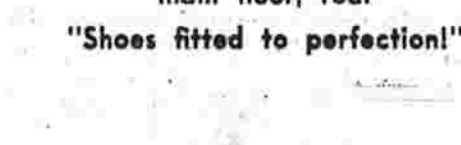

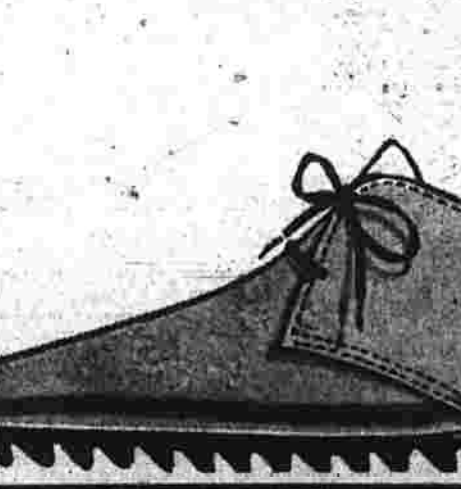

## Saturday Launch Carpenter Set For Orbit Trail

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Atlantic weather conditions were far from desirable today, but Project Mercury officials pushed ahead with plans to launch astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter on Saturday in his Aurora 7 craft.

As weathermen kept close watch on high and low pressure systems hovering over the ocean over the intended orbital path, Carpenter's physical and mental outlook was reported bright as his big day neared.

Causing the greatest concern was a high pressure system in the central and eastern Atlantic which was creating 11-foot high swells in an area near the Canary Islands where Carpenter's craft would land if the mission were aborted shortly after launching. This weather condition was reported to be weakening and clearing by Saturday.

A low pressure area was moving around east of Bermuda, moving slowly westward. Winds were not too high but heavy seas were reported extending from Florida to Bermuda. A cold front was reported over the Atlantic west of Bermuda, and the flight was terminated after it crossed the Bermuda Islands.

Partly cloudy skies were reported over the second orbit. The cover story 500 miles south of Bermuda, while weather was reported good over the third orbit drop zone near Grand Turk Island, 800 miles southeast of Cape Canaveral.

### Bolton Town Asks Alternative On Secondary School

The public building commission ruling that the amendment was in order. There were 24 in favor of Cooper's ruling and 63 against it. Dr. Alexander Plante said he thought plans for a junior high school should be obtained along with plans for a junior-senior high school so townpeople would have an alternative plan should the junior-senior school prove too costly. Previous plans for a junior high school were voted down through lack of the cost of financing them. Plante said: "There has never been an open discussion on the specifications adopted by the board of education, according to Dr. Plante."

John McCarrick, board of education chairman, and board member Harold Pomeroy cited the many meetings held by the board during which townpeople could listen to plans for the school. McCarrick said the board had "a choice but to adopt a 6-6 plan providing for a junior-senior high school since Manchester would not be able to take Bolton pupils in the fall. We can't speculate; we can't listen to hearsay, McCarrick said, "that's the principal reason why we came up with a 6-6 plan."

After several questions had been asked and answered by Supl. Liguori, Cooper allowed Dr. Plante and Liguori 10 minutes each to present their views on the junior high school respectively.

Liguori said that on the senior high school level the proposed junior-senior high school would have 8 to 15 pupils in advanced language and science classes. The school would have about 150 pupils, he said. He cited advantages of a small school and the fact that large high schools are breeding larger their school population into smaller schools within the large one.

Dr. Plante said all he was asking for was a chance to have townpeople make a decision based on information. He claimed that to one at the meeting, including the board of education, knew the square footage of the proposed school at various meetings he attended.

The vote on the amendment to create junior as well as junior-senior high school plans was 117 to 66 on a standing vote. The vote on the original call as amended was carried by voice vote. No opposition was heard on the vote to appropriate \$7,500 for use of the public building commission to hire an architect and obtain preliminary plans for the school. There was some discussion as to whether to table the item on authorizing the board of education to apply for state aid. This was finally amended to authorize the board to apply for state aid for a junior high school or a junior-senior high school. There was only one "no" heard on the amendment and no opposition was heard on the item supporting application for state aid.

The meeting ended shortly before 10 p.m.

