The Pope's audience was the main activity in the Vatican today. No council session was scheduled, and the 2,700 prelates here for the conciliar turned their attention to lining up candidates for the 10 commissions, of 54 members each, that will debate the issues before the greatest church meeting in modern times.
Balloting starts Saturday in St. Peter's Basilica and will continue through three more private council sessions spaced through next week.

States, Britain and France in West Berlin.
He has also been reported to have said on various occasions that he did not think the United States would go to war over West Berlin. He has remarked that perhaps the problem is one which should be discussed personally.
The judgment in official Washington is that the Soviet leader may very well seek such a personal talk with Kennedy by committee in the United States late next month in advanced sessions of the U.N. General Assembly. In that case Kennedy would almost certainly have at least one meeting with him.
He could use the occasion either for denunciations and threats or for building a case for his side of the Berlin dispute.
The Western powers see Khrushchev's arguments as designed simply to justify a slow motion Communist takeover of West Berlin beginning with the removal of protective troops of U.S., British and French troops.
What the Kennedy administration is concerned with is that Western powers have no intention of removing their troops nor will they admit Soviet troops or U.N. forces as partners or replacements in West Berlin.

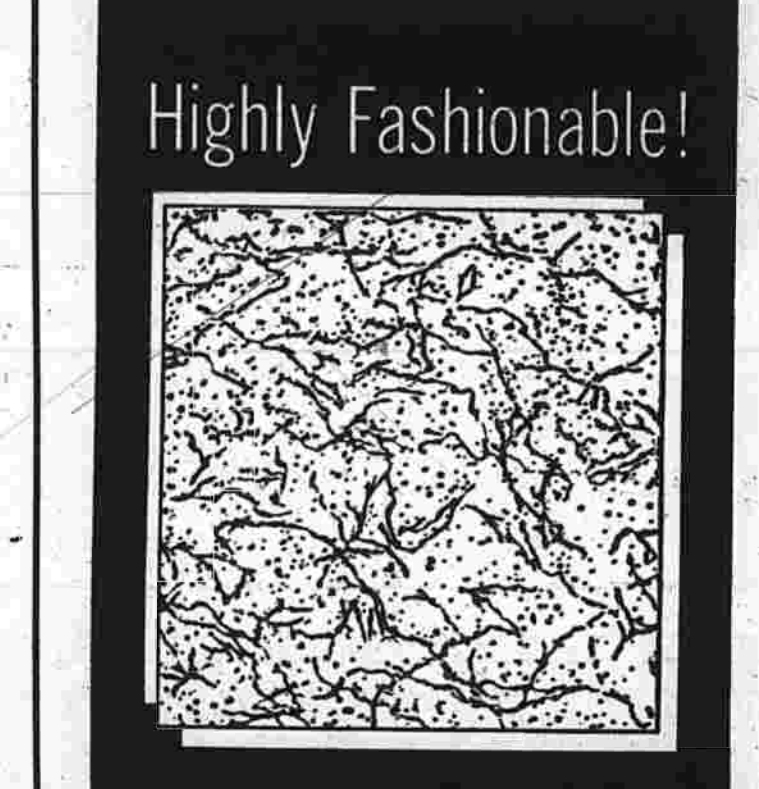

Mrs. George Sandals, 40 Steep Hollow Lane, will be honored Thursday, Oct. 25, for outstanding work with the Zionist youth movement, Manchester Hadassah and the community. She has been elected IMA of the year by Manchester Chapter of Hadassah.
IMA means "Mother in Israel" is the Youth Aliyah movement of Israel. The award will be presented to her and 22 representatives of each of the Connecticut chapters of Hadassah at a luncheon at Waverly Inn, Cheshire, on Thursday, Oct. 25, at 11 a.m.
Youth Aliyah is an international agency for the rescue, relief and rehabilitation in Israel of homeless Jewish children from all over the world. Hadassah has contributed in excess of \$40 million dollars to Youth Aliyah since 1934. More than 100,000 children from 72 countries have been aided. The program trains children and youth for work in Israel. They live in 200 youth villages, agricultural settlements and in kibbutzim where designing, printing and academic subjects are taught.

