The Giving of Pets To the Editor, Live pets as Christmas gifts are very popular, and with a little thought and care in the selection of an animal, there can be no nicer gift, as it is one that can be en-joyed for many years to come. After many years of experience with people and pets, may we pas

along these suggestions? 1. Be very careful that th mother of the family wishes to have a pet in her household. If nearly every case, the care of the pet will be her responsibility. 2. What sort of pet is pre-ferred? Which will fit best into the family as a whole? Never give a female animal unless you or the recipient are willing to have it spayed. Few people are equipped to have litter after litter of baby animals! The proper age to have a cat or dog spayed is from 51/2 to 6 months old. (If you need help in this matter, there are ways that we can assist you. Write us at P.O. Box 214, Green Farms, Conn.) S. If the people to whom you

are giving an animal do not own their own home, be sure and check with the landlord, as pets are not



4. If the gift is to be a dog, ask what size and type of dog they would like to have. Young pupples are not desirable if there are small children in the family—an older dog will be easier to care for.
5. If you do not wish to pay a large price for an animal, remember that animal welfare societies and humane societies, as well as local dog wardens often have dogs that make desirable pets.
6. Probably the most important point of all—it is much better to give a live pet a week or so before Christmas day, or a few days after the hig event. Animals are very sensitive to new surroundings and sensitive to new surroundings and sensitive to new sufroundings and they become nervous when there is much excitement in the air, as there is bound to be on Christmas Day. The pet will have a better chance of making a good adjust-ment to its new home when the household is in a calmer state.
