

HARTFORD (AP)-Connecticut Republicans picked John Alsop as their candidate for governor early today after a 10hour fight and then met again to pick a nominee for U.S.

As they reconvened soon after noon, they heard a triumphant and hoarse Alsop accept their nomination and call them to unite for the November election which "the nation will be watching."

The 46-year-old insurance company president said Connecticut has a chance "to turn the tide" against an "administration that has come to believe that the answer to every problem is another government program, more federal spend ing, more power concentrated in the executive branch of the

Immediately after Alsop's speech, Convention Chairman J. Tyler Patterson announced that the convention would re-cess until 2 p.m. The delegates protested with shouts of "no! no!" clapping of hands and stamping of feet. Patterson re-mained firm, however.

Most of the delegates were in a rebellious mood because they had had to make an extra hard effort to be back in their seats after yesterday's exhausting session. They had hardly settled in their seats when they learned that thing ere going to be delayed for nearly two hours.

Alsop, brother of writers Stewart Alsop and Joseph Alsop iumphed by 20 votes over former State Chairman Edwin H fay Jr. on a breath-taking eighth ballot at 1:30 a.m. But May, 38-year-old former congressman, left the threat

But May, 38-year-old former congressman, left the threat of a primary hanging over the party. Under the state's pri-mary law, he can take a convention decision to the voters. He said he wanted to get some rest before announcing his decision. No statewide primary has ever been held under the 1955 law—and party leaders were holding their breaths. At first, six candidates were in the race to get the GOP nod to oppose Democratic Gov. John N. Dempsey, who is ex-nected to be pominated at his nexts's convention next month

The president Kennedy told Wast Point's newly commissioned offi-cers today they must be qualified not only to fight and win wars but also to deter conflict. Kennedy said at the U.S. Mill-tary Academy commencement that "basic problems facing the world are not susceptible of a mil-liary solution." In remarks prepared for the graduation of 601 cadets, the Pres-ident said U.S. forces must per-form more than military roles in their future assignments. He de-scribed these "as a complement