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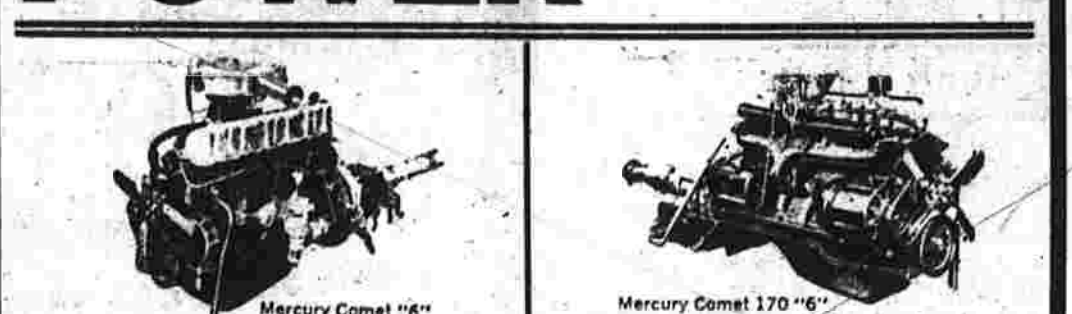

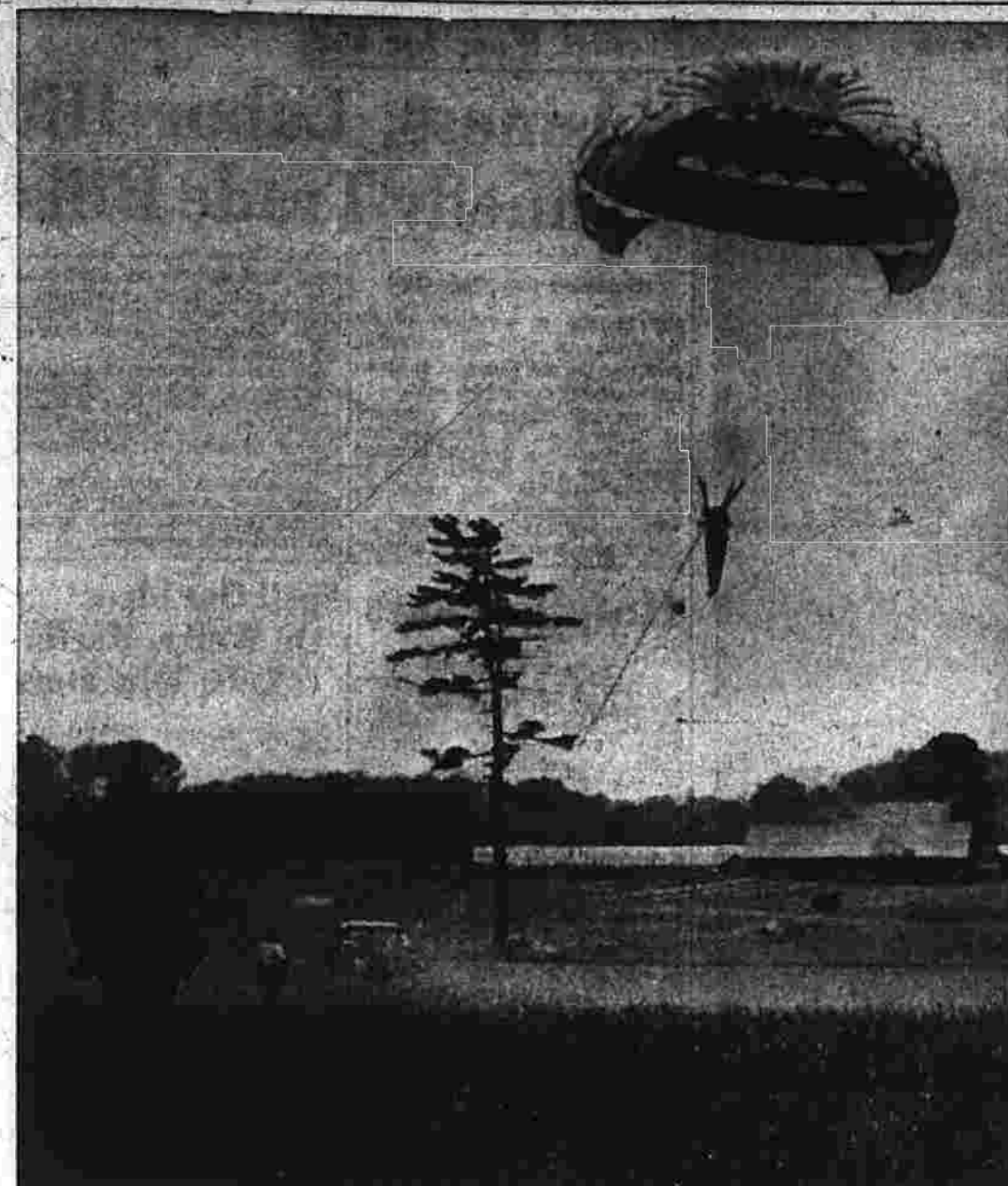

### Model Twists in Air Aided by Para-Sail

Model Lynn Karrol originated the para-twist this afternoon about 100 feet off the ground. The new dance requires that both feet be off the ground with your head in the clouds—not difficult at all when you're floating through the air on a Para-Sail, a new parachute that both ascends and descends. The Para-Sail, which was developed by Pioneer Aerodynamic Systems, Inc. of Manchester, was demonstrated at 12:30 this afternoon at a field owned by the Hartman Tobacco Co. off Smith St. in South Windsor, by professional model and amateur parachutist Lynn Karrol. The pink and white cloth blende found twirling in the pink and white parachute almost as easy as twirling on the ground, and looked very much at ease while sailing in the neatly operated Para-Sail. The kite-like ascending parachute, which was being towed by a truck lifted the cover-girl aloft, and then brought her gently to the earth. Everything was A-O Karrol all the way. Upon descending, she was brought to her landing, and was congratulated for a perfect flight. Only the spectators saw mystic-like objects floating in the air. This ascent was made by split-

