and Gilbert Hunt seconded the motion.

Those supporting these teachers opposed to the committee's suggestion, David Monahan said, "I don't think we should have a committee of non-union members. If you don't want them to be second class members, you should not have them on the committee." Wolfert countered later, "I might call them second class MEA members. They cannot subscribe to the majority of principles set forth in the MEA and CEA."

Hunt called the committee's recommendation an "anomalous proposal" which would divide the MEA and AFT local into "two warring camps." The major federal funds were not of that type is the "divisive" nature of the proposal.

### MEAs Split On Anti-AFT Moves

In a meeting marked by tempers and confusion yesterday afternoon, the Manchester Education Association found its membership not wholly in favor of measures some members have proposed to thwart the powers of the proposed Manchester local of the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO.

A majority of the MEA voted to deny union members of the committee position in the MEA, 47 dissenting votes were cast by teachers who felt the two groups were being "violated" after a second motion, which would have appointed the MEA as the sole representative of Manchester teachers in important issues with the board of education, was abandoned when AFT local members walked out, leaving the MEA with less than a quorum.

"I think the MEA had better look into its own organization," said MEA President Lador Wolf when the meeting was adjourned after the walkout.

One hundred twenty-six teachers were present at the start of the session in the Manchester High School cafeteria, and 114 are members of the MEA. After several non-union members had drifted out, the union members had left 100 teachers remained.

A committee of five teachers, headed by Robert Wolfert, had suggested that MEA leaders be non-union members. Also on the committee were Mrs. Mellic C. Fox and Leo Deane, national officers.

Immediate objection to the suggestion was raised by the superintendent, who said the MEA should "take means to maintain a high level of communication" and "prevent any undue pressures" between the groups.

Arthur Glaeser, moved that the measure be dropped by the committee and Gilbert Hunt seconded the motion.

Those supporting these teachers opposed to the committee's suggestion, David Monahan said, "I don't think we should have a committee of non-union members. If you don't want them to be second class members, you should not have them on the committee." Wolfert countered later, "I might call them second class MEA members. They cannot subscribe to the majority of principles set forth in the MEA and CEA."

Hunt called the committee's recommendation an "anomalous proposal" which would divide the MEA and AFT local into "two warring camps." The major federal funds were not of that type is the "divisive" nature of the proposal.

Laurence Perry, who spoke in support of the committee's proposal, said the proposal does not in effect force an AFT member out of the MEA.
