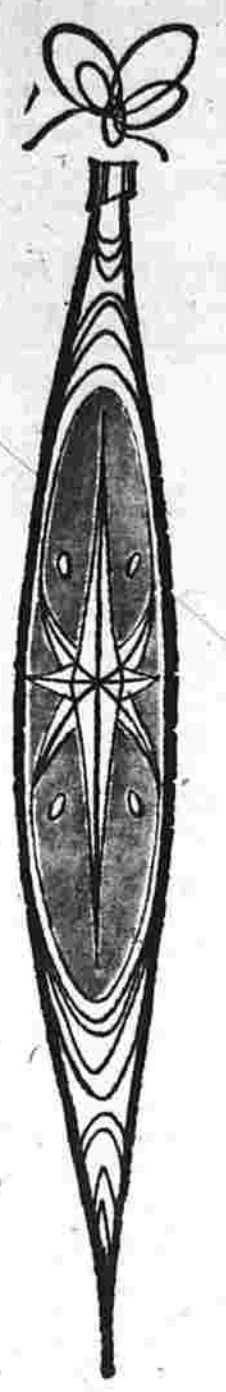

Rescuers Sight Miner's Body

GARMICHAELS, Pa. (AP)—An advance rescue team sighted early today the body of one of 37 miners trapped some 650 feet underground by a tremendous coal mine explosion.

The rescue party relayed word that it was still some distance from the body, and identification could not be established immediately.

According to a U.S. Steel Corp. spokesman, the body lay about 4,000 feet from the working area, or face of the tunnel where the blast erupted at 1:15 p.m. Thursday.

The spokesman said it would be a while before the rescue unit could work its way to the body. The discovery came in the third day of round-the-clock operations by specially trained eight-man teams in the Frostburg No. 3 shaft of U.S. Steel's Robena No. 3 mine, located about 50 miles southwest of Pittsburgh.

Probing cautiously with as much speed as possible in a desperate race against time, the rescuers made good progress last night and early today.

In one three-hour period Friday officials had pointed out that there was no way of telling where any of the trapped men might be in relation to the spot where the blast occurred.

When the explosion rocked the mine, the men were in an area some two miles from the vertical entrance, which extends 85 feet from the surface.

It was pointed out that there was no way to determine whether any of the trapped men are in relation to the working area, or face, of the mine.

The rescue work has been slow but steady, the newly installed machinery of the mine is being used to force its way through the rubble, and to bring in vital fresh air.

Small fires and rock falls are being kept under control.

Seven persons were reported killed in the first skirmishes between the rebels and the forces of the sultan, Sir Omar Ali Saifuddin.

The rebels attacked oil installations manned by 200 Britons, Dutch and Australians in this capital. But there were no reports of casualties or serious damage. The installations pump out 4 million tons of oil a year.

The rebels also were reported to have attacked installations in Seria, a major oil installation about 45 miles southwest of here.

NEW YORK (AP)—The International Typographical Union went on strike today against four New York City newspapers. Four other major dailies immediately announced shut-downs and a fifth was publishing only editions for out-of-town circulation.

That more than 25 million readers will be left without their regular daily newspapers in the city unless the situation is quickly settled. Prospects for this appear dim.

All four morning papers published as usual before the printers' strike. The Long Island Press, in Jamaica, Queens, was the last to go on strike after 2 a.m.

UConn Head Asks \$36 Million Hike

HARTFORD (AP)—President Homer D. Babidge Jr. of the University of Connecticut asked yesterday for \$36.4 million to operate the university during the 1963-64 biennium.

Babidge told Gov. John Dempsey at a budget hearing that enrollment at the university has increased only 36 per cent. He asked authorization to increase personnel by 24 per cent.

Despite the proposed boost in the UConn budget, Babidge said his request was some \$10 million less than what was asked by the deans and directors of the university.

"We would be delirious in our duty," said the newly installed president, "if we did not attempt to impress upon you and people of the state the quality and integrity of the university which is in jeopardy if substantial aid is not made this year."

Babidge said "much of what we do at the university is not equal to our best and it is vitally necessary that we set out at once to present a program."

The officers and trustees of the university "have endeavored to bring about a more responsible and more efficient use of the state's funds," he said, "but we are still in a position that confronts the state."

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Manned Spacecraft Center, Houston, Tex., last week announced that Hamilton Standard division of the United Aircraft Corporation, as prime contractor to manage and integrate the space suit program and also design and manufacture the life support backpacks.

The suits will be developed for Project Apollo and are being designed by International Letex. The pressurized suits will provide astronauts with a high rate of mobility in walking, climbing, and bending over.

