### Rockville-Vernon Moffat Says 7 Interested In Filling Chamber Post

Five women and two men are interested in taking over the manager's job for the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce, chamber president John Moffat said yesterday.

Moffat, reporting to a board of directors, appointed a committee of four to recommend a new manager to take over the job in September.

Named to the committee are Ralph Gibson, chairman; Raymond Lavitt, Frank Gregory and Edward Zahner.

In discussing the hiring of a new manager to replace Mrs. Doris Thompson who resigned in December, Moffat said that the possibility of hiring a professional full time executive with a probable salary of \$7,500 a year.

The committee appeared to be, however, that the scope of the chamber's activities at this time did not justify such an executive.

Moffat indicated he hoped the new manager might be a woman and said candidates for the post would be required to have actual chamber experience to apply. The chamber is interested in receiving applicants with any sort of background in community experience, Moffat said.

Applicants are urged to direct their queries to the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce office, 22 Main St., Rockville.

Appointments to another committee, to make 10 nominations in preparation for electing six new directors for three-year terms, also were made at the directors' meeting.

Nominating committee appointments are Clifford Hawley, chairman, Ralph Wilson, Charles Johnson and Kenneth Howard.

The committee will make its report in August, and the six new directors will be elected by the chamber membership in September.

Later, the new board of directors will select those officers to be elected to the board to provide the board's full complement of 21 members. These three will serve one-year terms.

In other business, the directors noted the recent chamber barbecue had been a success, and decided to make changes in the date structure in the professional member category.

Moffat said that close to 2,300 people had attended the barbecue, including children.

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### Loser Threatens 'Stay-Home' Nixon Whips Shell, Gets 70% of Ballots

likely to be missing is that of Sen. Barry Goldwater, of Arizona, spokesman for party conservatives and chairman of the Republican National Committee. Nixon and Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, who won Republican renomination in a breeze, have made it clear they won't want Goldwater peddling his wares in California.

In abruptly conceding his defeat, Shell, an oil-well-farmer football star, gave some of the usual lip service to party unity.

Although he would have liked to run in November, he replied: "I support certain principles and I am not a one-loser and I hope I will be supported by my party. I will support those candidates who, both by his actions and his words, supports those principles that I have espoused."

This thinly veiled threat to lead a conservative stay-at-home movement in November was not lost on Nixon.

There is an almost unanimous agreement among California politicians that to win the governorship, Nixon must have the backing of 90 per cent of his own party's voters plus 25 per cent of Democrats. This formula would mean that Nixon would need the support of about seven million registered voters.

Although he denounced the John Birch Society and its aims, Nixon made every effort to ingratiate himself with the GOP conservatives while bidding for November support. Nixon's Democratic opponents, Shell neither actively sought nor did he court the support of the John Birch Society members, of course, could continue to regard Nixon as an enemy who had denounced them and their president. But their real voting strength was demonstrated as relatively unimportant when Shell ran far behind in the ballot count.

As a window of Tuesday, primary elections and nominating conventions for California's governor, Richard M. Nixon, vice president-elect Joseph C. Smith, and U.S. House members, the state's political scene was a busy one.

The energetic declarer goes right after his trump trump in today's hand. The odds are very good that he will lose a trump trick and go down one to another.

One way to lose a trump trick is to lead out the ace and king. Another way is to start with the king of trumps and then lead another trump toward dummy.

This should tell you how the trump is to be played. It is going to be a trick with the queen.

Any such line of play earns you one free crying towel, but the opponents score 100 points above the line.

The best play is to win the first trick with the king of diamonds. East captures dummy's king of spades and returns the ace of hearts to the eight of hearts. At worst, if West is out of diamonds, you will have a high trump in your hand. If you had taken the trump at once and passed wrong.

As it happens, West follows with a diamond, and you have not committed yourself on the play of the trump. Your object is to return a spade, preparing to ruff in the dummy. No matter what the opponents return, you can ruff a diamond in your own hand and a spade in dummy. Cash the top club, reducing to one club and three trumps in each hand.

