UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Hope faded today for agreement on toly legal questions confronting the 25-nation U.N. committee on peaceful uses of outer space. The committee convened Monday to prepare a report to the U.N. General Assembly on the work accomplished by experts in Geneva during the summer. The assembly opens next Tuesday. Agreement was reached on reports of the scientific and technical subcommittees in Geneva which recommended among other things the establishment of an international test rocket base on the geomagnetic equator under U.N. sponsorship.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced today that a department official demoted in connection with the Billie Sol Estes, grain storage, operations has been restored to his post. The official is Carl E. ### New Vehicle Rides On Cushion of Air

RHYL, WALES (AP)—From the time it looked like a distorted airliner, which too wide for its length.

Twenty-four passengers sat in four rows of six, all plainly unfazed from takeoff nerves.

The steward's voice came from the speaker system: "Welcome aboard the world's first hovercraft service. In a few moments we shall be leaving for Wallasey. Your driver is Capt. Colquhoun."

The engines revved up and the hick on the beach wavered. It wasn't raining but Lee Colquhoun, 42, first pilot and former Royal Air Force base, switched on his windshield wipers.

He eased back the yellow throttle handle. The hovercraft, an early racing beetle contending for a transport revolution, lifted its 10 tons off the sand and sailed over the waves toward the sea.

8 Inches Above Land

The hovercraft was the V.A.3, one of a dozen under development here. It rides eight inches above land or sea on a cushion of air produced by two gas turbine engines. Two more engines drive rear-mounted propellers to move it forward.

Another, and more difficult, is how to increase operating height and make it variable.

One is this: How do you prevent the craft from a viciously corrosive spray of salt water, and sand?

The hovercraft is a ship, an aircraft or what?

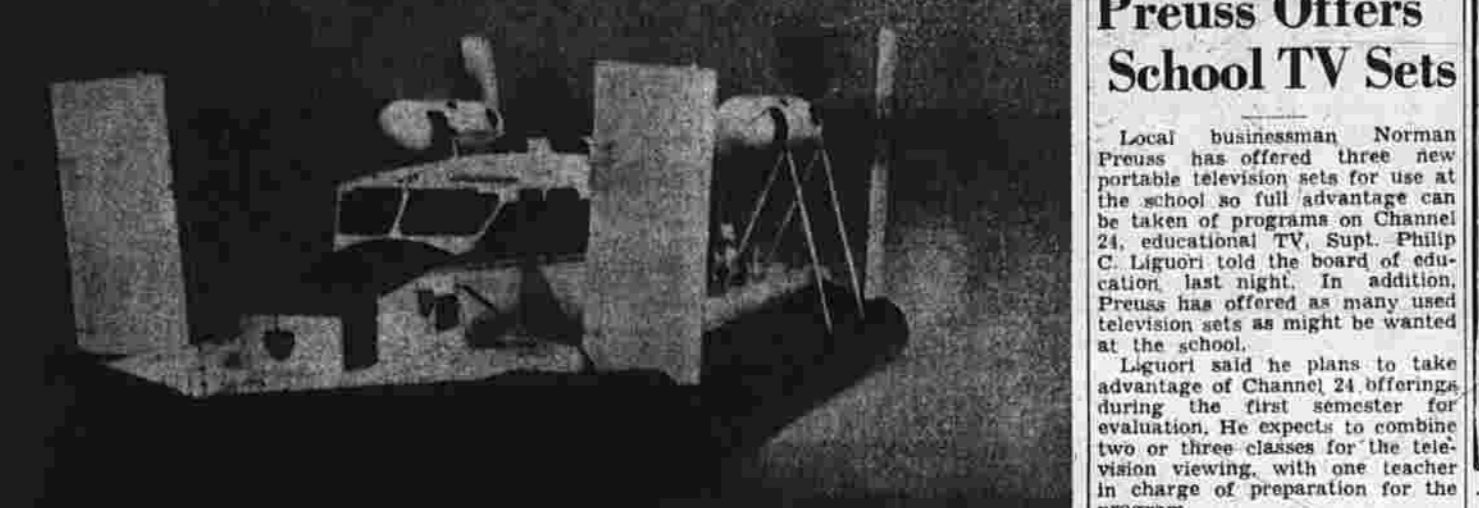

Dunmer, formerly director of marketing of the Wolverine Tube Division of Calumet and Hecla; and Alfred C. Dappert, vice president for sales of Mueller.

