MMH School Gets Approval

The Manchester Memorial Hospital School of Medical Technology has been approved by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the AMA and the Board of Schools of Clinical Pathologists, according to hospital spokesmen.

Dr. F. F. Becker, head of the pathology department, said that while the hospital has been training technologists, they were not necessarily people with college background. Now that the school has been approved, academic standards have been set up.

'Empire Star'

Ryan's First Break  
Came in Germany

"V. knows, he might be the next Gary Cooper." The producer finding this tantalizing recommendation for Ryan O'Neil in his mail of a morning now about three years ago was intrigued enough to send for the young man.  
The unlikely locale for this effort to ferret out a new American folk hero was Munich, Germany. For his part Ryan, who had just graduated from high school, was pretty startled to be called for an interview. (The "Cooper letter" had been written by his mother, former actress Patricia Callaghan, who's neglected to tell him about it.)  
Still, the present-day co-star of NBC-TV's modern-day Western, "Empire" (Tuesdays, 8:30 p.m. EST) went and was hired on the spot to start at the beginning—Ryan didn't look like Cooper but he had a warm, unaffected poise. The 6-foot-1 youngster had something else riding for him, too. His red-blond good looks fitted very neatly with the casting requirements of "Tales of the Vikings" which was what the company had come to Germany to shoot.

There were some dizzying hurdles in his path before the good roles started coming, though. First there were bit parts and stretches of little or nothing to do until the momentous day when an assistant director asked, "You a stunt man?" "Yup" shot back Ryan, who wasn't... but by then was determined to keep busy and get ahead. (There's more of that "Cooper-coincidence here, too. At the outset of his career back in the 1920s the late star had started out alternating bit roles and stunt work. Falling off horses was his specialty.)

Ryan, outgoing but not cocky, has a kind of charm that wins instant friends; in this case, the professional stunt men. Instead of screaming "fakes" they took him over and taught him stunt work on the sly, "so I wouldn't break my neck" says Ryan. And it was fast sailing for him from novice to apprentice to stunt man, "falling off horses, jumping off towers and choreographing fights—the works."

He has two personal heroes of

his own: His mentor, stunt man John Sullivan; and Richard Egan who stars as Jim Redigo, manager of the complex modern ranch which young Tai Garret (O'Neal) has inherited.

Ironically, really dangerous stunting is now forbidden O'Neal on "Empire." "I sure am glad they let me ride my own horses, though," he exclaims.

Where does he live? "Why in California with my folks," says Ryan. He does that is, if you discount the five months a year he's on location in Santa Fe, N. M.

Hollywood, where he was born, has always been "home" to Ryan, not that the family was ever there for particularly long stretches because Mrs. O'Neal, younger brother Kevin and Ryan always accompanied the head of the house, novelist, screen-writer Charles O'Neal on his travels, which meant living for various periods in Mexico, South America, Jamaica and Europe.

Though he took the long way around to get to the sagebrush, Ryan is about as American as a guy can get.

How come none of the foreign schools put an overtone of English accent to his speech?

"Well when I transferred from Hollywood High to a school in Switzerland, everyone spoke German. Everyone, that is, but me. I couldn't talk to anybody, couldn't understand much of what was going on and was so lonesome the folks had to take me away." His next school was the U.S. Army High School in Munich and there "the kids, of course, spoke American."

How does he feel about being away from family and friends for those five months a year? Well, for one thing he likes the show (mixed later offers including one from Walt Disney, to stay with "Empire"). Then, too, "though any sound stage is about the emptiest nothing in the world," it's a congenial company. Apparently no viewer misses Anne Seymour more than Ryan who played her son before she was "killed" because of a change in story line and a greater emphasis on "action." Miss Seymour—who had other commitments in New York—however, apparently didn't mind being written out.

Then, too, all those wide open spaces which provide the rich natural color for this colorcast program also are good horseback riding territory, which Ryan enjoys.

And now the company has a new diversion. The "Empire" boys were challenged to a basketball game by a team from the New Mexico Penitentiary (which won 84-46) and apparently plenty of practicing is on the agenda in the event of a return match.

And what does the younger set's contemporary hero think of contemporary tastes? Sports

cars? "Like 'em but am not overboard about them. I am overboard about folk music, though. And for artists—well my personal choice is Ray Charles."

Steady girl? "Yes, Joanna Moore." (They met when she appeared as an "Empire" guest.)

