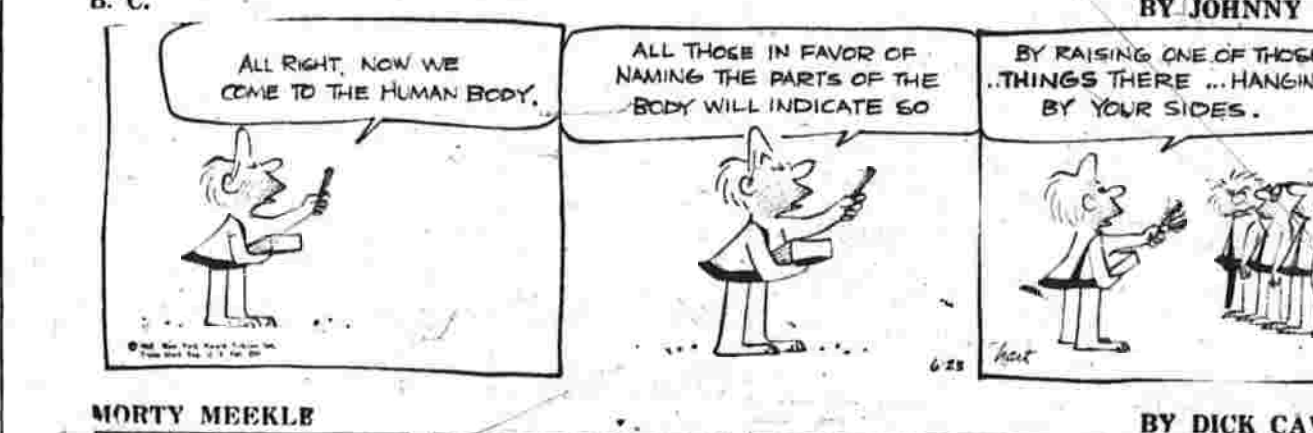
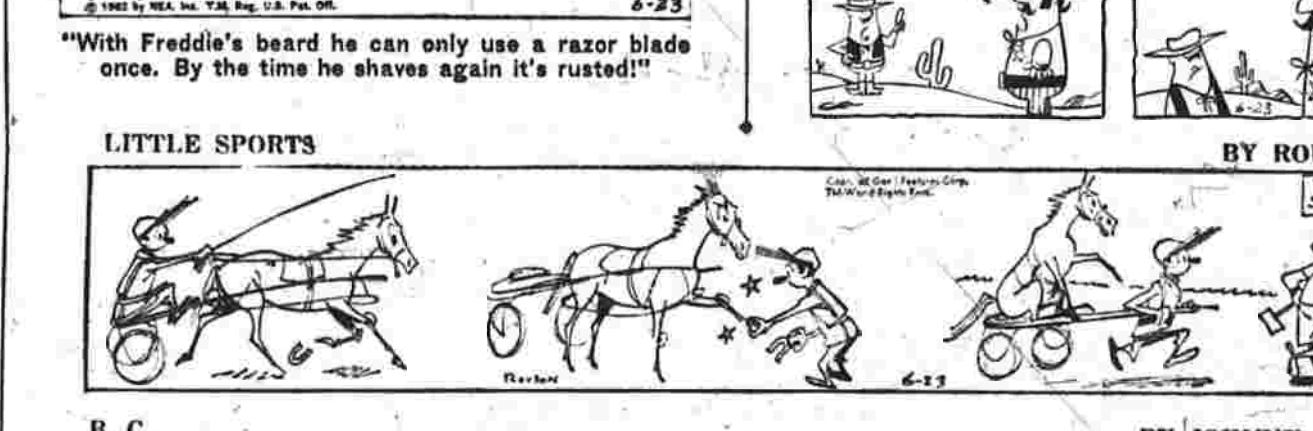
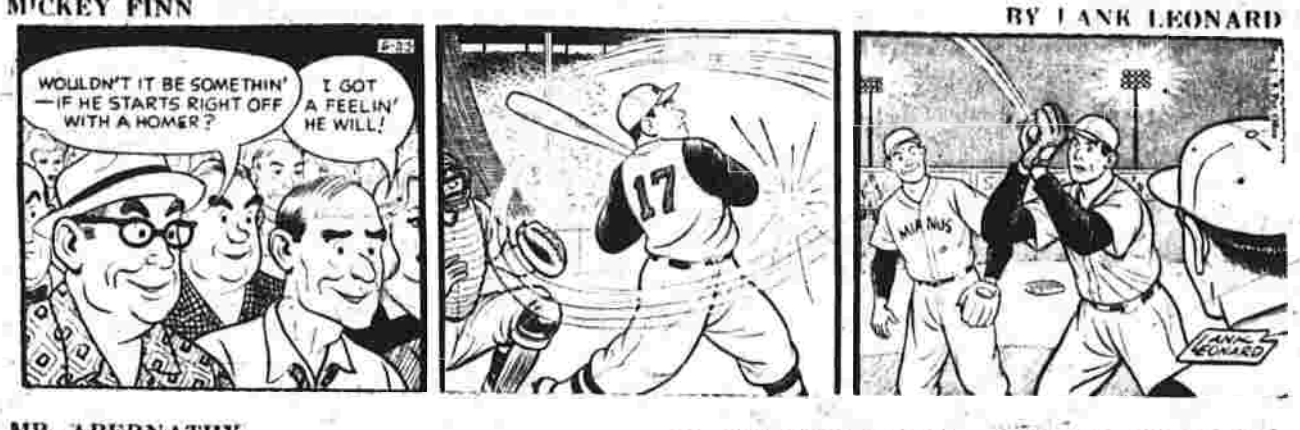

It's like a jury, and I sometimes wonder if they'll let the door open. TV Notebook

NEW YORK (NEA)—There was a scene on the special NBC program, Robert Ruark's Africa, which showed a small girl bringing a gourd of milk to her grandmother who had been sent out by her tribe to die. It was a touching, symbolic scene. It summed up an important message the program wanted to get across. But the scene was staged especially for the television cameras. Producer John J. Sughrus Jr. asks a pertinent question: "Why not?" "As a film man," Sughrus says, "I feel that news can be staged for the camera. That shot on the Ruark show was staged painstakingly. I had seen the actual thing happen, but it was at 6:30 in the morning and my crew wasn't available. "Why shouldn't I stage it later? The woman was actually the woman who had been left to die, and the little girl was actually her granddaughter. The thing happened just as we filmed it. As long as I was there to see that it was perfectly accurate, why not? It gave the impression I wanted to give." Sughrus believes the job of a television reporter should be to tell the film crew—the director and the cameramen—what to shoot. "Right today," he says, "you could have a great show about Algerian terror if you hired actors to stage scenes of terrorism. There are never cameras around to shoot these scenes. But every reporter in Algeria has seen them. Why not stage them—as long as the reporter who had seen the real thing was there to see that it was staged accurately."
