Town Inactive on Offer For Purchase of Golf Links

What is being done about the Manchester Country Club's offer of \$200,000 to the town for 145 acres in the Globe Hollow tract? Nothing.

May 22 the club offered \$200,000 to buy three parcels of land amounting to 145 acres in the town-owned Globe Hollow tract. The club also offered to construct three golf holes for the town for free, so that the town would have its own nine-hole course made of the three new holes and six holes the club would abandon.

Purchase of the land would give the club 18 holes on the east side of the street. It would also enable the club to become a private organization, and this is part of the reason there is controversy over the proposed sale.

However, the general manager said earlier this week he does not know whether he will give a report to the board of directors at the Aug. 7 meeting.

Democratic Director Francis Mahoney said he believed the matter was being "hushed up" by the Republicans.

Marjorie Lord

Her Fan Mail Ranges From Witty to Pathetic

If she ever gets tired of acting—a highly unlikely happening—Marjorie Lord can remove her stage makeup, sharpen a few pencils, sit down at a typewriter and begin a second career.

The flame-haired female star of the CBS-TV "The Danny Thomas Show" could, without any difficulty, join the imposing ranks of those enterprising women who offer beauty suggestions, advice to the lovelorn and etiquette tips to the millions who begin their letters with "I have a problem."

Miss Lord has discovered that during the time she has been playing Danny Thomas' television wife on the popular comedy series due back in the fall, she has become a consultant, advisor and mother confessor to scores of fans as well as her fellow workers.

Producer Sheldon Leonard adds, "The suggestion 'Why don't you ask Marjorie' is heard on the set more times than 'cut' or 'places please'."

When she is not graciously playing "Dear Abby" or "Emily Post" to a co-worker, Miss Lord spends her time answering what must be the most unusual fan mail in the entertainment business.

"Most letters begin with the person telling us they liked the show or something I said or did," she smiles. "Then half way down the page they start a sentence with 'I wonder if you can help me with this problem I have' and then go on and explain their difficulty."

Miss Lord, who has lost count of the letters of this type she has received, answers them all personally. They range, she adds, from being very amusing to the pathetic. She wonders why she has been selected by thousands of people she has never seen to divulge their problems to and seek advice.

Danny Thomas thinks he has the answer.

"Marjorie's a warm, witty person as my wife in the show and in her own life. She's a kind, thoughtful lady—and I stress that word. She knows kids because she has two of her own at home and two in the show. She's as happy eating a box lunch back stage or being the hostess at a black tie dinner for 12. She gets a kick out of life, but knows what those big black headlines mean. She's a woman with responsibilities to others... and she lives up to them."

On the show, Miss Lord as "Kathy Williams," is the video mother to Rusty Hamer and Angela Cartwright. In real life, as Mrs. Randolph Hale, her offspring are two teen-agers Greg and Ann. She finds there is very little dif-

ference between the four youngsters.

"Teen-agers are pretty much all the same," she believes. "I don't care where they live or if they are rich or poor. They are not afraid of their parents as many people think or would like to think. They are afraid of discipline, that's all. There's something about the kids of today... something in them that makes them resent authority."

Miss Lord feels parents should let children express themselves, but not at the expense of sparing the rod. She feels girls are more independent, intelligent and self-reliant than boys—but adds she may be prejudiced "since I'm one of them."

That Miss Lord is a female—a very attractive one at that—is no secret. A San Francisco-born beauty with brown eyes, she stands just two inches over five feet and weighs a trim 112 pounds.

"I am above all things an actress," she states. "That means, I guess, I will appear before the public in any medium for money. It sounds simple but winds up complicated. Acting is a lot harder than it looks."

Miss Lord had a slight idea about the hardships of the theatre as a profession when she started her career. "I wanted to be in the theatre more than anything," she states. "I took ballet lessons for five straight years when I was a child and also took dramatic lessons. I didn't know whether I was going to be a dancer or an actress, but I was going to be prepared. That I was sure of."

In her late teens she worked the summer theatre circuit theatre circuit during holidays from the exclusive Sarah Dix Hamlin Finishing School in the Bay City. When her family moved to New York, Miss Lord decided dancing was out and concentrated on acting. From bit roles on Broadway she moved up to bigger things and finally won extremely favorable notices for her performance opposite Dame Judith Anderson in "The Old Maid."

She appeared in several other Broadway shows and then toured with Edward Everett Horton in his



long-run "Springtime for Henry." The movies beckoned and she appeared in such films as "Moon in Miami" and "Flesh and Fantasy." But she frankly admits she was not a whopping success in pictures. "I made a comfortable living," she says, "but nobody ever said they needed me for such and such a role to avert box office disaster."

