

His mother was ill in the hos-pital and, knowing her love of music, Vic asked his father to teach him "You're Driving Me Crasy." Accompanied by his father on the guitar, Vic serenaded his mother, who ascribed her recovery largely to this cheerful gesture. Damone, host of "The Lavely Ones," weekly summer musical color broadcast series starting on NBC-TV Thursday, July 36 (9:36-10 p.m. EDT), went on to sing la a church choir when he was nine years old. When a youngster hurled an epithet at him, Vic punched his tor-

epithet at him. Vic punched his tor-mentor in the nose and discovered that he could box, too. He started to divide his time betwen singing and boxing.

Vic found his way into show-business as an usher at the age of 14. When he was 16, he took pro-fessional singing lessons and performed at canteens for servicemen

formed at conteens for servicemen and at local church socials. In 1945 Damone auditioned for Arthur Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" show, where he met Milton Berle. Vie won the contest and Berle ar-ranged for an audition at New York's La Martinique, then a leading nightclub. Later that year, Vie landed his own sustaining program on a local New York radio station. At the end of 1945, Damone-starred with Stan Kenton's orches-tra at New York's Paramount Theater, where he once had been

Theater, where he once had been an usher. Vic was signed for his an usher. Vic was signed for his first commercial show in 1947 on which he starred for two years. During this period he also ap-peared at the Copacabara, the Riviera and the Roxy and Para-mount Theaters. He starred with the Guy Lombardo orchestra at the Waldorf-Astoria in 1950.

He made his Hollywood night-club debut at the Modambo and was signed by producer Joe Pas-ternak for M-G-M, where he made four pictures: "Rich, Young and Pretty," "Athena," "Hit the Deck" and "Kismat"

Pretty." "Athena," "Hit the Deck" and "Kismet." He enlisted in the Army in 1951 and, following his discharge in 1953, landed the role of a GI in the Allied Artists war film, "Hell to Eternity," which earned him the starring role in "Some Like It Hot," a pilot for a TV series. Damone lives in a hillside home overlooking Los Angeles. He re-laxes on the golf links.
