Kelley, the 31-year-old English teacher out of Boston University, campaigning for the Boston Ath-letic Association. The two-time United States Olympian has taken part in 10 races and has won five, never having finished worse than fourth. He's the defending cham-pion as well as the course record holder. Kelley's 23:59.3 set in 1957 is the best time any of more than 1.200 runners have compiled since the race was renewed in 1945. Kelley, America's greatest long distance runner, will be a strong favorite. In his last eight starts in Manchester, he shows six wins and two merced placement.

Tall Fred Kandschur of the Finnish-American A. C. of Provi-dence has been within the top 10 in five tries. Sure to be up among the top finishers are Jim Murray and Dick Colasuonno, both of St. John's University in Brooklyn as well as George Terry who heads a Peace Corps team from the Uni-versity of Massachusetts. 




