Ver b'ue in color, it is probably 25,000 times fainter than the sun, and seems to be about 100 million ligh years distant. Reservoir Savings

The sun and evaporation steal precious water from reservoirs. But the loss can be cut as much as 50 per cent by placing a thin film of wax-like material, only one millionth of an inch thick, over the water, says Curtis Michel of Mo-lecular Technology, Inc., describng tests in Australia and the United States.
The film does not change the nor interfere with using the reservoir for recreation, and costs a few cents per thousands of gallons of water saved, he adds.






