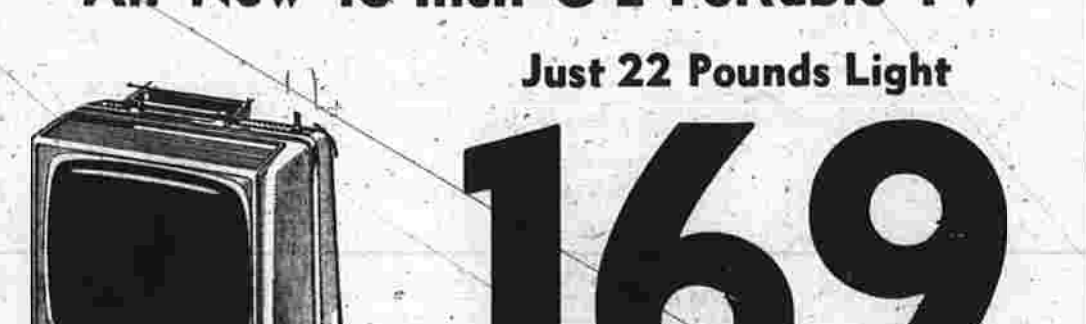

Not 'Justified' Now Kennedy Bars Action on Cuba

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy says U.S. military action against Cuba is not now "required or justified."

But he told his news conference Thursday that if the United States should ever have to take action, "all of Castro's unimpaired military weapons and technicians would not change the result or significantly extend the time required to achieve the result."

At the same time, the President admonished critics urging the administration to use military force against the Communist outpost.

He said he finds it "regrettable that those who urge such action give a color of legitimacy to Communist pretense that such a threat exists."

The President said, as he has said before, that Cuba poses no serious threat to the Western Hemisphere.

However, should the Castro regime be able to produce a nuclear weapon, it would endanger the security of the United States in any way "this country will do whatever is necessary."

BERLIN (AP)—Bowling a second round to Western orders, Soviet guards drove into West Berlin today in a bus instead of an armored car.

Both the bridge and the war memorial are in the British Sector, and the distance between the two is about 100 yards.

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Brazil's Premier Resigns; Sought Power for Goulart

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP)—Prime Minister Francisco Brochado Da Rocha and his cabinet resigned today after failing to get a wrangling congress to approve a referendum to give full executive power to President Joao Goulart.

The cabinet's resignation roused fears the military might step in, abolish congress and turn over full power to Goulart.

Brochado Da Rocha told the Chamber of Deputies he was resigning after two months because the conservative bloc in congress had stubbornly resisted his efforts to win approval for Goulart's program.

With elections for a new congress only a few weeks away, the cabinet's waltz seemed certain to plunge Latin America's largest nation down into political and financial difficulties.

Goulart, whose relations with congress have worsened steadily over his drive for the powers, taken from his office last year, was given little chance of finding a new prime minister who could win approval of the balky congress.

The president's office was reduced to a figurehead in a parliamentary system set up in a military coup last year. Congress refused to enact economic reforms he demanded, and he sought a new prime minister to run the government.

Brochado Da Rocha made a last appeal to congress to "give the people the right which was taken away from them."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana set a September 29 target date today for adjourning the 86th congressional session.

He told his colleagues there is more than a reasonable good chance to wind up the session two more weeks if they will work hard and late to get the job done.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., the deputy leader, said the new session would be a "test of the Senate's ability to get the job done."

Sen. William F. Buckley Jr., R-N.Y., said the Senate should not be distracted by the presidential election campaign.

Barnett acted after a ruling by U.S. Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black cleared the way for James Meredith, a Negro, to enter the university next week.

Meredith, 26, reportedly was a member of the Air Force and was discharged from the service after two years.