Now give up the club trick. You are sure to win the last three tricks no matter how the trump break. The queen of hearts is sure to fall into your lap.

Partner opens with one heart, and the best player makes five. Hold: Spades—Q J 10 7; Hearts—10 8 7 6 5 4 3 2; Diamonds—Q J 10 7; Clubs—10 8 7 6 5 4 3 2. What do you say?

Answer: Pass. You would raise an opening bid of one spade, since

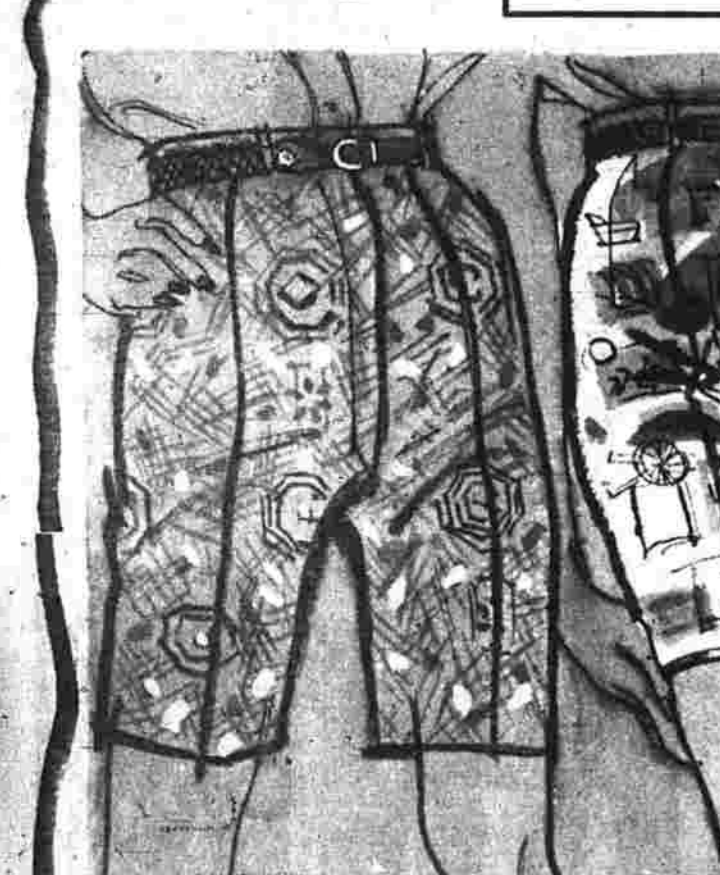

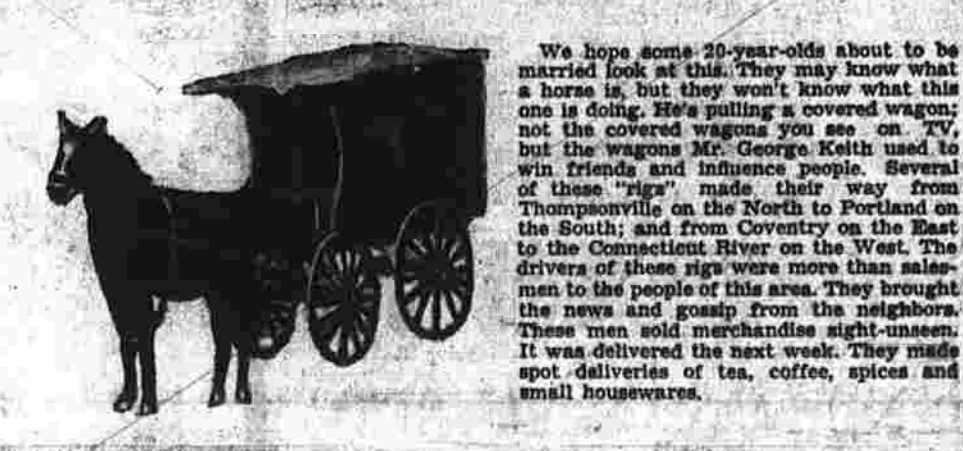

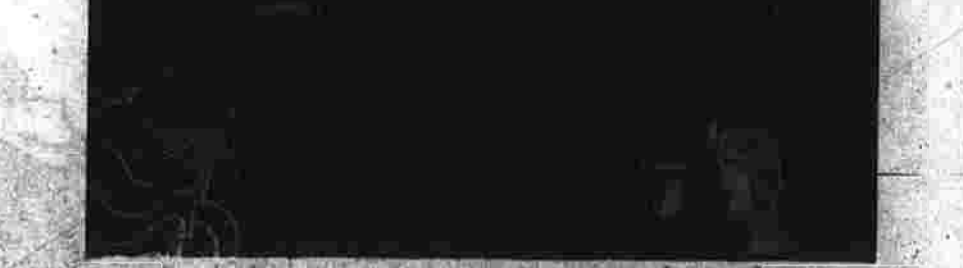

### Clinic Free, Board Votes Vaccine Fund

An appropriation of \$3,500 for the purchase of 18,000 doses of polio vaccine for the town's public clinic June 13 was approved last night by the board of directors.

At the same time, the board waived the charter requirement for competitive bidding for the purchase of the vaccine, so that the town Health Department could go ahead and buy the Babin Type 1 oral vaccine in time for the clinic next week.

The clinic, for which the state has provided 1,000 doses of the vaccine, will now be free.

Both the motion for appropriating the funds for the vaccine and the motion for waiving the competitive bidding were passed by unanimous vote by the board of directors.

School children will receive their polio immunization at the school, the 1961 figure is not yet available. Canadians have insurance worth \$44,807,000, or 173 percent of the national income. The United States ranked second and New Zealand third.

It declared allegiance to France and Algeria and an ardent desire to keep them forever united.

Garity said that the opinion is that the statute provides that regularly scheduled meetings "shall be open to the public"; 2) special meetings "shall be open to the public"; 3) subcommittee meetings are not required to be open to the public; and 4) executive sessions are not required to be open to the public or to the ex-officio members of the PBC, except when so noted by a majority of the members of such body present and voting. It is an ex-officio member of the PBC, serving as its adviser, added the PBC at its meeting Monday night to reach its decision on the matter. The ex-officio members from PBC executive sessions. Harold Pompidou, a board of education member who is also an ex-officio PBC member, objected to being excluded from executive sessions. PBC members said that Pompidou was not invited to attend an executive session to discuss PBC business, but that he was invited to attend every other executive session.

