"Song and Choir" Commemorative

The German Federal Republic has issued (July 12) a new commemorative devoted to "Song and Choir." The timing of this new issue coincides with the summer music festivals which are held throughout West Germany each year. It also celebrates the many outstanding choral compositions which Germans have contributed to the world.

Bars of music and a tuning fork were the design of the stamp. The music selected is from the Duet "Julius, a portion of Missa Simile which comprises 16 volumes—by Michael Praetorius (1571-1621), a famous German musical historian, theorist and composer.

The new 20-cent stamp was designed in red and black by Walter Brecht of West Germany. The German State Printing Office in Berlin will print this issue in sheets of 50, containing 10 stamps watermarked DRG. The stamps are in 2-1/2x3-1/2 inch. It will be on sale in West Germany until Dec. 31.

NEW YORK (AP)—One way to make money on the stock market is to sell your stock when it is still fairly high priced and buy it back at a lower price. That way you keep your portfolio intact and have some cash on the side at a lower price later to replace the shares you borrowed from your broker, and pocketing the profit. That's called short selling.

And right now there's more stock sold short than at any time since September 1958. And brokers say there apparently also has been a lot of selling of stock actually owned with the aim of replacing it at a lower price.

Doesn't Always Work

While covering such a market is making money—as with many other schemes—does not always work. It is that it doesn't always work.

The price of the stock sold, either your own or borrowed, may go up instead of down. Then you're out of pocket. And if the market rebound is vigorous, you may be out a lot of money.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration scheduled two Mariner landings at this time to take advantage of a 30-day period when Venus and Earth are in favorable positions for such landings. It will be 1964 before the bright planet again is available.

Mariner's course is a tricky one. To achieve success thousands of complex parts must work in unison, and the radio transmitter must relay signals back from a record distance. The present space relay record is 22.8 million miles set by America's Pioneer V Russia launched the only previous Venus probe but lost radio contact with it a few million miles from Earth. Tracking data showed it came within 27,000 miles of Venus, but it produced no information.

A complicated system of earth and sun sensors, gas jets, gyroscopes and radio antennae at Mariner 1 to its intended December rendezvous.

Scientists will be able to translate these radio signals into concrete information about some of the secrets masked by Venus' cloud layers.

The signals may reveal whether Venus has a magnetic field, a Van Allen type radiation belt, the range of temperatures on the surface and the varied atmosphere, how fast the planet rotates and other answers long sought by scientists.

Scientists believe plant and animal life as we know it does not exist on Venus because of steaming temperatures which reach 800 degrees Fahrenheit.

Despite her cloud veil, Venus is the third brightest object in the Earth's sky, dimmer only than the sun and moon. The planet's brilliance when she appeared as the morning and evening stars prompted ancient Roman astronomers to name her for their goddess of love and beauty.

McNamara's official statement that accompanied the department's announcement was reserved. He said the test showed that the program is intended to present the "capabilities and limitations of antismissile systems."

Then he turned to the topic of ICBM development, saying that the United States is carrying on a program "to insure that our missile systems which might be encountered" and that there are continuing through any antismissile systems developed by anyone.

McNamara had gone on record about the Zeus tests last January during testimony before the Senate Armed Services Committee. He said then, "I think we can almost guarantee the success of our Kwajalein tests scheduled for this year because it is such a simple test. Possibly we will have mechanical failures because the equipment is still in the design stage but those are types of failures we can correct rather quickly."

"Because of the serious questions as to the practicality of the Nike Zeus system, we are not recommending funds for its procurement and deployment at this time, but we are requesting the maximum amount of funds which we can get for the research and development program to continue development of testing on a top priority basis."

Behind McNamara's reference to these being simple tests appeared to be several points:

1. At least the first part of the test series involves only the trials of one Zeus missile against one target. The Atlas missiles fired by the Air Force in these opening tests of the series do not have the decoys that would be released along with an actual warhead under combat conditions.
2. The ability to discriminate, by radar, between the real warhead and the false decoy targets is vital to an antismissile system.
3. The confidence that McNamara expresses in the capability of U.S. ICBM to penetrate enemy antismissile defenses is based, to considerable degree, on the decoy devices.
4. Neither the Zeus nor the Atlas used in Thursday's test carried a nuclear warhead. 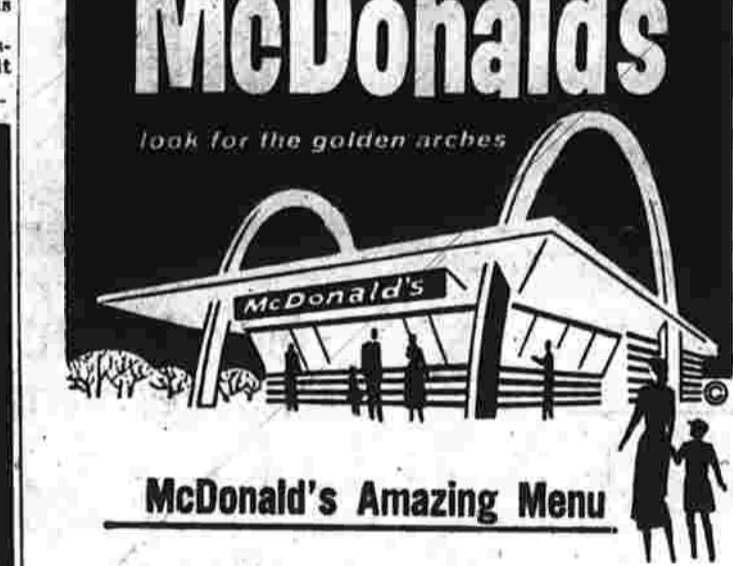

Negroes Ready Major Protest In Albany, Ga.

(Continued from Page One) with 40 per cent Negroes, Negro leaders reporting earlier to bring the fight before the United Nations. An official of the Albany movement also was reported preparing to hold a news conference in London early next week. There were no other details. Joining the integration drive today was the Rev. Glenn Smiley of Nyack, N.Y., national field secretary for the Fellowship of Reconciliation. Smiley said his religious organization had been active in nonviolent movements throughout the nation, including Little Rock, Nashville, Montgomery and Birmingham. Fuller, Chief Laurie Pritchett kept Albany policemen on the alert, lodging them in hotels so they will be quickly available in case of trouble. A contingent of the Albany Home Guard was kept on alert. Most of the anti-segregation demonstrations were held by young teenagers. Dr. W. C. Anderson, president of the Albany Negro movement, was given time by the Albany television station (WALB-TV) Thursday night to reply to a speech over the station earlier this week by James H. Gray, publisher of the Albany Herald and owner of the TV station. He denied Gray's charges that the anti-segregation movement was directed by outside agitators. He said it was local in origin and he praised King and other integrationists for joining in the effort. Anderson said the Albany movement was started to meet the need for opportunity for Negroes. He said repeated attempts to negotiate racial differences with city officials have failed. WASHINGTON (AP) — "That is nearly tragic," the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. said. And, he contends, the beauty of the nonviolent movement against segregation in America is that it is founded on love. He said the Atlanta minister and civil rights leader expounded on non-violent civil disobedience Tuesday to a hushed audience at the National Press Club. The newsmen gave a standing ovation to the first speaker, who appeared before the club. King said nonviolent resistance is a way of disrupting the system. It exposes his moral defenses. It weakens the moral at the same time it works on his conscience. He concluded that he and his followers have broken laws in their fight against segregation in the South. But moral persons have a duty to violate unjust laws, and then pay the penalty, he said. "What was more in line with civil disobedience than the Boston Tea Party?" he asked. As examples of nonviolent civil disobedience, he listed sit-ins at lunch counters, attempts to enter segregated libraries, and efforts to integrate segregated transportation terminals and bathing facilities. These tactics are defeating segregation, King claimed. "The old South has gone, never to return again," he said.

Rockville-Vernon Fire Destroys \$2,000 Barn, Singes Shed

The junta has scheduled new elections for next June. But speculation arose in and out of government quarters that the junta might install a civilian president to give Peru at least the facade of constitutional rule. The favor. His retired Gen. Manuel Odría, who finished third in the presidential election and then made a coalition alliance with Haya before the military coup nullified it. Odría surprised Lima by driving through the streets Thursday night. He had been reported arrested. Fernando Belandier Terry, running mate of the presidential candidate for the leftist Popular Action Party, also was reported arrested. Haya's whereabouts remained a mystery. He has been reported as having taken refuge in the Venezuelan embassy and has been refused to nullify the national elections in a maneuver north of Lima. Several Latin American nations indicated they will continue their military relations, at least for now. U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk said it will maintain relations as long as the junta maintains internal order and respects international agreements. The junta deplored Prado as having taken refuge in the Venezuelan embassy and has been refused to nullify the national elections in a maneuver north of Lima.