### Preuss Offers School TV Sets

Local businessman Norman Preuss offered three new portable television sets for use at the school as full advantage can be taken of programs on Channel 21, educational TV, Supt. Philip C. Liguori told the board of education last night. In addition, Preuss has offered to make available television sets as might be wanted at the school.

Liguori said he plans to take advantage of Channel 21 offerings during the first semester for evaluation. He expects to combine two or three classes for the television viewing, with one teacher in charge of preparation for the program.

Liguori also reported that a committee headed by Preuss is interested in the formation of a marching band, and promises financial support in obtaining instruments for the school. Mrs. Clara Smith, music supervisor, plans to confer today with Manchester music teachers to learn what it does there in instrumental teaching. It is planned to have as many pupils in Grades 4 through 8 take instrumental music as are interested.

Grade 8 pupils will be offered algebra this year if they are ready for it, Liguori said. Diagnostic tests are now being given to the pupils in course in research and library science is also being offered. In cooperation with teachers, it is hoped to tie this in with English classes as all written reports will be required to follow a standard form in preparation for high school and college work.

Three student teachers from William State College will start training at the school today. One will be with Mrs. Gloria Finegan in kindergarten, one with Mrs. Helen Barton in Grade 6 and one with Mrs. Elizabeth Wright in Grade 8.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—Widespread popularity of stock ownership among Americans—either as individuals or collectively through mutual funds of pension funds—can in itself have been a factor in the sharp ups and downs in stock prices that has confounded many of the new owners.

How big a factor was argued with the help of aide ratios, at one of the meetings here of the American Statistical Association.

The large inflow of individual savings into the funds and then into the markets helped boost prices, some economists hold. And then this year switching of issues has added to the unsettled market.

**New Look in Market**  
Statisticians say that the buying and selling policies of the mutual funds, and even more of the pension funds, are giving the market a new look. Part of the fund-

buying of stocks was compulsive, they hold, because the funds themselves were growing so fast and had to put money to work.

Mutual fund managers stoutly rejected any implication that the operation of the funds hasn't been to the best interest of their shareholders, or that their stock market activities caused the price breaks in May and June or the dividing of the market in recent days.

Contending that mutual fund purchases significantly affected price movements of individual stocks is Douglas Vickers, one of the University of Pennsylvania professors who worked on the controversial Wharton School survey of mutual fund performances for the Securities & Exchange Commission.

Even more influential is stock buying by the pension funds, says Vito Natrella, assistant director of the SEC division of trading and exchanges.

Affects New Issues  
And the flow of mutual and pension fund money into the stock market also has affected flotation of new issues of stocks and bonds, both hold. When the funds support prices on the market by their purchases, they say, a group of buying of new issues has followed.

When the funds sell, offerings dwindle.

Vickers says funds tend to buy on balance prior to upswings and to sell on balance prior to downswings. Since this is what investors in mutual funds expect from expert management, they can't quarrel with that.

But Vickers' contention is that such buying or selling seems to have contributed to the changes, whether up or down. So the growing holdings of common stocks by the funds in recent years has added another and important factor to the many that the individual investor must take into account when assessing his own portfolio.

Natrella says the pension funds are really the most influential institutional group in the stock market, since they have been growing spectacularly since 1950 and are putting more than half of their new receipts into common stocks. Such purchases increased a bit in the first half of this year despite the falling of the market.

Creates This Market  
The pension fund money flows into stock more regularly than do the mutual funds, Natrella says. Since they often concentrate on the popular issues, their hold-

ings tend to cut the floating supply of those stocks. The resultant thin market is credited with causing some of the wide swings in prices that have characterized the market in recent months.

Both Vickers' and Natrella's views are based on statistics and nothing more—no accounts, no recommendations.

But the validity of the findings may be disputed and any implications challenged by the fund-depositors for the savings of millions of Americans.

