

Britain Seen Beaten In Try for Support For Link to Market

LONDON (AP)—British Commonwealth leaders wound up a heated debate on the Common Market today with clear signs Prime Minister Harold Macmillan had failed to win their unqualified support for linking Britain with the European economic-political bloc.

The 16 leaders deferred issuing a communique on the outcome of their weeklong debate.

Macmillan concluded the discussion with a 40-minute plea for unity. He had hoped his partners would accept a draft declaration he has been circulating privately.

This declaration would have pronounced Commonwealth support for Britain in its Brussels, Belgium negotiations with the Common Market countries. There was no sign that this draft had been accepted and conference sources said no communique now was likely until Wednesday.

Officials said the best the Macmillan government could expect was a general declaration by the conference acknowledging Britain's right to join the Common Market—provided she can meet certain conditions and gain specific safeguards for Commonwealth trade.

In the draft communique prepared by Macmillan there was no mention of the suspensions of hostility toward the Common Market project that were voiced last week by most of the Commonwealth leaders.

A mood of tension and some bitterness hung over the session. There were angry mutterings behind the scenes by Canadians and British—whose relations lately have nose-dived.

Canadian delegates claim the British are spreading stories to newspapers that their prime minister, John G. Diefenbaker, is the one man holding up general Commonwealth acquiescence of Britain's entry.

For their part, the British have not been discouraging newsmen from suggesting Diefenbaker's attacks on British policy were unexpected and harmful.

Foreign Minister Howard Green of Canada told reporters: "There has been an obvious attempt in the British press—of which I am sure you are behind it—to isolate Canada and drive a wedge between

her and the other members of the Commonwealth."

Leaders of Kenya and Uganda—two British colonies nearing independence—lined up behind Tanganyika in rejecting associate membership in the Common Market which Britain has persuaded the Europeans to offer.

The Commonwealth conference was expected to give its decision on Britain's planned Common Market entry by tonight.

The other prime ministers have spoken harshly against the terms of agreement because it

Fallout Levels Not Dangerous At This Time

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Welfare Anthony J. Celebrezze says a federal board has found that radioactive fallout is not at dangerous levels in the United States at this time.

The group said it would not recommend the preventive and countermeasures taken recently when radioactivity counts shot to high levels in some areas.

The Federal Radiation Council, top-ranking government body dealing with the problems of radiation fallout, issued a report today on its meeting of a week ago.

Celebrezze said Sunday in a television interview that the council had concluded there is no fallout at this time. He heads the fallout at this time. He heads the

group.

The council's report did not mention the areas involved or the countermeasures taken.

When the count of radioactive iodine 131 in milk reached an average of 660 microcuries per day during July in Salt Lake City, Utah, the dairy industry there undertook voluntary control measures.

State News Roundup

Democrats Lead By Over 26,000 In Registrations

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut Democrats now hold a lead of more than 26,000 over Republicans in voter registrations.

A statewide toll of voter registrations, updated by Secretary of State Ella T. Grasso shows 402,328 registered Democrats and 376,617 registered Republicans.

Independents still outnumber both major parties with 489,077 voters unaffiliated.

Democrats first took the lead away from the Republicans in July 1960 by a slim lead of 1,000 and in August of last year the Democrats increased their margin by 18,000.

\$20 Million Deficit
HARTFORD (AP)—Although the state of Connecticut operated in the black by \$2.6 million during the past fiscal year, it is still faced with a deficit of over \$20 million for the biennium ending June 30, 1963.

This was indicated today in State Comptroller Raymond S. Thatcher's annual report to Governor Dempsey.

Thatcher reported that revenue for the past year ending June 30, totaled \$293,240,000, representing \$3,830,000 more than anticipated. Expenditures for the period amounted to \$290,640,000—leaving a surplus from operations of \$2,600,000.

This surplus reduced the \$2,600,000 deficit which the state started with in 1961 to \$6,000,000.

However, the report notes that the budget department estimates a deficit from operations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963 at \$14,440,000, which is expected to bring the general fund deficit for the biennium to \$20,440,000.

Additional appropriations requirements of the Teachers Retirement Fund and the Welfare Department make up the bulk of the anticipated deficit. The budget department estimates Teachers Retirement will need \$6,109,208 more than appropriated and the State Welfare Department will need \$11,771,658 more than allocated.

Amston Man Killed
ROCKY HILL (AP)—Rocky Hill had its second traffic fatality within three weeks Sunday night when an Amston man was killed in a one-car crash at Orchard and Elm Sts.

Police said a car driven by Linden G. Fuller of Old Hebron Rd., Amston, went through a stop sign where Orchard St. ends at Elm St. and struck a high bank on the south side of Elm.