Mrs. Sandals has been president and vice president of Manchester Hadassah several times, and has held chairmanships on a local and regional level. She is vice president of the Connecticut region and section area chairman. Earlier this year she was a member of the Golden Jubilee Study Mission.
Her civic activities have included the executive board of the Brotherhood of Temple Beth Shalom, the executive board of Manchester Area Health Association, the executive board of the PTA, long guide chairman for the Women's Auxiliary of Manchester Memorial Hospital, and a member of the fund drive committee of the League of Women Voters.

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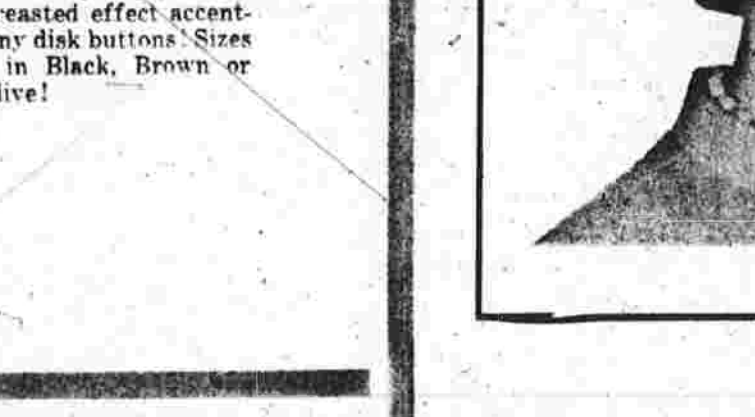
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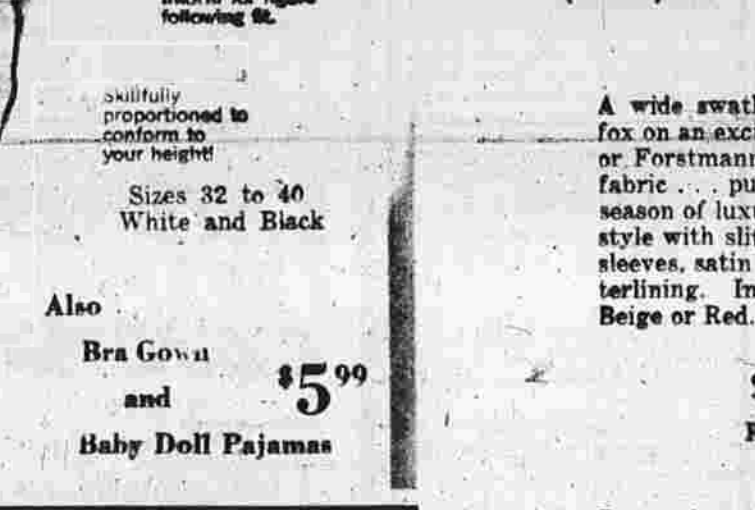
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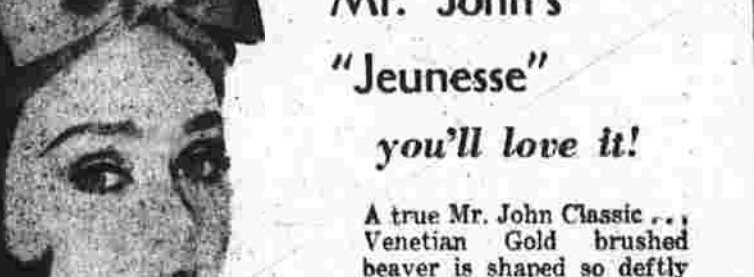

Fire Prevention Theme of Skit

Concern with "a total disregard for moral standards everywhere" was expressed by Dr. Frederick C. Grant, one of three observers from the Anglican Communion. Dr. Grant added, "I believe the council will be sure to be one of the great turning points in world history."

Optimism also was expressed by Dr. J. H. Jackson, president of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., the largest all-Negro religious body in the world. "As a result of this conference I look forward to a greater fellowship and understanding between Protestants and Catholics the world over."

Dr. Jackson is the only Baptist delegate-observer at the council.