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### Sen. Goldwater For Blockade, Hits at Callup

MANCHESTER SESSION — Two members of the Senate were found not guilty to companion larceny counts following a court trial this morning in which they represented themselves.

Goldwater told a newsmen he does not see any valid reason for the President's asking for standby power to call up 150,000 military reserves.

The Arizona senator said President Kennedy would have been better off by asking for authority for an unlimited callup.

"I can't imagine that 150,000 men are going to scare the hell out of Soviet Premier Khrushchev," said Goldwater.

He said he had asked for authority to call up half a million men from the reserves, but that would have had a psychological or diplomatic effect, Goldwater added.

Goldwater said there is apprehension through the country as to what will happen if Cuba is used as an arms warehouse to supply Communist in Latin American countries and isolate America.

He said there is only one way in which such a situation could come "and that is for the United States to build up a strong front area of troops."

Peace can be maintained only by the nation's demonstrating to Khrushchev that it is not going to be pushed around by a Communist who should be equipped to do so.

"We should tell him in no uncertain terms: You stop it or we're going to stop you from bringing it on."

And Sattl, in his statement, described the decision to get doctors active in for the medical profession "to protect itself from the proposals of government-controlled medicine."

No action on candidates has been taken because interviews with four seeking federal offices have not yet been conducted by COMPAC doctors' teams.

Those who still have to be investigated before the COMPAC directors meet again to make a decision on preferences are Congressman Emilio Q. Daddario (D-Hartford), First District incumbent; Rep. John S. Monagan (D-Waterbury), Fifth District en-

### South Windsor Education Report Stresses Curriculum Guides in Math

The development of curriculum guides with special emphasis on mathematics will receive major attention by the administrative staff of the South Windsor school district this coming year, according to Superintendent Merle B. Woodman's annual report to the board of education. Guides are being prepared in the various areas of study to meet the changing needs of students.

Last year, suggested curricula were issued on physical education, art and music. This year, the teachers in the schools are following these guides, adding to them from their own particular fund of knowledge. It was decided to concentrate on mathematics this year as some study had been done in this subject last year.

Other matters receiving the attention of the superintendent's office, noted in the annual report, will be a study and evaluation of educationally exceptional children (mentally retarded, physically handicapped), a study of the need for a program of adult education, a study of school drop-outs, improvement of classroom work, improvement of the teacher recruitment program, and improvement of the teacher recruitment program.

Woodman also noted the completion of South Windsor High School which will provide students with better educational facilities. Plans for new elementary schools and a new junior high school show that an evaluation of the school system needs to be made. The appointment of an assistant superintendent to deal with the curriculum studies. The increase in the town's population indicates that the town, as well as the schools, must provide special educational services that have not been given previously.

The school system has expanded again this past year, in the number of pupils enrolled, the number of classrooms in use, and the number of teachers, classroom and special employed. Nineteen new classrooms have been added in each year of the past two years, but the average number of pupils per teacher has remained at 27.

Among the accomplishments noted in the report for the past year is the initiation of a recruitment program for teachers. To affect this program the elementary principals were assigned to visit the teacher training institutions and colleges in the New England states. The number of applications received because of this recruitment program was about 75, representing about half of the total received from all sources. Thirty-three elementary teachers and six high school teachers were appointed from this program.

Fourteen students were enrolled in technical schools. Two students were enrolled in the vocational-agricultural course at Rockville High School. Four children were placed in special classes in Rockville and East Hartford. Next year an evaluation will be made of all pupils in Grades 2 to 6 who have intelligent quotients of 75 or less who have two years or more below standard on an achievement test. Last year it was found that eight pupils had intelligence quotients below 75. Special attention was also given to pupils in need of speech therapy.

The financial report included in the superintendent's report showed that the board's appropriation was able to return \$17,374.45 to the town.

**Other Business**  
The board voted to accept from the Public Building Commission the South Windsor High School as substantially complete on the understanding that the board was advised by the commission that this acceptance in no way affected its legal rights. The board still expects the satisfactory completion of checklist items and compliance with its specifications as to the finishing of the building.

