

## New St. George's to Rise This Summer

The Episcopal Dicesse of Connecticut hopes to build this church for St. George's Mission in Bolton this summer. Designed by Bartlett and Freligh, Bloomfield architects, it will seat 200 worshipers. In addition to the nave it contains a sacristy, office and boiler room, and will be built on a slab. The church, of masonry and redwood, is designed for easy expansion toward the front, by removal of the redwood facade and low-roofed vestibule. The building will be located about 20 feet east of the present temporary structure, its front line even with the rear line of the current building which will be used as a parish house when the new church is complete. St. George's parishioners pledged a sum of about \$25,000 toward the total cost of the building in a drive a year ago., Total cost of the project is expected to approximate about \$60,000. 
