Historic Newport Revives Elegant Colonial Designs



Restoration of the White House—recalling the beauty and elegance of early-American, stimulates a surge of interest in furniture, fabrics, silver and china dating back to our Colonial era.

Usually, "Early American" evokes a picture of rough-hewn maple and pine and candle ruffins in a rustic room. But a closer look at Colonial design reveals other design heritages—the elegant Newport style.

Two hundred years ago, Newport, Rhode Island, was a bustling seaport, one of the great cities of the Colonies with splendid mansions owned by merchant princes and wealthy sea captains. Men made fortunes in the Indian and fur trade and then commissioned master-craftsmen to build special furniture, create original silver, china and fabrics for their homes.

Furniture and silver of 18th Century Newport are highly prized for their distinctive design. For example, blockfront design with carved shells surrounding raised panels originated in Newport.

VAN CLEVE, Ky. (AP)—Radio Station WVCW turns its back on most advertisers, operating on faith instead of money.

The six staff members draw no salaries, yet there's always a waiting list for jobs as they study hidden away in the mountains of eastern Kentucky.

On the air 40 hours a week, WVCW reaches into four states with spiritual, educational, agricultural, musical and news programs.

"We play no rock 'n' roll, no jazz. Nor do we accept cigarette or liquor commercials," says Dr. Lela G. McConnell, who came into Broadcast County in 1924 with only a few dollars in her purse.

Today, at 77, she is president of the station, a mission school, and a Bible institute, but still owns nothing of material value.

She draws no salary, has no bank account of her own. Her expenses, totaling about \$30 a year, come from the Kentucky Mountain Holiness Association, which holds title to the 27 buildings making up the operation.

"How could I pay money out of the bank account of others," Miss McConnell asks. "I had money of my own."

A \$10,000 gift from a couple in Oregon led to the opening of WVCW. The call letters stand for "Vine, Jesus to Christ."

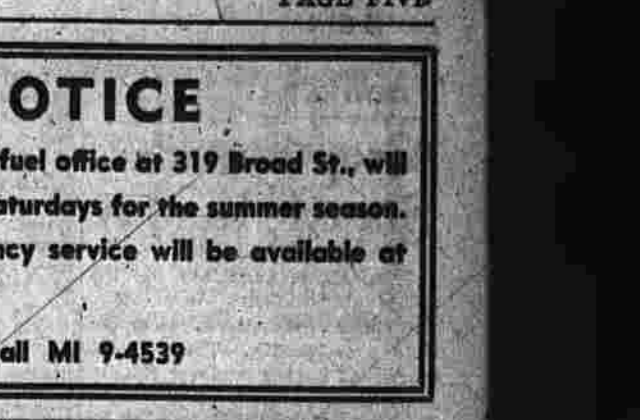

"Our Duty is Surely Simple" Prime Minister Macmillan did a rather nice job, before America's newspaper publishers down in New York last night, of ficing up to the "deadlock" language of cold war policy in the world today and of managing, still, to go on toward that kind of resuscitation all except the most desperate orders like to convey at the end of a speech.

There is a simple description of our world deadlock—too simple, perhaps, for complete accuracy. Part of Khrushchev's blame problem belongs to somebody else, too. For all we know, some good, and not only tragedy, may come from the President's decision to resume tests.

Not Funny To Them One morning soon after retired General Walker had, in his testimony before Senate committees, finally named Dean Rusk as one of the leading servants of the Communist infiltration of our American way of life, that same gentleman, Mr. Rusk, acting in his capacity as Secretary of State, gave his morning staff meeting what he thought was a humorous opinion.

"Good-morning, comrades," he is reported to have said. "That was indeed a witty reference to the completely irresponsible charge made against him by the right-wing imagination of General Walker. Very sophisticated, and amusing."

Secretary of State Rusk went on to say in his early morning remarks only so humorous when he next encounters it. The right wing will, in its own good time, and in its own expert variety of ways, get around to his remark.

Swimming Team Co-Captains Injured in One-Car Crash

Two of Manchester's High School swimming team co-captains were injured early today in a one-car crash on Line St. just west of Grand St.

The accident was one of five investigated by police yesterday and today.

John Verfallie, 17, of South Rd., Bolton, is reported to be in satisfactory condition in Manchester Memorial Hospital's special care section after receiving "minor" injuries in the crash.

A hospital spokesman this noon said that Verfallie received a laceration of his scalp and concussion and has been in a semi-conscious condition since he was admitted early today.

Police said that the accident occurred shortly after midnight when John H. Driving with one hand, he lost control of the car, The car went into the control, west into a four-foot ditch on the south side of the road, struck three trees and became in motion on its left side, 17 feet off the road, police said.

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June 25 Parole Set For Major Figure In O'Dwyer Probe

NEW YORK (AP) — James J. Moran, former first deputy fire commissioner who was held after being convicted as mastermind of a half-million dollar shake-down racket, will be paroled June 25.

Moran, 61, was a key figure in a major scandal of the administration of Mayor William O'Dwyer. Moran has served more than 10 years in state and federal prisons.

Moran's younger son, Robert, 25, said last night that his father's parole hearing was held March 20 and the family was notified last Tuesday of the pending release.

Moran was sentenced to 12½ to 20 years in prison in the shake-down racket, whereby fuel oil dealers were forced to pay bribes for city permits to install equipment. He was tried in 1952.

Moran, at his trial, refused the judge's offer to reduce his sentence if he would tell what he knew of the money. Judge John H. Mulvan, noting that Moran, his wife and their four children lived well within Moran's \$10,000 a year salary, suggested that Moran either cashed the payoff or "passed the money on to some other person or persons whom you can call on some time in the future."

An estimated \$300,000 of the shake-down money never has been accounted for.

During his trial, Moran insisted he was innocent but he never took the witness stand to defend himself.

Judge Mulvan castigated Moran as "a shining example of everything a public official should not be."

He was released from state prison last June 19 after serving nine and a quarter years. He immediately entered the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury, Conn., to serve a combined sentence dating from the O'Dwyer scandals—six months for perjury before the Senate's Kefauver Crime Investigating Committee and two years for income tax evasion. The sentence was reduced.

Moran and William O'Dwyer were friends since 1933, when Moran was a county court attendant and O'Dwyer had just been elevated to the bench of Kings County Court in Brooklyn. Moran became O'Dwyer's adviser when O'Dwyer campaigned for a full term of the bench. O'Dwyer was elected district attorney in Brooklyn and Moran became his chief clerk.

When O'Dwyer became mayor in 1945 he named Moran to the deputy fire commissioner post. O'Dwyer resigned as mayor just after beginning his second term and went to Mexico as U.S. ambassador.

Just before resigning, however, O'Dwyer appointed Moran to the lifetime job of water supply commissioner, a post he resigned on demand of O'Dwyer's successor, O'Dwyer, now a law associate of his brother, Paul O'Dwyer, had no comment to make yesterday on Moran's parole.