The only reason, the board stressed, that this acceptance was voted as early was so that immediate application could be made for the state grant, saving the interest on borrowed monies.

The Legate Insurance Agency of New Britain, agent for Connecticut Mutual, was awarded the accident insurance policy for the school. The policy will go into effect Oct. 1.

In outlining considerations for study and planning for the change to the 6-3-3 system, Superintendent Woodman suggested considering what the program will include, "making" typing, the size of the building to house this program and whether the town will have eventually, one or two junior high schools.

Miss Josephine Zocco has been appointed a remedial reading teacher to replace Miss Hilda Monaghan, who was appointed principal of the Pleasant Valley Elementary School. Miss Zocco has been a Grade 1 teacher for the past four years in the Pleasant Valley School.

Mrs. Evelyn Pope was appointed to teach Grade 1 at the school, replacing Miss Zocco. Mrs. Dora Friedman will teach the Grade 4 at Pleasant Valley. Mrs. Dora Eggen will teach the Grade 2 at that school. Albert Koroniaman will teach art at Wapping Elementary School. Robert LaRoche has been appointed as mathematics teacher in the high school, and will assist in coaching soccer and basketball, and will coach track. Mrs. Zilpah Mitchell will be librarian at the high school.

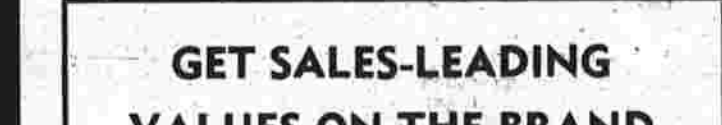

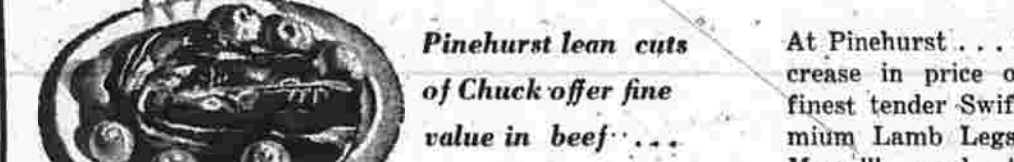

Not 'Justified' Now Kennedy Bars Action on Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy says U.S. military action against Cuba is not now "required or justified."

But he told his news conference Thursday that if the United States should ever have to take action, "all of Castro's unimpaired weapons and technicians would not change the result or significantly extend the time required to achieve the result."

At the same time, the President admonished critics urging the administration to use military force against the Communist outpost.

He said he finds it "regrettable that those who urge such action give a false picture of the Communist position."

Brazil's Premier Resigns; Sought Power for Goulart

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP)—Prime Minister Francisco Brochado Da Rocha and his cabinet resigned today after failing to get a wrangling congress to approve a referendum to give full executive power to President Joao Goulart.

The cabinet's resignation roused fears the military might step in, abolish congress and turn over full power to Goulart.

Brochado Da Rocha told the Chamber of Deputies he was resigning after two months because the conservative bloc in congress had stubbornly resisted his efforts to win approval for Goulart's program.

With elections for a new congress only a few weeks away, the cabinet's waltz seemed certain to plunge Latin America's largest nation down into political and financial difficulties.

Goulart, whose relations with congress have worsened steadily over his drive for the powers, taken from his office last year, was given little chance of finding a new prime minister who could win approval of the balky congress.

The president's office was reduced to a figurehead in a parliamentary system set up in a military coup last year.

Brochado Da Rocha made a last appeal to congress to "give the people the right which was taken away from them."

Work Bill Signed by President

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy signed the 800-million public works authorization bill today and called it a "significant milestone in an effort to strengthen our economy."

He signed the bill in the presence of a big congressional delegation.

Kennedy said he shortly will ask congress for an appropriation to put the program into effect.

He said he is seeking an executive order designating Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans as coordinator of the program.

Kennedy said the program will be designed to carry out worthy and necessary projects in areas with high rates of unemployment.

It will be the purpose, he said, to provide jobs for the largest possible number of unemployed persons.

Kennedy said he intends to submit the next session of congress another request for funding.