Fuller was dead on arrival at Hartford Hospital. His car was demolished.

Three passengers in the car were injured and taken to the hospital. They are Patricia Rich, 39, Colchester; Marcia Fuller, 18, Amston, a niece of the man who was killed; and Jose Ortiz, 23, Camp Wilson, Poquonock.

Ortiz, police said, was a hitchhiker. He told police that he met the people in the car at a bar and they were going to take him back to camp.

Two persons died as a result of an accident in Rocky Hill Aug. 30.

Primary Vote Procedure
BOSTON (AP)—Massachusetts voters decide Tuesday whether there are too many Kennedy's in public life or if another of the clan should have a crack at high public office.

That seemed the overriding issue today as Edward M. Kennedy, 36, brother of President Kennedy, and Edward J. McCormack, 39, nephew of House Speaker John W. McCormack, climaxed a whirlwind campaign for a short-term U.S. Senate nomination.

At stake in November balloting is the remaining two years of the term Kennedy left behind to become president.

Two Republicans will fight it out at the polling places for their party's nomination and the opportunity—if Kennedy should win his primary—to take the dynasty issue to the voters for a second round in the general election.

They are George C. Lodge, former assistant secretary of labor, and Rep. Laurence Curtis, 10-year member of Congress whose district was reapportioned out of existence.

Rumor Denied Kennedy Wed Once Secretly

WASHINGTON (AP)—A long-circulated rumor—coupled with a denial that President Kennedy was once secretly married—was published in Washington today.

The Washington Post carried an advance article from Newsweek magazine, which it owns, and which, like the Post, branded the rumor as groundless and false.

The White House, asked for comment, declined to discuss the matter today as it has in the past.

Rumors of an early Kennedy marriage have been circulated widely for more than a year. Persons or groups have distributed in various parts of the country copies of a page from a genealogy alleging there was such a marriage.

To citizens who write the White House about the rumor, a simple reply goes out: "The President has been married only once—to his wife Jacqueline Kennedy."

The Associated Press checked many sources over the months and was never able to find any evidence to substantiate the rumor.

Newsweek, noted that virtually every major newspaper, magazine and wire service in the United States refused to publish the report.

"They have 'spiked' the story despite what appears at first glance to be documentary evidence and despite scattered publication of it—or hints at it—by hate groups and gossip columnists," Newsweek said.

The Washington Post said that it had reached the conclusion that "recent revival of the rumor has brought it to public attention and made notice of it seem desirable."

The story reached a national audience Sept. 2 when Parade, a Sunday supplement magazine, printed a letter from a reader asking if the story of the secret marriage was true. Parade said there never was such a marriage.

The so-called evidence for the marriage appears in one paragraph on page 884 of a privately printed family history, "The Blauvelt Family Genealogy," written by a member of the 10th generation, Louis L. Blauvelt, who died at 82 two years after the book was published in 1921.

In tracing the history of the Blauvelts, who migrated from Holland in 1638, one entry under the 11th generation says:

"Louis L. Blauvelt, Malcom, (Isabel O. Cooper, 11,304). We have no birth date. She was born Kerr, but took the name of her stepfather. She first married Firmin DeLooge, IV. They were divorced, and she married, third, John F. Kennedy, son of Joseph F. Kennedy, sometime ambassador to England. There were no children of the second or third marriages."

The genealogy adds that a daughter was born of the marriage to DeLooge.

Newsweek asserts the third marriage never took place.

"The only mystery," it says, "is why Louis L. Blauvelt, in his confused chronology, said that he did. The answer may well be in Blauvelt's family records, now in custody of his daughter, Mrs. William S. Blauvelt. He kept documentation for every item in his book."

Stop—or Wait and See Sabin Type-3 Policy Varies Across U.S.

Some states have decided to discontinue use of Sabin Type III polio vaccine, but state and local officials in a number of places have adopted a wait and see policy.

Sabin oral vaccine Types I and II will continue to be used generally, checks across the country indicate.

Reaction was mixed after the U.S. Public Health Service announced in Washington Saturday that 11 confirmed cases of Type III polio provided sufficient evidence "to indicate that at least some of these cases have been caused by Type III vaccines."

The special advisory committee of the health service said all 11 confirmed cases occurred in adults. The service recommended limiting the use of Type III vaccine to immunization programs for preschool and school age children. Continued use of Types I and II for everyone was recommended by the health service.

Celebrezze said there was no incident involving a child who had taken Type III oral vaccine.

A spokesman then said Public Health Service records showed that at least four children developed polio after taking Type III oral vaccine.