I was an actress who could be counted on to do the part in a professional manner. I played a great variety of roles, so I guess someone had faith in me."

On television, Miss Lord admits she is more relaxed—especially in Danny Thomas series which she describes as "just an ordinary husband and wife and children in action... with a couple of million people looking on."

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Television and Hollywood movies need "a great big infusion of glamour."

Betty Furness, the one-time movie glamour girl, said it as she theorized that "audiences want their feminine stars far away, unreal and certainly not just like neighbors."

It is also Betty's theory that "the bottom fell out of the Hollywood glamour market when Joan Crawford invited her hairdresser home to dinner and Barbara Stanwyck compounded the mistake by telling people that her secretary was one of her best friends."

Betty is so right about movie audiences wanting their stars "far away" and "unreal." But there's little hope for glamour on television.

When Hollywood movies lost their glamour queens, foreign sexpots like Brigitte Bardot, Gina Lollobrigida, Sophia Loren, Anita Ekberg, Melina Mercouri and Nancy Kwan replaced them. These dolls are not only "far away," literally, but just about as "unreal" as you can get. None of them would be caught dining with their hairdressers or saying "palsy" to their secretaries.

In fits of temper, they throw things at their hairdressers and their secretaries — and that's how moviegoers have always liked 'em.

In television, it is all Madison Avenue's fault for glorifying nice, middle-class normal housewife types because of sponsor identification. There must be "image" in the sales pitch. Television sells everything from breakfast foods to bras to nice, middle-class normal housewives — and television stars nice, middle-class normal housewives.

Marilyn Monroe (and she could use the work) in a show sponsored by a breakfast food would upset the whole corporate "image." Who could imagine Marilyn dotting on those health foods? No one. They prefer to visualize her gulping down champagne or a Bloody Mary for breakfast.

So television employs rubber-faced Lucille Ball, Shirley Booth, Loretta Young and Marjorie Lord as the middle-aged "queens" of the "image" soap opera circuit. A

NEW YORK (NEA) — Audrey Meadows finds that people are surprised when she tells them that "A Touch of Mink" is the first movie she ever made. It is not. It won't be the last.
The glamorous red-head (people are also surprised to learn from the color film that she is a red-head) has decided that there will be more movies in her future. Movie-making fits her private life better than the stage or a television series.
You might also be surprised at some other things about Miss Meadows, particularly her psychic sensitivity. She had recently had a frightening experience, which made her recall several other incidents.
In this latest manifestation, she was lying in bed in that foggy state of being half-awake, half-asleep. She and her husband, airline magnate Robert Six, were planning to visit his sick uncle. As she lay there, she became aware of a smoky figure standing in the room.
"I blinked my eyes, to make it go away," she says, "but it just stood there. It wasn't looking at me at all. I was only semi-conscious, but I tried to force myself awake so I could make out what it was."
Suddenly the thought flashed through her mind that she would never see her husband's uncle alive again. The figure turned to her and nodded.
"Later," she says, "we found out that Bob's uncle had died that same night I had the dream."
This was not her first such experience. Her mother had had several, too, and Audrey thinks she inherited the talent, or whatever you call it.
Perhaps her most convincing story deals with her wartime experiences while singing with a USO unit in the Philippines. Audrey had contracted malaria and was down to a skinny 90 pounds. The Army had arranged to fly her home. Transportation was due in a few days and, in the meantime, arrangements were made to send her by air to another island where there was a rest camp.
"The night before we were to take off," she says, "I was in my tent in that same half-awake, half-asleep state. Suddenly, my eyes focused on the top of the tent. There I saw some huge block letters, suspended in mid-air. They read: 'Don't Go.'"
In the morning Audrey backed out saying that she was afraid if she went she might miss the transportation back home. Three days later, she found out the plane she was to have taken was missing. She says it has never been found to this day.
There have been other incidents. When she was in summer stock, she once rented a room and every night, somebody closed the windows. At first, she thought the landlady had tipped in and shut them. She set objects in front of the door so the landlady couldn't get in, but still the windows were shut in the morning.
Finally, she decided that it must be the spirit of the landlady's son, who died in that room. When she mentioned this to the landlady, the woman fearfully agreed she, too, had felt the spirit and welcomed corroboration. Audrey says she continued to live in the room: "Obviously the boy didn't mean harm to anyone."
She's dreamed entire events, which later happened down to the smallest detail. Just a few weeks ago, she was troubled by a decorating problem on the house she and her husband are building in California. She dreamed the solution — in color.