In the helmet will be an airlock feeding device to permit the astronaut to drink water and eat specially prepared foods when the suit is pressurized. The helmet's face plate will have provisions for protecting the eyes from intense solar glare. It will also be defogged and defrosted for good visibility in cold temperatures.

The complete assembly will contain a separate emergency oxygen supply. A two-way radio will provide communication with the Apollo spacecraft and other extra-vehicular crewmen. A telemetry unit and sensing devices will relay to the vehicle the astronaut's physiological functions as well as the suit's pressure, oxygen and temperature conditions.

The life support pack, carried on the back of the wearer, will contain the oxygen supply necessary to pressurize and ventilate the astronaut's pressure suit, and the mechanical system required to cool the ventilating gases, remove contaminants and insure adequate gaseous flow. The astronaut will be able to carry tools, a light, and containers to hold the specimens he collects on the lunar surface.

The space suit and life support system is designed to permit an astronaut to put it on or take it off in five minutes, unassisted. Republic Aviation, a subcontractor to International Letex, will do medical and environmental testing for the program.

'Beverly Hillbillies' One of Season's Hits

Most critics greeted this season's crop of new television shows with mixed emotions. There wasn't much to rave about. Fortunately, however, throughout the years there has always been one or two outstanding newcomers. This year "The Beverly Hillbillies" (Wednesdays, 9 p.m., CBS-TV) is one of these. The measurements upon which the TV men rely—the ratings—have already placed the show among the top 20. It topped the "Perry Como Show," as well as the Bob Hope Special. Although it's real corny hillbilly hokum, it has so far had some very hilarious episodes.

Paul Henning, creator of "The Beverly Hillbillies," tells us that he has wanted to write about the real hillbillies for years. As a Boy Scout back in Independence, Missouri, he spent his summers camping and hiking in the Ozark Mountains. On his treks through the hills he met and became fascinated by real hillbillies.

"I've wanted to write something about these lovable people ever since," he admits. Paul left Missouri 25 years ago to become one of the top comedy writers for radio, TV and movies. He kept returning to the hill country during vacations and became impressed with hillbillies as rugged individualists, genuine, warm-hearted people with a sense of humor and a simple, direct approach to life—a refreshing contrast with the more complicated life of the big city.

Eventually, he conceived the idea of moving the hillbillies out of their primitive surroundings into a new and sophisticated atmosphere. The result is the off-beat new series, "The Beverly Hillbillies," which takes the Clampett clan from the Ozark Mountains to Beverly Hills.

As for the casting of the Clampett clan, from the very beginning there was no doubt in Mr. Henning's mind who was right for the role of Jed, the senior Clampett. Buddy Ebsen typified the rugged strength and simplicity of the Ozark mountaineers. Although Buddy has been better known for his dancing, from the very first moment he stroled on the set, he proved Paul Henning was right in his choice. Buddy himself is completely sold on the show. "I enjoy the role particularly because it is so well written that the audience can nev-

er predict the lines or what's going to happen next. It's the most hilarious and unpredictable material I've ever been associated with."

Irene Ryan, who is "Granny" on the show, has been a personal friend of Paul Henning for years. Before the casting was decided upon, Irene was visiting Paul when all of a sudden he exclaimed, "Irene, you would be perfect for the part of Granny in this new series." It wasn't until a month or two after the pilot film was finished that Irene confessed to Mr. Henning that her visit on that day was not really a social visit. She had heard about the show and was looking for a part.

Irene has been winning audiences since she won an amateur contest in San Francisco when 11 years old. She has won a reputation as a scene-stealer whose songs and wisecracks have enlivened programs of such notables as Bob Hope, Danny Thomas, Rudy Vallee and Tennessee Ernie Ford. At one time she had her own radio series, "The Tim and Irene Show," one of the top programs of its day. In recent years she has been a nightclub headliner.

Elly May, played by Donna Douglas, the tomboy daughter of Jed Clampett is a Louisiana girl.

"At the age of 17, Elly May has never known any life but the hills, nor any clothes but those of a boy," says Paul Henning. "Like most hillbilly boys, Elly is adept at rasslin' bobcats and throwing rocks and empty cans with superb accuracy."

Although Donna Douglas never had to wrestle bobcats as a youngster, she did learn to throw rocks, swing on grapevines, climb trees and whistle through her teeth.

"I was a real tomboy, but it was a matter of survival," she recalls. "I was the only girl on either side of my family and I was surrounded by boys—an older

brother and eight cousins, all boys."

Donna's startling good looks won many beauty contests for her—some with ridiculous titles—but they were instrumental in bringing her to Hollywood attention. Her first film role was in "Career" with Dean Martin and Shirley MaLaure. One of the things she is currently studying is the banjo and hopes to be good enough to play it on the series some time.