Celebrezze replied: "The cases which were cited are those in which there was considered to be a relationship between the vaccine and the disease."

The secretary added that in the children's cases cited by the spokesman, no direct relationship between the vaccine and the contraction of the disease had been established.

Some Canadian and New York authorities, a spokesman noted, had halted Type III vaccine programs, while other communities were going ahead with immunization programs, and he asked Celebrezze to comment on this.

Socialist Selected Argentina Premier

BRASILIA (AP)—President Joao Goulart picked a progressive Socialist as prime minister Sunday night. He also signed a bill in a weekend triumph, over Congress that sets a plebiscite on restoring strong presidential powers, the major issue in the current crisis.

Goulart chose ex-Labor Minister Hermes Lima to form what probably will be a caretaker government until a new Congress returns in February.

Workers Back Short Contract At Veeder Root

HARTFORD (AP)—Veeder Root workers unanimously approved a new one-year contract today by a standing vote recommended by union leaders.

Mrs. Mary Smith, head of the negotiating committee, said workers would return to their jobs Tuesday morning.

Calling for approval of the offer at a mass meeting at the Bushnell Memorial was Joseph V. Cronin, international representative of Machinist District 26, IAM, AFL-CIO.

The agreement is for one year, reversing a previous management insistence on a three-year pact.

Included in the settlement is a three per cent wage boost, averaging out at 6.8 cents per hour, and varying between 5.4 and 9.8 cents for individual workers.

Cronin termed this "probably one of the highest negotiated wage agreements carried out in this area this year."

Under new incentive pay rates, the lowest anyone at Veeder Root would receive, Cronin said, would be \$1.84 per hour. This was compared to \$1.63 1/2 that some workers now receive.

In other provisions of the offer: Hospital benefits would be increased \$2 per day, from \$18 to \$20.

Sickness and accident benefits would be increased \$10, from \$30 to \$40 minimum per week.

Incentive base rates would be increased 3 per cent. Women would be upped from 20 to 24 cents an hour, and men, from 24 to 28 as high as 35 cents per hour.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Diplomats from both East and West predicted today the General Assembly opening Tuesday will name U Thant to a full five-year term as U.N. secretary general. But the Russians made plain they will press once again for their troika plan.

That is acting secretary-general, serving out the unexpired term of the late Dag Hammarskjold that ends next April 10. He was elected last Nov. 3 after Hammarskjold's death in a plane crash in Africa a year ago today.

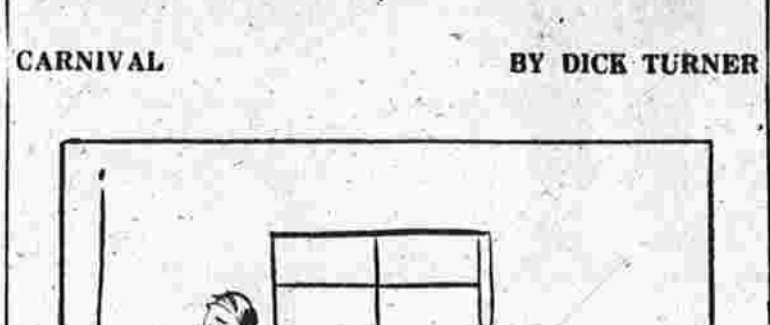

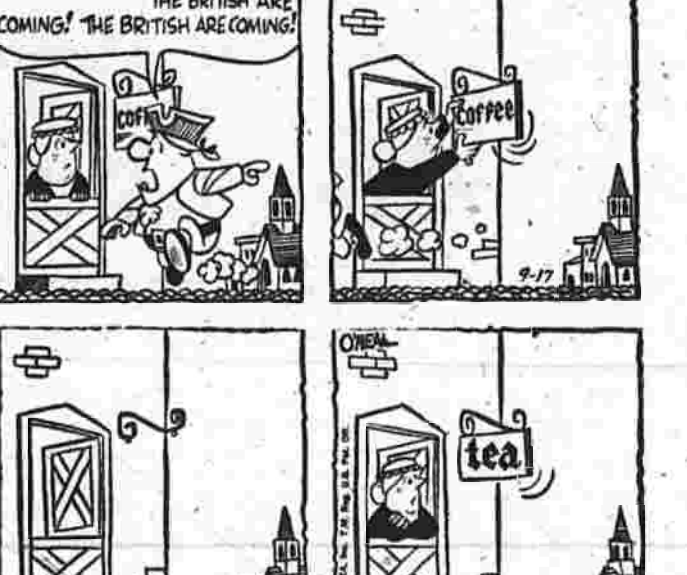
