Broth of a player finds right plan

How I must tell you how it was with this tournament in Ireland, and let you be reading it with care for the great lesson there is in it. For in the matter of finance you will be seeing that there is more than one road to cook a potato.

South dealer

Neither side vulnerable

Opening lead—Four of Spades.

We will not be singing songs, mark you, about the opening lead. All both tables of the match West led the four of spades.

The first declarer was after taking the club finesse, and the king of clubs in the West hand all the time. West took the club king and had back a diamond, and now the declarer could be taking a diamond trick whenever South gave them a heart.

Och! Down one, for they did it taking a club, a heart, and a diamond.

Now I'm wanting to tell you how it was at the second table, and O. Barry playing the South cards. Elmsford won the first trick in dummy with the ace of hearts, and next the brot of a led led a club to the ace. Davi's bit of a spade.

Barry ducked a heart to East's trumps, and the diamond return with the ace, led a heart to the ace, and next the brot of a led led a spade to the ace. Barry's plan was better than a simple club finesse. First, the club king might drop under the ace. Second, setting up the hearts would almost surely work if East had the king of clubs; so that retaining the club finesse would do nothing. What do you say?

Answer: Bid four spades. You have only 7 points in high cards, and the club finesse, strength should see you through. You won't make game opposite every kind of notrump return, but in the long run you're better off hiding game than holding back.

Draft Quota Raised

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department has set the Army's draft quota for March at 6,000 men, the biggest monthly quota since January 1967.

The higher quota, announced Tuesday in a news release, is a result when the Army disclosed it would be able to draw by 20,000 men through larger draft calls for six months. The aim is to build the Army manpower to 860,000.

The quota for January and February is 4,000. In December, 6,000 were drafted.

A year ago, the Army drafted 18,000 in January as part of the buildup during the Berlin crisis.

(AP)—State and local police cracked an alleged multimillion-dollar lottery operation in downtown Harrisburg Tuesday night and arrested a man believed to be the boss of a long-time national racketeering State Police Commissioner Frank G. McCarthy said more than \$5 million worth of fake lottery tickets were seized at the Industrial Press office of the Telegraph building here.

Arrested were Murray Baker, of Miami, Fla., and Victor O. Gates, 48, a printer from nearby Camp Hill. McCarthy identified Baker as the son of the late Lou Cohen, alleged lottery king of the United States for almost a half century before his death in 1952. Baker and Gates were charged with manufacturing lottery tickets, being concerned with lottery and conspiracy at an arrangement before Harrisburg Alderman Elzaboth Armstrong Wagner. They were released on \$1,000 bond each.

The Doctor Says

HORMONES MAY HELP FACIAL PARALYSIS By WAYNE BRANDSTADT M. D.

Written for Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Q—Last summer I developed Bell's palsy. My face is drawn to the left and I can't smile. My doctor gave me a course of injections of vitamin B-12 and other kinds of medicine. Is there any kind of exercise that will strengthen the muscles?

A—Facial paralysis may be due to various causes including injury, exposure to cold, infection, and tumors. More often than not the cause cannot be determined. Although most persons with this condition recover spontaneously, electrical stimulation with galvanic current helps to keep the paralyzed muscles from wasting away while nature is restoring the nerves that control them. In acute cases Pituitary hormones such as cortisone may help.

Q—I have a dry mouth and lips. I have been under a doctor's care but I have not had any relief. Can I be helped?

A—Certain drugs, such as beta-blockers, will cause dryness of the mouth. If you have not been taking any of these drugs, a search should be made for the cause. Removing the cause is always the most satisfactory method of treatment. If the cause cannot be found, you will have to settle for palliative measures.

Sometimes starting a meal with a very sour pickle will start the flow of saliva. Be sure to clean your mouth and skin thoroughly after meals. If the dryness is especially troublesome between meals, it may help to take a little cooling cream in your mouth and use the tongue to coat all the inner surfaces. Cold cream should be applied to the lips. Also, there are various stick preparations in the market which are helpful.

Q—I understand myelitis is a degeneration of the spinal nerves. What treatment is used?

A—There are several kinds of myelitis or inflammation of the spinal cord. Poliomyelitis or infantile paralysis which is due to a virus is one form. In all forms a waiting blame must be supplied by the involved nerves usually recover. Massage and movement (both voluntary and assisted by nurse or physiotherapy) aid complete recovery is rare. No curative drug or other treatment is known.

Q—I am 55 years old. My doctor tells me I have choreo-athetosis. Is there anything to be done for that? I am almost blind.

A—Choreo-athetosis is a general infection caused by a uniserial animal parasite, the toxoplasma. In many persons the infection causes no symptoms but if it causes disease the symptoms are usually severe. It is sometimes acquired by eating raw or undercooked pork but this is not the only way it is spread. Details on the mode of transmission are not yet fully understood.

Q—The parasite frequently attacks the retina. A combination of sulfa drugs and penicillin is of value in halting the course of the disease, but cannot be expected to restore vision, such as after retina, after they have been severely damaged.

Q—Are steroid pills safe to take? What are the side effects?

A—Steroids is a powerful synthetic steroid hormone. The American Medical Association reported that it is safe. Earlier reports that it caused clotting of the blood in the veins have not been substantiated. Possible side effects include headache and nausea. This valuable drug has several uses. For the proper dosage in your case consult your doctor.

Negroes Live in Peace

By RICHARD F. WHALEN LEVITTOWN, Pa. (AP)—There were fiery crosses, violence and bloodshed five years ago when a Negro family moved into all-white Levittown. Today about 10 Negro or interracial families are scattered through this community of mass-produced homes that rose out of a marshland 10 years ago and now has 60,000 residents. Several of the Negroes are active in community affairs. The Levittown Housing Corp. is a Negro. His wife, Rochelle, is white. They have a son, Mike, almost 2, and another child on the way. How do they find life here? "Wonderful," he told you. They have lived here 3 1/2 years and receive many dinner and party invitations. Henry is an assistant manager of a supermarket and Rochelle is a school teacher. The first Negroes to move here were Mr. and Mrs. William Myra. After 3 1/2 years they left for Harrisburg, where he is an air conditioning technician for the year and six through children a year after the violence at the Myers home. "Things went just fine," Most Negroes are well-adjusted. He is president of a 37-member most airplan club. Mobley is secretary of the Levittown NAACP. No incidents were reported when the other Negro families moved in. "I've never heard of any, remains on both sides—white and Negro. The Myers say the Myers were bitter when they moved. Ford says, "After all they went through."

Truman Invited To Visit Sound

In a letter to the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, Truman criticized the stationing of the battleship Missouri at Bremerton in 1954 and blamed former President Dwight D. Eisenhower for it. "If Eisenhower wanted to place the Missouri in the Northwest, he found a better place," Truman said. Eisenhower has declined to comment. Truman suggested few persons could visit the Missouri in Bremerton. He said it should be moved, preferably to the Brooklyn Naval Yard where it was christened. Frank Eddy, president of a bus company, said he had visited the Missouri in the last five years. The Japanese surrender was signed aboard the Missouri in 1945. State police were called in. One night 22 state troopers swinging clubs chased a crowd of 500 teenagers back to their homes. A few months later the stationing was permanent. The stationing would permit Bremerton residents who were ordered to stop harassing and terrorizing activities. One of the seven was James Stewart, a Levittown resident and a native of North Carolina, who lives about eight doors away. "I'd still rather have it the way it is before they moved here," he said.
