LOME, Togo (AP) — A struggle for leadership of this tiny West African country appeared to be developing to-day in the wake of a ser-geants' revolt and the assas-sination of President Syl-

vanus Olympio. Two men emerged as possible heads of a new government-for-mer Premier Nicolas Grunitsky, 49, and Idrissou Antoine Meatchi,

49, and Idrissou Antoine Meatchi, 87, a former opposition leader in the Togo Assembly. A military revolutionary com-mittee that engineered the Sunday coup reportedly appealed to Gru-nitaky, a brother-in-law of the slain president to return from exile in heighboring Dahomey to form a government. Rumors spread that Meatchi was already back in Lome from exile in Ghana, which also bor-ders Togo. He had been accused by the Olympic government of adding exiled political conspira-tors.

# **His Message Reflects Relaxing of Tension**

WASHINGTON (AP)-President Kennedy called on Congress today for speedy action to spread a \$13.5-billion tax cut over three years and to achieve in time "a balanced fullemployment economy." Proposed reforms would recover \$3.5 billion of the lost revenue.

Greeted by a minute and a half standing ovation when he appeared before members in the jammed House chamber, Kennedy began his State of the Union message at 12:33 p.m., and told the lawmakers-and the nation via television and radio-that the state of the Union is good: "The recession is behind us."

Noting "the seeds of internal disintegration" within the Communist camp, he said "steady progress has been made in building a world of order."

But the President added solemnly:

"We cannot be saitsfied to rest here. This is the side of the hill, not the top. The mere absence of war is not peace. The mere absence of recession is not growth. We have made a beginning-but we have only begun." Even before he got a chance to?