Dr. Albert C. Outler, professor at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University, discussed the council's possible effects on the ecumenical movement and said, "No matter what does happen, the ecumenical situation is bound to be altered significantly thereafter for better or for worse."

Dr. Outler went on, "Most Protestants understand by now, at least, that formally speaking, this council is a family affair within the Roman Catholic Church. We realize that its effect upon the relations between Rome and the rest of the Christian community is largely indirect."

"But no one rightly doubts that these effects will be deep and far-reaching. They might, quite possibly, be epoch-making."

Dr. Grant, a professor at Union Theological Seminary, termed Pope John XXIII "a baby man" at a raised up and sent to this tortured generation.

"What the world cries out for is a spiritual and moral awakening," Dr. Grant said. "And if for one moment the great Roman Catholic Church, the largest communion in Christendom, is probably about to take the lead in such a movement."

In Dr. Jackson's view, the council "offers a unique opportunity for world Christian thought, Christian fellowship and Christian understanding across the denominational, racial and national lines. And with the leadership of Pope John XXIII this conference will do much to destroy the basis of religious persecution throughout the world and will bring a new emphasis and a new realization in the field of religious liberty."

LOUVRE ART DAMAGED

PARIS (AP)—The Louvre Museum disclosed Thursday that nine paintings, including three by Camille Corot, had been badly damaged by a vandal, apparently on Sunday night.

It said the paintings had been scratched, either by fingernails or by a nail file. The act had been kept secret in an effort to aid French police.

"All nine paintings can be restored in a very satisfactory manner," one museum official said.

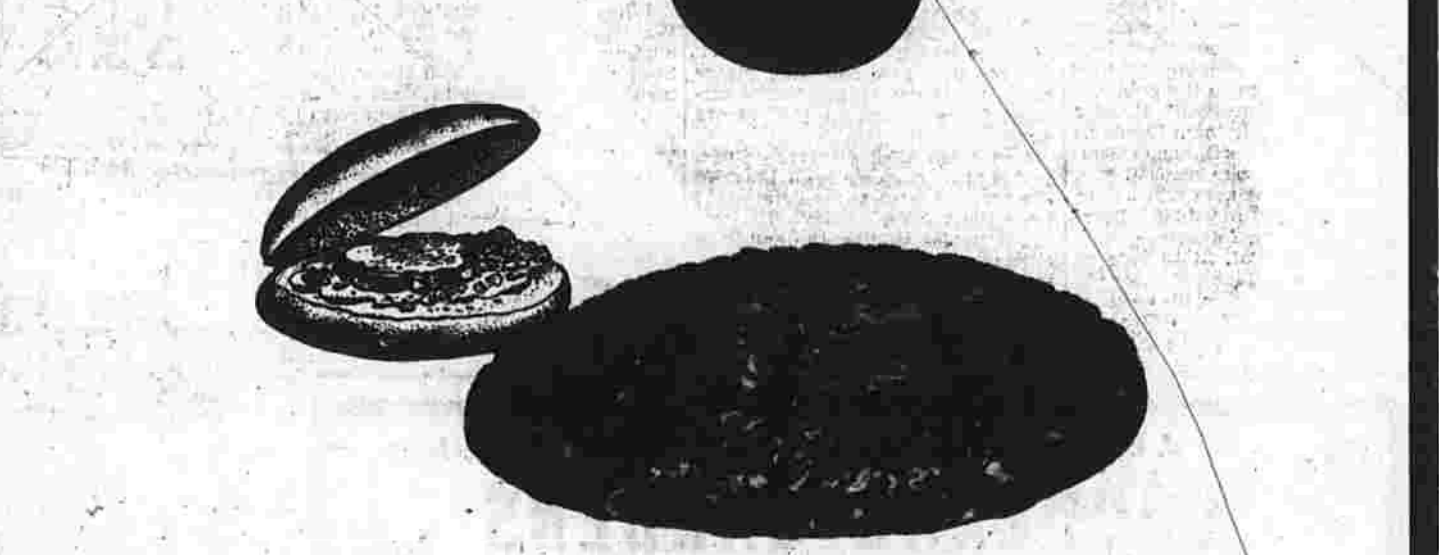