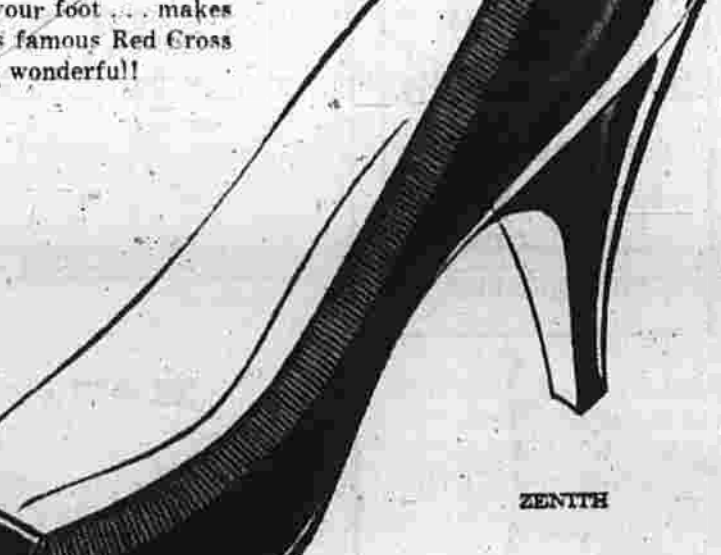

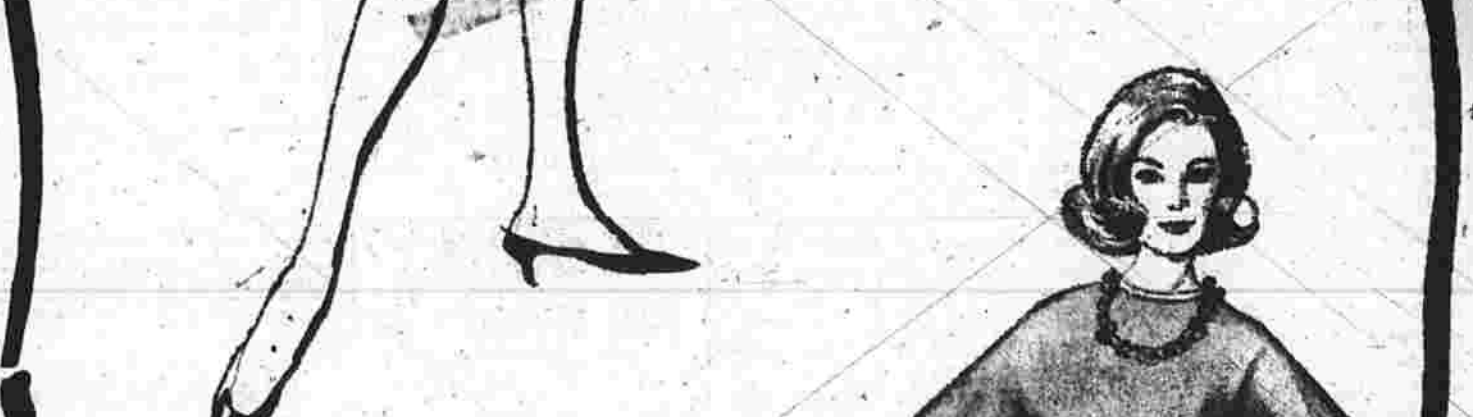

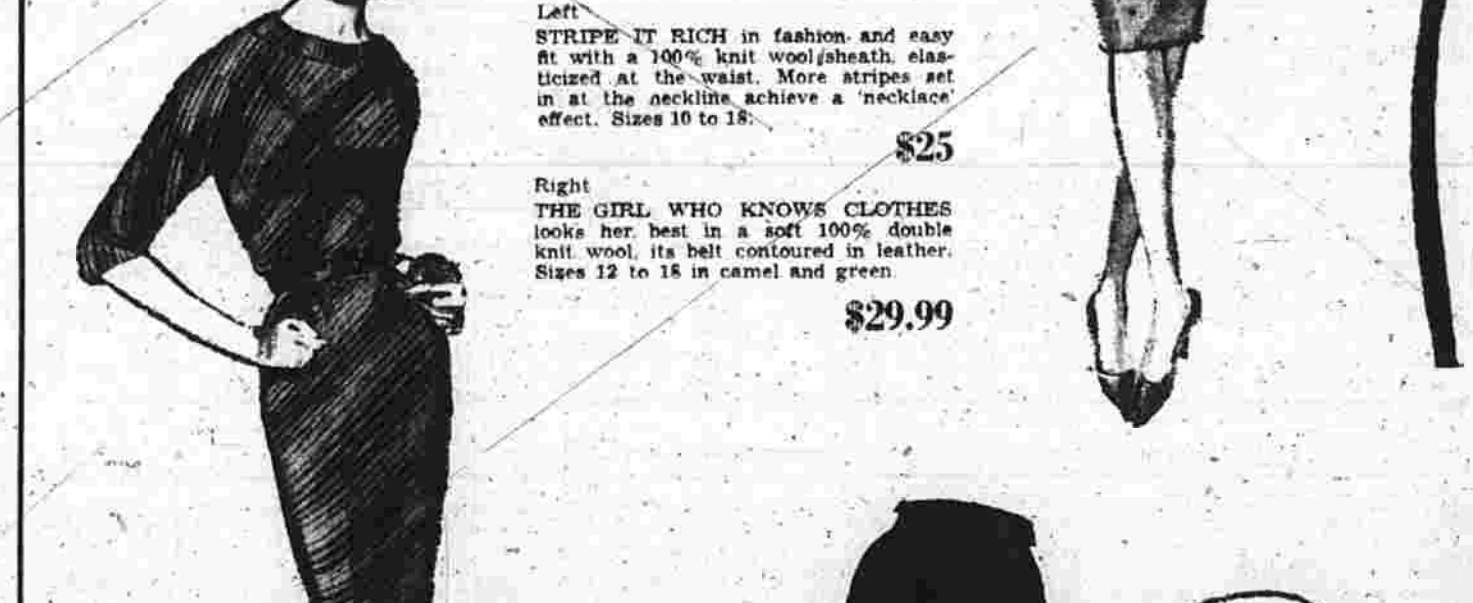

**Not Quite Rice Va. Texas?**  
 "But why, some say, the moon? Why choose this as our goal? And why may well ask why climb the highest mountain? Why 35 years ago fly the Atlantic? Why does Rice play Texas?"