### Bolton Party Suit Ruled Out; Back in Court Today

The long-banging action yesterday and today, the Bolton Democratic party suit over misuse of town committee funds has been thrown out of court and back in court today.

Circuit Court Judge Harold M. Cicciotti ruled the plaintiffs yesterday that he had no jurisdiction over the four plaintiffs who claimed eight former town committee members misappropriated \$100 in July to wage a primary battle against town election.

Today, the court received from the plaintiffs a motion to set aside the verdict. The motion, signed by Atty. Leo B. Flaherty Jr., cites reasons behind the action and requests it be docketed for an early re-trial.

Court personnel were unable to make a date. Judge Cicciotti will have to notify the clerk when he will be available. He is sitting in the East Hartford court house.

In a memorandum of decision yesterday, Judge Cicciotti said there was no question that the defendants intended to use the money improperly. He added, however, that there was no evidence returned without having been properly used.

The amount involved was \$100. The suit was instituted Aug. 17 last year. The judge described it as an action primarily for an accounting. The word "accounting" has a flexible meaning, he said, and does not call for detailed information.

He said the combination of two plaintiffs' exhibits—a check book and a financial ledger—with a letter from Defense Atty. Harry Hammer to Flaherty, forms sufficient evidence that an accounting was rendered.

The plaintiffs contended during the three-session trial that the ledger contained information not in the check book. The letter from Hammer to Flaherty, Jan. 10, contained no mention of the \$100, they said. The town committee's check book contained no specific information other than a stub for the \$100 check. The ledger contained two entries, one for July 25 and the other, Aug. 24, the first noted a \$100 appropriation, the second a \$100 deposit in the committee treasury.