standard equipment for Army and Navy sky-diving teams. The Para-Sail is designed to reach a height of several hundred feet and can be flown behind a vehicle or on a fixed towline. The Para-Sail, which was designed by Pierre Lemoigne of France, has undergone months of testing by Pioneer, and has been proven practical and simple to operate. It is now ready for manufacture and sale—for about \$500, including canopy, harness, tow rope, and carrying bag. Pioneer Aerodynamic Systems, Inc., the world's largest manufacturer of parachutes, owns the exclusive manufacturing and marketing rights for the chute in North and South America.

The Para-Sail is destined for use in both sport parachuting, a fast-growing activity in this country and the training of military paratroopers. Trainee-paratroopers will be able to get the feel of a parachute without making jumps from training towers or airplanes. Amateur parachutists will probably take to it as readily as they took to the Para-Sport, another Pioneer product, which is now widely used by sports clubs and is

Besides the tuition pupil from Bolton, there are only three tuition pupils scheduled for the Manchester school system for the 1962-63 school year, said Supt. Curtis. They include a Coventry student who will be a senior at Manchester High School and two South Windsor kindergarten pupils who will enter Bowers School on the proviso that there is space for them, he said.

Bolton's ninth grader will be refused permission to attend Manchester schools after the next school year, although his senior high school studies may study here until the school board notifies Bolton otherwise.

