A Regional Refuse Disposal Study will be the subject of a special meeting of the Capitol Region Planning Agency, scheduled for 8 p.m. on Feb. 28 at the East Hartford High School on Burnside Ave.

The completed refuse study was scheduled for presentation at the CRPA's regular meeting in January, but was delayed because of technical complications in preparing the complex report.

The regional refuse study, which was initiated to "prepare regional plans for disposal facilities to serve both existing and future development, together with recommendations for modifications to implement the plans," was organized in August 1962.

Alps Tough on Actors

'Banner in the Sky' Made Without Doubles

Well, call me Mohamet! Walt Disney is bringing us a real mountain — The Matterhorn — specially tailored to fit our home screens in "Banner in the Sky," in full color of course (for those sets that can take it) this week and next (Feb. 17 and 24) in Wonderful World of Color (7:30 p.m. EST, NBC-TV).

To recreate the first conquest of the Matterhorn in 1865 by a Swiss party led by an Englishman, Disney took over the actual town of Zermatt (and somewhat made it over in the process), taught expensive actors mountain-climbing and then risked their expensive necks in shots we had been brought up to believe should be done by doubles.

So, when you see Michael Rennie hanging on for dear life, that's exactly what he's doing.

Rennie, who ducks bullets and knives as he weekly outwits treacherous acquaintances in his intrigue-laden "Third Man" series, really lived perilously for this one. I was pretty startled to hear that a star of his caliber was permitted to take such extraordinary risks as inching along a mile-high ice ledge without safety ropes—and to make it even worse, in the cumbersome of a hundred years ago.

Nor was it any easier for the other stars. Pretty little Janet Munro, who plays a Swiss miss, dangled down over a 3,000-foot drop held only by a triple rope tied to a tree stump... no trick photography there, James MacArthur (the only American in the international cast) like Rennie also cast off the safety lines.

No Nobody, even the crews, were exempt from climbing. Actor James Donald escaped with minor injuries when he fell 18 feet off a crag after a perilous climbing scene with Michael Rennie and Herbert Lom. Assistant cameraman Pierre Thiffax wasn't quite so lucky. After a tumble into a crevasse, he was pulled out with three broken ribs. (I forgot to ask how much insurance the company had to buy to cover this sort of derring-do).

Disney himself is so taken by

this story of the beautiful but terrifying mountain—and the courage of its conquerors—that he wanted to release it for both theater and television audiences because of the varying demands of the mediums, had to shoot two different versions, with television the more demanding of the two arts! (TV needs more closeups and shots in general have to be "tighter" to come across effectively).

James Ullman, the author, who is also a noted climber, stayed with the company in Zermatt. Of his many books on mountains and the men who climb them "because they're there," some are biographical, some autobiographical but for "Banner in the Sky" he chose to tell his story first in novel form.

So, in one of the most intriguing "twists" in film history we have a story of a fictional Englishman called "Captain Winter" (Rennie) and a Swiss youth called "Rudi" (MacArthur), two heroic survivors of the tragedy-marred first successful ascent of a fictional mountain called "The Citadel" in 1865.

Now, by somewhat strange coincidence, an Englishman named Capt. Edward Whymper led such a party to the top of the Matterhorn from Zermatt in 1865 and a Swiss youth from the town was one of the survivors.

By a further interesting coincidence, Whymper's daughter and granddaughter were also in Zermatt during the filming and had a marked influence on Rennie's portrayal. Mountains have remained a family passion into the third generation, the granddaughter being rated as an excellent climber. The two women had frequent talks with Rennie and put old family pictures and documents at his disposal.

And of course we'll see the real Matterhorn representing the fictional "Citadel" which represented the real Matterhorn in the first place!

Zermatt, the scene of the shooting, you might say, turned into quite a magnet for notables during the three months the film company was on location. The president of Switzerland and his wife dropped by; And America's "First Lady of the Theater," Helen Hayes, dropped by to visit her son James MacArthur, and for the fun of it also got into the act. If you look fast, you'll see her stroll by as an extra — sort of a la Alfred Hitchcock.

The town, in fact, isn't quite the same any more. It's still reachable only by horse-drawn vehicles; some of the people are still living in sturdy little cottages built 500 years ago, but something new has been added.

One little narrow, winding avenue characterized at first sight by a crew members as "just like out

New York — (NEA) — If The Nurses never does anything else in its career, it must take credit for one thing—it has changed the life of Susan Kohner.

Miss Kohner is a California product. She was born there, went to school there, started working there. Her mother is a former Mexican film queen (Lupita Tovar) and her father is a famous agent, Paul Kohner, who represents Lana Turner among others. She grew up with the Hollywood greats all around her; she called such famous directors as Sam Spiegel and William Tyler "Uncle Sam" and "Uncle Willie."

And she moved in the fast, giddy circles of the young Hollywood stars, dating the boys and palling around with the girls.

She made quite a few movies, many television shows and was leading what might be considered, in Hollywood terms, a dandy life. She had it made.

Then came an offer to do a guest star role on The Nurses, which is shot in New York. She accepted. But when she got here, she found the script was not ready. She had to wait a month before the filming was finished.

"By then," she says, "I had fallen in love with New York and that was that. This will always be my home base from now on."

What is it that she likes about New York, as opposed to Hollywood?

"I find I'm alive here," she says. "Not everybody I meet is a young actor, always talking about acting. I have time to explore things which interest me. I meet musicians, artists, doctors. I go to museums, concerts — even operations."

"All this has helped me come out of my shell. I always was very shy.

But I've been able to do the Tonight Show, with Johnny Carson, and The Merv Griffin Show—and just talk to Johnny and Merv. I could never have done that before.

"Now I can strike up a conversation with the person sitting next to me on the bus, or the person standing next to me waiting for an elevator. That's another thing I could never have done before."

She is happy as a clam (aren't there ever any unhappy clams?) in New York, working a little in off-Broadway plays, studying a lot. She's taking acting lessons, jazz dancing lessons (from a teacher recommended by Zina Bethune). She spends two hours a week recording for the blind, in English, French and Spanish (she also speaks German fluently).

Her income is slim — the off-Broadway role paid her \$45 a week. Mostly, she's existing on her savings. But she is content enough to turn down some whopping offers.

of "The Seven Dwarfs" only ding-dong" was treated to much fresh paint and plaster by the Disneyites—and now the townfolk have actually renamed their ancient byway "Seven Dwarfs Street."

But that was only the beginning. Every village needs a square. Right? Well Zernatt didn't have one. Production designer John Howell saw possibilities in a decaying "corner" of the village, repaired the broken masonry, added flagstone to courtyards, glass to windows, window boxes to windows, paint over all and, for a final flourish—a fountain in the courtyard. A grateful Zernatt rose to the occasion again. This is a permanent installation for their own use and they've named it "Disney Park."

The wildflowers dotting nearby meadows through which romantic leads Munro and MacArthur gambol, however, I am assured received no help from Hollywood.

The Matterhorn, at 15,000 feet, is not the highest mountain in Switzerland but has a powerful attraction still for climbers because of its beauty, tenacity and instantaneous changes in weather. Did any of "Banner" actors turn into lifetime mountain buffs? MacArthur on his own has actually buffed his way to the peak. Renia, though not "mountain-minded," before has done some recent climbing.