Does he think the twist has gone out? Grinned Ryan "I hope not, I've just learned it."

Mother would seem to have known her son pretty well when she wrote the fateful letter. Though he doesn't look like Gary Cooper he has a similarly genuine

manner, a way of not talking down to some folks and fancy to others. But, the panhandlers of New York might consider him another Fred Allen. They haven't had such an easy touch now in some years. City officials keep exhorting locals and visitors to give mendicants nothing but the cold shoulder, and a friend took Ryan in tow last time he passed through the big town so he "won't get taken quite so often." "I suppose they're right," he sighs, "but I've been lucky and it seems right to share it."

TV Personalities

Ben Grauer

For over three decades, NBC personality Ben Grauer has reported top stories behind the headlines and interviewed many of the world's leading newsmakers.

Grauer's NBC television and radio assignments have spanned a broad spectrum, ranging from international crises at the United Nations and Berlin to the first live America-Europe Telstar broadcast.

His thousands of interviews with celebrities have included presidents, diplomats, Nobel Prize winners, astronauts, ballet dancers, movie stars and champion athletes.

Along with his spot interviewing specialty, Grauer can be found on several regularly scheduled programs during any given season. Currently he delivers the early evening World News on WNBC-TV (New York) Mondays through Fridays, is commentator on the "Recital Hall" program of fine music broadcast via WNBC-TV Saturday evenings; acts as moderator, an assignment he has held for over 10 years, on the "Searchlight" public affairs discussion program on WNBC-TV each Sunday morning; handles the commentary for "The Best from Interlochen," a program of fine music from the famed Michigan institution broadcast by the NBC Radio Network Monday evenings and, also on NBC Radio, is frequently commentator for the Sunday morning religious program "Faith in Action." He also contributes numerous spot interviews to NBC Radio's "Monitor" weekend program.

Benjamin Franklin Grauer was born in New York City on June 2, 1908. Eight years later he broke into showbusiness as a child actor.

During the next decade he appeared on the Broadway stage and in movies produced at Fort Lee, N.J. performing with such famed stars as Theda Bara and Helen Hayes. But if he had heeded the advice of his professor of public speaking at City College, his career would have been short-lived. "I should flunk you, Grauer," said the professor. Nevertheless, Ben succeeded in passing the course. Soon after his graduation in 1930, he went to an audition at the NBC Studios. Two hours later he had a contract as a special events reporter.

Grauer has scored many "firsts" in radio and TV. He was emcee of the first radio show to present cash prizes ("Pot o' Gold") and gave the commentary for NBC-TV's first special event, the New York World's Fair opening in 1939. In 1949 he was assigned to



# Hollywood on TV

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — Only in Hollywood could a cigar chomping race horse bookie wind up as mayor.

I'm cheating a little. Because Louis Quinn just portrays a bookie named Roscoe in the television series, "77 Sunset Strip."

I'm also cheating a little because Mayor Quinn reigns in suburban splendor in Encino, a burgeoning San Fernando Valley community separated from Hollywood by a range of mountains and the Beverly Hills.

The "Valley" and Hollywood are connected by a pass wide enough for a broad freeway. Or, you can build a home on a Hollywood mountaintop and after a couple of rainstorms and some earth slippage both you and home will wind up in the valley.

What we really started out to report today is that Mayor Quinn's platform is founded on harmony — and it's working.

The bickering in Los Angeles' smog-shrouded City Hall which has the mayor at newsmaking odds with City Council has not filtered, along with the smog into San Fernando Valley.

At least not to Encino, where Mayor Quinn was installed in the honorary post the other day. He rules benignly and in a climate of neighborly friendliness. He can't possibly squabble with the city council because there isn't one.

Mayor Quinn was elected by the members of the Chamber of Commerce who annually choose a notable to represent the community on civic and social occasions like ribbon-cuttings, high rise building dedications, and the arrival of a home which has just slipped down out of the hills.

Mayor Quinn succeeded Gisele MacKenzie, who sang at such events.

Gisele in turn had succeeded George Gobel (who told jokes) and John Wayne, who brought his six-shooters to new bank dedications. Some years ago the mayor of Encino was a mayoress by the name of Ann Sheridan. She resigned about the time when "oomph" was a household word.

**QUINN WAS AWARDED** the office, according to the chamber of Commerce folks who voted for

him, because he is a good family man famous for his "Sunset Strip" gigs. He's also glib and resourceful as a master of ceremonies, a quality that a jolly Encino mayor can't very well be without.