"We choose to go to the moon. We choose to go to the moon in this decade, and do the other things—not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve as a platform for a new era of space conquest and measure the best of our energies and skills; because that challenge is one that we're willing to accept; because we are unwilling to postpone, and one we intend to win—and the others too."

This was President Kennedy's down in the football stadium of Rice University, the other day, telling us Americans why we are spending billions to try to go to the moon.

This speech was, one supposes, also an effort to persuade us that we want to spend this much, and more, on such an effort, and to justify to us the leadership which concentrates on such an effort.

Apparently, however, the President and his speech writers do not consider such emphatic of our natural urge to try to do what we can do quite enough to really bind us to a top-notch effort for the space program.

They included something else in the speech, beyond our natural yearning for the adventure of the unknown, or the adventure of the impossible being made possible.

They wrote in, as well, a militant declaration of war to keep space peaceful.

"We will fight for space, if need be, in order to be sure space isn't fought over."

The President put this persuasively in the following fashion: "The exploration of space will go ahead whether we join in it or not. It is one of the great adventures of all time, and no nation which expects to be the leader of other nations can expect to stay behind in this race for space."

"Those who came before us," the President continued, "must be certain that this country rode the first waves of the industrial revolution, the first waves of modern invention and the first wave of nuclear power. And this generation does not intend to founder in the backwash of the coming age of space. We mean to be a part of it. We mean to lead it."

"For the eyes of the world now look into space—to the moon and to the planets beyond—and we have vowed that we shall not see it governed by a hostile flag of conquest, but by a banner of freedom and peace."

"We have vowed that we shall not see space filled with weapons of mass destruction, but with instruments of knowledge and understanding. We mean to be a part of it. We mean to lead it."

"We like situations we think nobody can solve, and this, it seems to us, is one such."

"It's great to do a favor, for friend and foe alike, and the future holds in light. The thing to say is thank you, for some great deed."

### Home Decor, Atmosphere Affects Family Happiness

By ALTHEA POTTER

A good home affects the health, happiness and even the future economic standing of the people who live in it, said William Pahlmann, noted interior decorator, at the second annual Fashion and Home Furnishings Show held yesterday afternoon and evening at the Hotel Statler in Hartford.

Ten interior decorators of the Hartford area presented home furnishings vignettes ranging in style from early 18th century through ultra modern. The exhibitors were A. James Adams of South Coventry, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Cornett, Harold DeGroot and Jean Fisher of West Hartford, James T. Pascoe of Warehouse Point, and Walter Hodges, Warren Kenner, Edwin R. Merrill and Mrs. S. I. Ward of Hartford. All are members of the Connecticut Chapter, American Institute of Interior Designers.

Pahlmann is a Fellow of the New York Chapter, A.I.D. and is now working simultaneously in the hotel in Hong Kong, offices in the new Rockefeller Center buildings, a house in Aikens, N.H., and a house in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

He urged women to plan to decorate or redecorate their homes to follow the "ten commandments" of good decorating, but admitted that he himself had purchased a house for his parents in the cause he felt sorry for the house.

A good decorator wants to "express the personalities of the people who live in it," he said. He urged women to analyze themselves and their families before decorating their homes, to make certain that home furnishings function properly, be sure they are suitable for the type of activity which the family enjoys, and that they can be cleaned.

He explained that to be causal does not mean to be sloppy and that fine furnishings in a home tend to make children acquire a respect for them. A home decorator should strive to achieve a harmonious effect without being a slave to "period" or "style," he added.

Ignore the use of the label "good" or the layman's just because something is old doesn't necessarily mean that it is good," he added.

He concluded by telling of the importance of an appointed budget when decorating so that all facets of a room's design, curtains, rug, furniture, may be completed at one time.

Following his lecture Pahlmann showed slides of homes he had decorated in various cities in Havana, Cuba, where he won first prize for two years; in New York, St. Louis, Boston, and one of his own homes in Mount Kisco, N.Y., was a colorful blending of Louis XV, Chinese, Japanese and period decor.

To keep floor-to-ceiling windows from looking like "obscure mirrors" at night, the noted designer had installed curtains installed four feet away from the windows on the outside of the house. "The more they faded the more beautiful they were," he said.

WASHINGTON (AP)—High defense officials would not say today whether they would meet the President's authority to call up reserves if Congress approves Kennedy's request for a \$1.5-billion increase in military spending.
