WASHINGTON (AP)-An advisory committee to the Public Health Service met today to decide whether the Sabin oral polio vaccine should still be used in mass immunization programs.


Surgeon General Luther L Terry is expected to make public the committee's recommendation this afternoon: The meeting, originally sched-uled for Sept. 27, was moved up hurriedly after Canadian officials reported four cases of paralytic polio among the four million per sons who received the Sabin live virus vaccine. The Canadian Fedral Health Department mended against further use of the vaccine pending a study. Meanwhile, some U.S. commu-

nities were going ahead with their immunization programs. Others were calling a temporary

The developer of the vaccine Dr. Albert B. Sabin, said Canadian government was ill ad-"What should be done is to in tensify its use," he commented. The Cincinnati University re-searcher made the comments aboard the liner Queen Mary radio-telephone interview with The Associated Press. "What may have happened Canada is no different from what has happened in the United States and other countries ... during and other countries ... during the outbreaks of the disease," said Sabin.
