RAPID INCREASE Telephones in service and long-distance calls both increased more rapidly in 1962 than in the pre-vious year according to the South-ern New England Telephone Company's annual report issued yes-terday.

A gain of 57,000 phones during the year brought the company's to-tal to 1,372,000. The company's 1962 construct tion program was the second largest in its history, with more than \$50 million spent for service ex-pansion and improvements. Earnings for the year were \$2.60 per

"Telephones in service and ong-distance calls both increased at a greater rate than in 1961, with resulting higher total revenues," said SNET president Ellis C. Maxcy. Per-share earnings, however, were 19 cents less than Conn., will be the main speaker in 1961 because of increased ex-penses. Dividenda were continued

at the rate of \$2.20 per share. The big construction program brought to completion a six-year project to provide direct distance dialing for all Connecticut phone users. 

casting Co. Vanccur was born Jan. 8 thirty-five years ago in Cleveland. He pronounces his last name "Van-Oak-Her." He received a degree at Northwestern in 1950 and im-mediately went to London and en-rolled in the London School of Economics Economics.

He served in the U.S. Army from 1952 to 1954 and, after dis-charge, joined the staff of the Manchester Guardian newspaper in London.
