And some surgical fees are steep enuff to in themselves kill the patient.

I have intentionally referred to surgery charges so in fairness I want to publicly admit that I have not received one complaint about the fees of either Dr. Caldwell Sr., or Dr. Caldwell Jr.

And dealing with such a delicate subject I would make it clear that my personal doctors are Dr. Friend, Dr. Barry and Dr. Zaglio. Apparently hearing that complaints about medical fees were being phoned to me two women took occasion to phone to say that Dr. Healy's fees took into consideration the ability of patients to pay. And I am not referring to a prolonged, complicated office visit.

Another situation, a custom throughout the country, is the insistence of the committing physician to make daily calls on patients after a surgeon has taken over. This has not been true in my local periods of hospitalization because I saked my regular doctor to call daily, but in another city when a surgeon was called in to take over and I asked the admitting doctor why he called daily he said: "We have a rule in our society for the admitting doctor to charge \$50 a weels for daily hospital visits even when a surgeon itakes over." whereupon I withdraw a \$50 bill from my wallet warming the continue once it is brought to their attention.