Both entries were listed as contributions.

The plaintiffs claimed \$350 damages. The order for non-suit has the effect of turning down the claim.

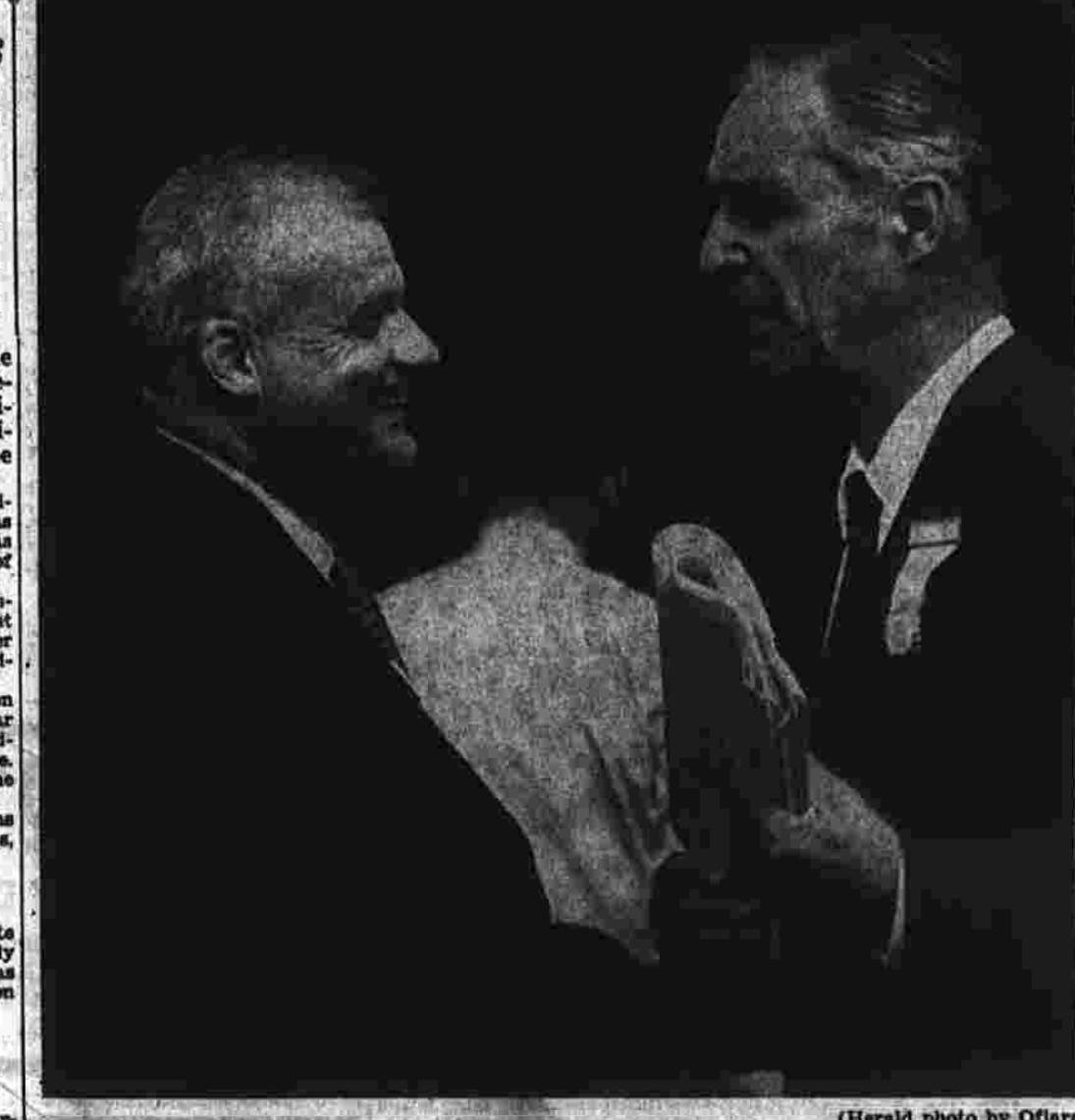