Rounding out the Clampett clan is Big Jethro, the cousin, played by Max Baer. He is the son of a

former world heavyweight champion. Max has been making it on his own, refusing to cash in on his father's fame.

"I loved, honored and respected my father, but I resent being hired for a job or interviewed because of my dad," says Max. "I want to make it on my own."

An athlete in school, Max was in the Air Force following graduation. Then he turned to acting, got roles in about 20 TV shows before being signed for "The Beverly Hillbillies" which many predict will skyrocket him to national prominence.

For the majority of actors, life is a series of plateaus—they work on one for a while, then try for the next highest. For Lois Nettleton, this is a time when at last she can take dead aim at the plateau named Stardom.

"I had reached a plateau," she says. "I had achieved a certain reputation in show business, but I was not a big name. That meant that I couldn't take parts that weren't good, yet I was not important enough for the major parts. I would audition and be told that I was just right for a part, but I wasn't the name they needed. And I turned down parts offered to me because they weren't big enough for me to take without damaging my reputation."

This stalemate has, happily, been conquered. Recently, Lois had a major role on the Du Pont Show of the Week, playing with Douglas Fairbanks and Greer Garson. She's in her first movie, "Period of Adjustment," and has a big part in another one, tentatively titled, "The Friendliest Girls in the World."

During her plateau period—Lois calls it, with perhaps an eye on publicizing her new film, "my period of adjustment"—she found television an ideal medium. She did four Naked Cities, two Route 66s, a Twilight Zone, a U.S. Steel Hour.

"They helped me make a living," she says. "And when my agent suggested me to MGM for

"Period of Adjustment," they knew who I was. They'd seen me on Naked City and know me because I made the Twilight Zone show at the MGM studio."

Now that she feels she's over the hump, she's going to rest—she worked for six months straight on the two movies—before she tackles the final ascent to Stardom Plateau. She figures doing a Broadway musical might be the best way to make it, and has been taking singing and dancing lessons.

"A musical would be fun," she says. "And acting should be fun as well as work."

TV Personalities

Earl Holliman

Dreams of six-year-olds rarely mature into reality. But occasionally, as in the case of Earl Holliman, the dream gradually becomes a driving determination and, eventually, is realized.

From the day he saw his first motion picture, Earl dreamed of being an actor.

"I think it was a desire to be accepted," he says now. "When I realized how the people on the screen were not only accepted, but sought after, I decided to be one of them."

For an orphan born in Tennessee Swamp, near Delhi, La., this ambition bordered on fantasy. Yet, as he stars this season as Mitch Guthrie in "Wide Country"—a new, full-hour modern-day Western Thursday nights on NBC-TV—that ambition is fulfilled. Guthrie, a champion rodeo cowboy, follows the rodeo circuit in the filmed series with his college-age brother, Andy, played by Andrew Prine.

Holliman was adopted when he was a week old by Henry and Velma Holliman, Henry, an oil worker, died when Earl was 13, in Shreveport, La. Earl quit school to work in a cafe with his mother, waiting tables at night for \$5 a week.

He was graduated there with high honors, winning a letter in football, a scholastic scholarship to Louisiana State University, was president of the senior class, got a straight "A" in all his studies and, more important to him than all, played the lead in the senior play, "Brother Goose." Young Holliman was on his way.

During a tour in the Navy, Earl received his first real encouragement as an actor. Stationed at Norfolk, he starred in a number of plays under the guidance of Katharine Stoner. After his discharge from service, Earl entered the University of Southern California, studying drama, and from there the Pasadena Playhouse.

Hollywood casting directors began to notice the young actor, and he finally got a bit part in "The Girls of Pleasure Island." It was all he needed. Agents started calling him—"guys I could never even get on the phone before"—and Earl Holliman was off to the races.

A bachelor, Earl lives in a large home in the Hollywood Hills. He has a pet—a huge German shepherd, Shadow. For diversion he reads history, and for exercise swims regularly.

"I've always cited Jack Dempsey and other champions who quit when they were ahead to Elvis," says his No. 1 career boss, Col. Tom Parker. "I think Elvis will quit when he's still ahead, too. We've seen too many once-famous actors and singers refusing to call it quits and coming back as has-beens to destroy their own images."

At 27, Presley has had five champion years with six movies still to follow his latest, "Meet Me at the World's Fair." He's still a top record seller, points out Parker, "because he's kept his audience. Other singers have won big followings and then have gone too sophisticated to keep their fans."

"That's one of the big reasons I've kept Elvis off television. When a big record-selling singer goes on TV, his record sales drop. Then
