Colleen Dewhurst

Her Accent Not Irish

"A big handsome girl, a fine actress and truly one of our theatre's first ladies..."

One might add "versatile" and subtract "big." Proving her versatility, Colleen who's starring on the Show of the Week in "Something to Hide..."

And as for "big?" Well, she's more than two-thirds of the way to her goal of shedding 25 pounds before playing Cleopatra in June at New York's Shakespeare-in-the-Park.

How does she juggle such dissimilar roles and still make everything come out smoothly? "That's easy she said..."

She does have a juggling act that takes some doing though she acknowledged. It's trying to find bookings pleasing to her that don't conflict with those of her actor-husband, George Scott. She explained in that famous voice of hers...

"But suppose — for the sake of a for-instance — that George gets a nice role say in England and you get another nice offer..."

"Simple," she said turning intently with a gaze so clear it almost looks through you, "according to our plan, then I too would go to England. Whatever is good for his career comes first..."

George's interests transcend acting, however. He likes directing.

The Scotts, who met when they appeared in the same play in 1968, have two small sons, Alex and Campbell, aged one-and-a-half and two-and-a-half.

"Home life means a lot to us," she said, "and you know — like most actors — we get to spend more time with our children than most people. Except for something special like this TV play 'Something to Hide', both George and I are with them all day long. You know, an exciting thing happened to us this morning? We counted nine pheasants in the yard!"

"Hardly the typical picture of theatre folk in New York," one murmurs. "Tell us where you're living that these pheasants feel free to stroll by."

"We're in Riverdale," she said. (The leisurely northernmost corner of New York is technically within the city but twenty-five minutes from midtown and a whole aura away.) Seems they've leased a five-bedroom house a block from where the late Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia lived, on the top of a hill looking right down on the Hudson. "What type house? Not too new, beautifully kept, and what I call Spanish but which George calls California-type."

"I love to have guests in," she went on, "and early dinner is the most satisfactory because we usually play bridge. George won't allow talking once the game is under way and I love conversation so I get it out of my system over the dinner table."

As the silvery voice flows on, one becomes more and more curious about its individuality and quality. How did it get that way?

"Don't know," shrugged good-natured Colleen, "but by now I'm awfully used to having people ask me what kind of foreign accent I've overcome." The answer is no accent. English is her native language. She was born in Montreal and grew up in Boston and Milwaukee. "No one else in the family talks the way I do and always did. George settles it by just saying it's my speech pattern, period."

Colleen got her first taste of dramatics at college in Milwaukee and told her mother she wanted to go to New York and really study. The mother, not really believing she had talent, agreed to pay brief tuition so Colleen could prove to herself that acting was not for her. The news that her daughter really had what it takes certainly surprised but didn't upset the mother, and Colleen went on to study at the Theatre Wing.

She won her "Tony" Antoinette Perry Award for her appearance in the Pulitzer Prize drama, "All the Way Home." She's also a television award winner, having received the Sylvania award for "I, Don Quixote."

"I think you're going to like 'Something to Hide,'" she said as she gathered up her belongings to head for Riverdale. "I'm a modern woman in it, a successful publisher whose agreed to lie to protect my
