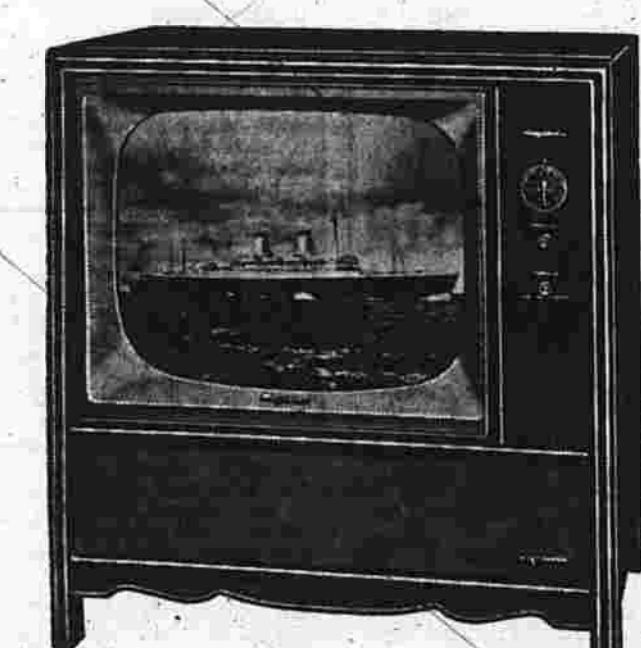

Emphasis On Health

Healthful radiation, new information on drinking and driving, and studies on the effects of recent meals have on swimming ability figure in the medical news this week.

Radiation

The health hazards of high-dose radiation are well-known. In a study at the University of Rochester, N.Y., scientists have conducted animal studies that indicate a little radiation may be a good thing.

Dr. George W. Casarett of Rochester University's School of Medicine and Dentistry says mice here daily radiation doses slightly above the maximum permissible rates for humans have, in some cases, proven beneficial to the life span and reproductive capacities of male beagle dogs.

In the study that started in 1950, Dr. Casarett selected his 60 dogs into four groups. The control group has received no irradiation. The second group has received irradiation a week—the maximum permissible exposure for humans when the study started. The third group received six-tenths roentgens a week and the fourth, three roentgens weekly.

Dr. Casarett told a symposium on radiation at Colorado State University that 40 per cent of the dogs in the control group have died. However, the death rate in group two has been only 23 per cent, group three 20 per cent, and group four 20 per cent.

His theory is that continued radiation produces a slightly higher white blood count. White blood cells act to combat disease germs. Thus, the irradiated animals perhaps had better defenses against infectious diseases that killed some dogs in the control group.

His studies also showed that dogs receiving three-tenths and six-tenths roentgens of irradiation maintained better reproductive capacities than the nonirradiated group. However, dogs receiving three roentgens weekly became infertile within a year.

Alcohol Tolerance

Why will "X" number of drinks turn one driver into a highway menace but leave another person with a reasonable amount of driving skill?

An American Medical Association subcommittee on alcoholism says there is little difference among individual human beings in the ability of their brain tissue to resist the effect of a given tissue concentration of alcohol.

But there are other factors. A large man can take the same number of drinks as a small man and have a lower concentration of alcohol in his tissues. And a skillful driver can lose half his ability and still perform better than a slow-reacting poor driver.

Also, an experienced driver is likely to compensate with extra caution for his impaired handiwork whereas the novice is not, the subcommittee said.

Kating and Swimming

Athletes generally avoid food for several hours before an important contest, but a study published in Research Quarterly indicates that mealtime bears little relationship to short-distance swimming performance.

Fourteen male high school athletes were timed on six occasions for the 100-yard swim. The trials were made after light meals at time intervals of 1/2, 1, 1 1/2, 2, 2 1/2 and 3 hours.

The analysis of the data indicate that none of the eating periods had any more effect on swimming times than many others. Some of the swimmers suffered any adverse effects in the form of nausea or stomach cramps, the study said.

The Stronger Eye

Although a person may have 20/20 vision, the chances are his right eye will be more efficient than his left, especially if he is right-handed.

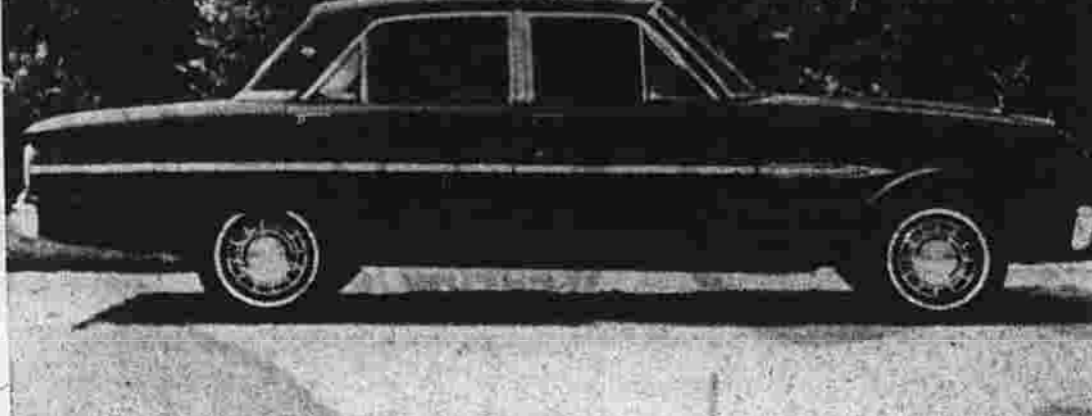
Two London researchers, Maria Wise and E. Eitinger, tested the ability of a group of persons to identify drawings on the right and left side of their visual field.

They found that although a person could identify a picture presented on his right, he often was unable to identify a similar picture presented simultaneously on his left, in spite of repeated exposures. This remained true even when his attention was concentrated on his left visual field.

All but one of the tests subjects were right-handed.

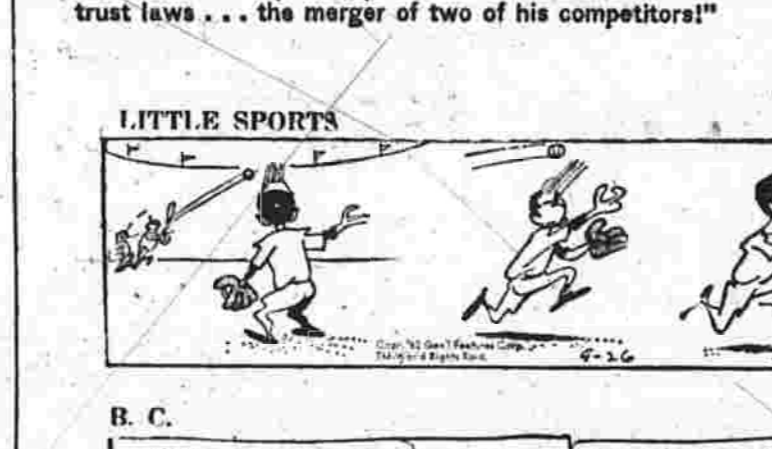