His final goal of office, Mayor Quinn says, is to make Encino the Beverly Hills of the Valley. ("This means I'm campaigning to have all our garbage gift-wrapped.")

**AFTER FIVE YEARS** of steady employment as Roscoe on "77 Sunset Strip," he settled down in Encino in a 10-room ranch house equipped with the standard Olympic-sized swimming pool. He also has a corral and stables, but no horses.

He's one bookie who hates horses, and has yet to place a bet on his first horse race.

He's married to the former Christine Nelson, a singer, and they have a daughter named Christine Jr. "Sometimes we call her Sarah Jackman Jr.," he said. "That's because Mrs. Quinn sang the Sarah Jackman part on Allan Sherman's recording of 'My Son, the Folk Singer.'"

A number of other television stars such as Lorne Green of "Bonanza" live in and around Encino. But, unlike Los Angeles, there is no bickering.

"There's no rivalry," Mayor Quinn said. "Remember, we all believe in HARMONY."

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Shirley Knight is probably as typically American as a girl can be. She's a country girl who's hit it big in the city. She's the American dream come true.

Miss Knight is a lovely, intelligent and talented blonde from Lyons, Kan., which is farm country near Colorado. Her father was an Okie, and the Knights had been what Shirley calls "stick farmers." Her grandfather was kicked to death by a mule when Shirley was 3.

Today, she's a sophisticated charmer, with a college degree (her father is prouder of that than of her career; she's the first in her family to go to college) and a growing circle of admirers. In Hollywood, she was working steadily and probably would still be working.

But she has chosen New York, even though there's little gainful employment here except for Broadway and an occasional television part. She's had the latter; she was memorable as a girl who became a ghost on a recent U.S. Steel Hour. And she's anxious for the former.

Why did she move East? Three reasons, one of which is her desire to go on the Broadway stage. The second reason is that she's married to a young theatrical producer, Gene Person (pronounced "pair-shun").

"And the only time we ever quarrel," Shirley says, "is when we're in California. Here everything is fine. We get out there and I'm so bored—it's so dull there—that we're at each other's throats."

The third reason is that she's become typed in Hollywood "as the sweet young thing."

"I told my agent," she says, "that I wouldn't take any more television roles of that sort. If he could get me a part as a psychopath or a mean woman. O.K. Otherwise, I'll stay here. I think I could play any kind of a part, except a fat woman because I can't feel fat."

What does she do to keep busy here? Plenty. In the first place, she writes — "nice lady from Doubleday says she'll print my short stories" — and she hopes to write a play soon. Then she takes courses — acting, ballet, singing. She's decorating her apartment.

"And I have a list of places I want to see in New York," she says. "One day each week, I go to see one of the places."

And that helps to make New York look beautiful.

the first plane-to-ground TV show. When S. S. Morro Castle burned off Asbury Park, N.J., Grauer interviewed the first survivor ashore. He made the first on-the-spot news broadcast about Count Folke Bernadotte's assassination in Israel.

Grauer, whose voice was described "the most authoritative in the world" by the National Academy of Vocal Arts, is one of the most accomplished ad-libbers in broadcasting. He once described a parade for 60 minutes without any intermission.

For 12 years (1940-52) he was commentator for the NBC Symphony Orchestra broadcasts conducted by the late Arturo Toscanini.

A quick-thinking, fast-moving broadcasting personality, Grauer has been assigned to the Lindbergh kidnapping, the Hauptmann trial, the maiden flight of the dirigible Akron, and many political conventions. He has provided vivid word-pictures of Poughkeepsie regattas, the national tennis championship, heavyweight title bouts and 20 consecutive New Year's Eves at Times Square. From United Nations headquarters in New York, he has reported the fast-breaking developments in the crises on Lebanon, Suez and Hungary.

Grauer is a trustee in the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, and serves on its Emmy Awards Committee. He is active in the Overseas Press Club, of which he is a former vice president, frequently serving as moderator at OPC panel discussions.

Among his most treasured honors, Grauer was decorated by the French Government with the Legion of Honor in 1956.

He was married in 1954 to Melissa Kahane, noted interior designer. The Grauers live in a duplex apartment on New York's East Side, where Ben not only ministers to his voluminous library, but operates his own "between-hours" hand printing press. His other interests include amateur archeology, episcopalian food and good conversation.
