ELISABETHVILLE, Katanga (AP)—With his control of Katanga shattered, President Mobutu's forces emerged from house arrest today and drove far into the jungle, urging his forces not to fire on advancing U.N. troops.

"I want to save my people from massacre," the secessionist leader declared on his arrival at Mobambo, on the Northern Rhodesian border. "I've dusty road miles southeast of Elisabethville, his fallen capital. A white U.N. jeep was the only escort for his motorcade."

Alcatraz Warden Spots For

Rockville-Vernon Third Shop Center Cleared by Zoners

Feeling that any possible future traffic difficulties can be handled satisfactorily, the Vernon Zoning Commission last night cleared the way for construction of a third shopping center at Vernon Circle.

Work on the huge center, to house a Sago-Alum department store and to be developed by United Coast Realty Co. of Hartford, is expected to start in the near future.

The new shopping facility, said to be comparable or even larger in size than the Tri-City Shopping Plaza (also at Vernon Circle), is to be situated directly north of the Vernon Circle Shopping Center, on the east side of Rt. 83. Cost estimates have been reported around the \$1 million mark, and the parking capacity has been reported at 27 cars.

In approving the plan of development, the zoning commission gave its sanction to a building area of 50,000 square feet or minus an adjustment of 10 per cent.

The adjustment factor will allow leeway to United Coast Realty to meet requests by tenants. Charles Brown, zoning commission chairman, explained that the commission members last night were presented with a site plan for the buildings. Initially, the plan called for a single building, but last night's zoning commission members decided to allow four separate buildings — all to be connected by a covered entrance-exit to the new shopping center. The state also directed that a traffic light be situated at the entrance-exit to be located at the northernmost extremity of the shopping center property.

Brown also said that "all shopping centers should complement and prove to be harmonious with each other" in respect to traffic flow.

He said that considering the presentation of all the facts and the testimony from state traffic officials, it seems there is no reason to expect traffic problems at the nearby intersection formed by Green Circle Rd. 83 and the entrance-exit to the Tri-City Shopping Plaza. He noted that adjustments at the entrance-exit to the Tri-City Shopping Plaza also should prove beneficial to control of traffic flow.

Fast talks on controlling traffic flow around the area led to suggestions for deceleration lanes on both the east and west sides of Rt. 83, another traffic light near the entrance-exit to the Tri-City Shopping Plaza, a traffic light at the intersection formed by Green Circle Rd. and Rt. 30, and the regulation of the Tri-City Shopping Plaza entrance-exit to control of Green Circle Rd.

Brown added that the state feels the lack of alignment between Green Circle Rd. and the entrance-exit to the Tri-City Shopping Plaza is a potential hazard at Green Circle Rd. and Rt. 30 by reducing the angle of the intersection.

He observed that the state had said it would continually "monitor" the area for future traffic difficulties with an eye to ensuring that corrective steps (such as possible additional traffic lights or deceleration lanes) be taken if the need arose.

United Coast Realty also has expressed interest, in cooperation with another firm, in developing the downtown area of Rockville slated for redevelopment.

In an earlier announcement, the Tri-City Realty Co. reported that the stores in its shopping plaza will be open for business on Feb. 13.

1959, although the Soviet premier has talked with Gomulka in Moscow many times since then.

There was some speculation among Westerners that Khrushchev, Communist party matter, would be discussed with Khrushchev and Khrushchev's visit to the Polish military.

Most observers felt the German question and the ideological split with Red China, frequently described in Warsaw as irreconcilable, would take priority in any Khrushchev-Gomulka talks as well as at the Berlin summit.

Diplomatic sources in London said the possibility that Khrushchev in Berlin will suggest face-to-face talks with Mao Tse-tung and other Red Chinese leaders in an attempt to heal the breach between the Soviet and Chinese Communist parties.

They also predicted the Soviet premier will offer the West a new version of a Berlin compromise. This, the London source said, would "concede" the right of American, British and French troops to stay on in divided Berlin, but only under the United Nations flag and not under national or North Atlantic Treaty organization banners.

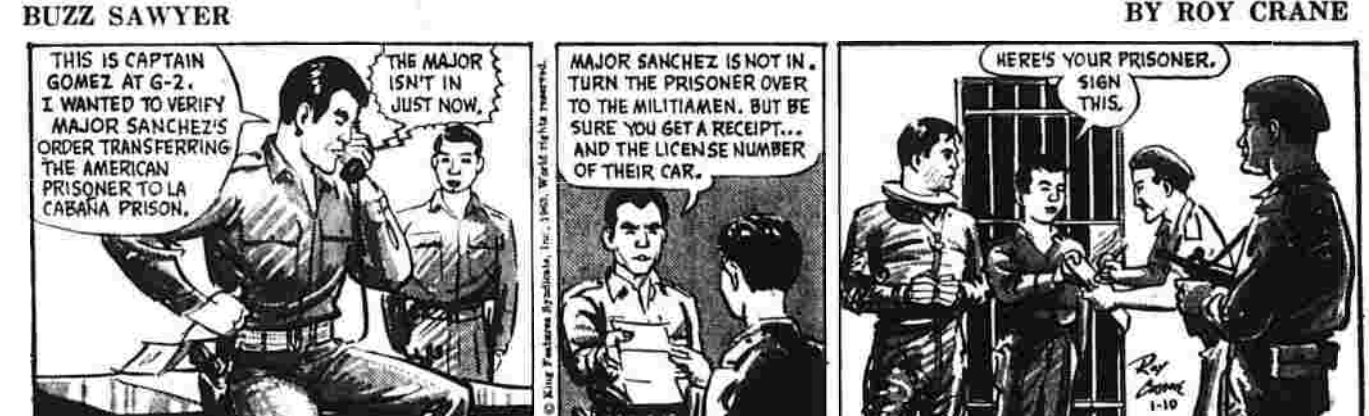