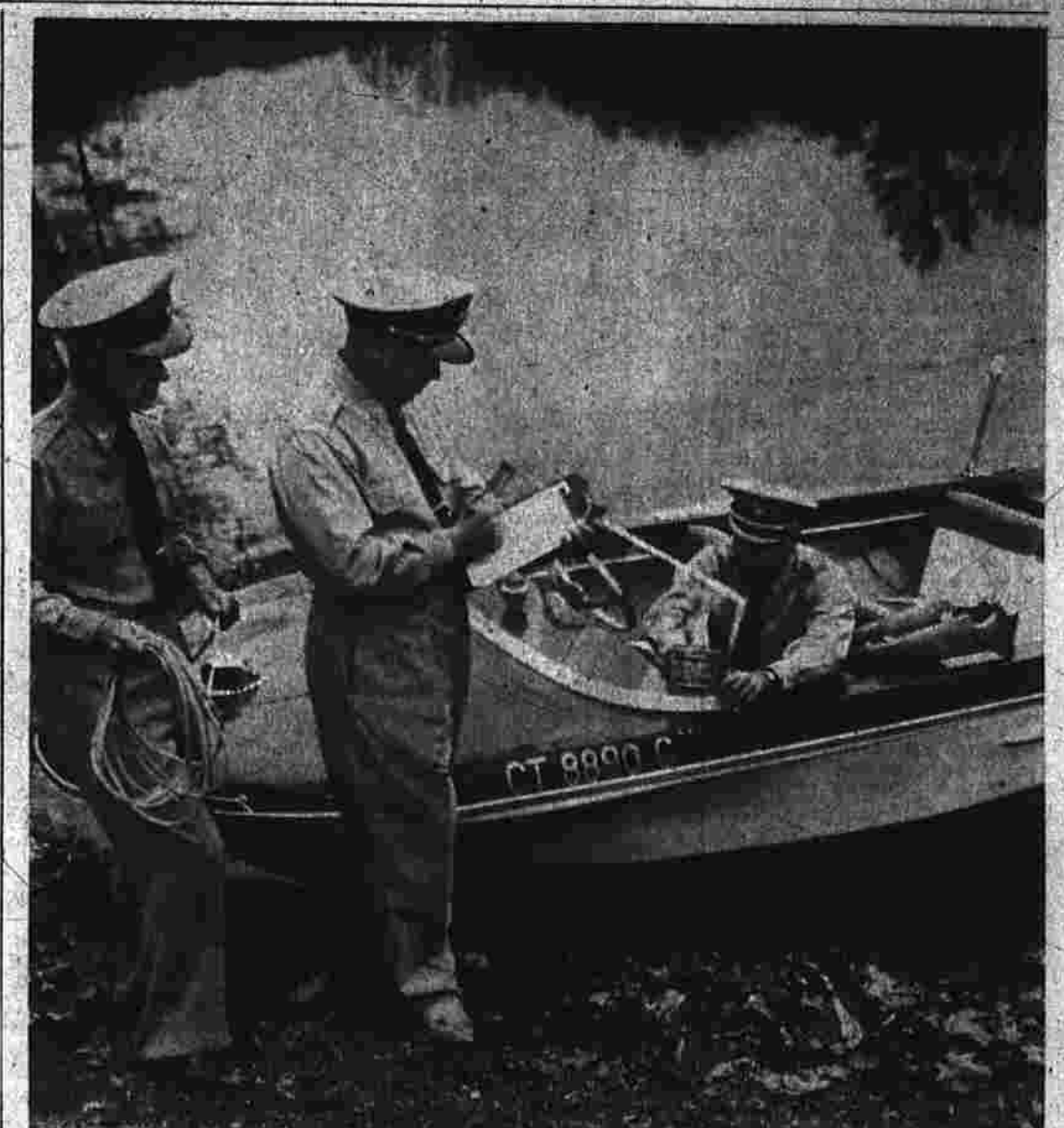

**Emphasis On Health**

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

A look at a special doctor with a small practice, a new technique for locating the heart and some summertime warnings are subjects with a focus on health.

Dr. Asboston

William Kennedy Douglas is a doctor. At the age of 30, he has only seven patients. But they are devotedly loyal patients.

Dr. Douglas is physician for the U.S. astronaut and an expert in the manned space flight program.

He studied John H. Glenn Jr., for the first flight of an American around the earth. He watched the health of astronaut Donald K. Slayton who missed his turn for the second orbital flight because of a heart beat irregularity.

And now he is reading Malcolm Scott Carpenter to take Slayton's place atop the huge Atlas rocket, for the second orbital attempt, perhaps this week.

Some of Dr. Douglas' guidelines for health and physical fitness are interesting. In an interview in the magazine "Medical World News," Dr. Douglas explained that he let the astronaut choose their own exercises.

"Carpenter likes working out in the gym; Slayton plays handball; Glenn is famous for his running," Dr. Douglas said.

"I think this is the best way to prescribe any regimen necessary for health. Let the patient choose, because if it is his own choice he does it with enthusiasm, and in the end benefits far more than he would by any other means," Dr. Douglas said.

Being doctor to space pioneers isn't all doctoring, by any means. Some of the new techniques from the astronaut's experiences.

For instance, Dr. Douglas explained in the article, it was the astronaut who came up with the perfect use of the stethoscope. The direction of gravity forces on the heart was involved in a miniature stethoscope inserted through the throat into the esophagus.

Now doctors can counter some of these symptoms with certain muscle relaxants. The relaxants don't counteract the venom, but they do help relieve the headache, nausea and vomiting, breathing troubles and some of the muscle problems.

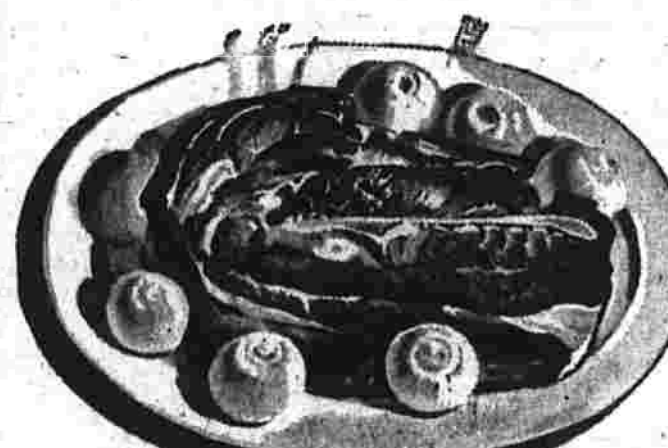
