





This line in a 1963 baseball handbook sums up the way sportswriters and TV columnists throughout the country have been praising the baseball commentary of NBC sportscaster Joe Garagiola, after hearing his observations during broadcasts of World Series, All-Star and regular-season games.

One columnist called Garagiola

"The new hit man in the tele-vision sportscasting game," and another said he was "...a mod-ern-day Will Rogers of baseball who keeps the conversation sparkling even when the game isn't."

Recently signed to a long-term contract as an NBC sports commentator, Garagiola will provide the color commentary during NBC-TV's Saturday and Sunday "Major League Baseball" telecasts for the third straight year (blacked out by stations in major league markets.) He also has a five-morninge-a-week sports show on NBC Radio, and makes occasional appearances on NBC-TV's "Toappearances on NBC-TV's "To-day" and "Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson" programs. He was the host of "Baseball '63," NBC-TV's pre-season salube to the national pastime.

Garagiola won a first-place award as radio's "Sportscaster of the Year" in the 21st annual All-American Awards Poll of Radio-Television Daily.

Before adding the identifica-tion of NBC-TV sportscaster, Garagiola was well known as a former National League catcher, a St. Louis baseball announcer, author of a best-seller and a fa-vorite master of ceremonies and raconteur along the baseball ban-quet circuit.

In recent months, his emcee invitations have extended beyond sports affairs. During March he was master of ceremonies for the entertainment portion of the In-ternational Radio and Television Society's banquet honoring Bob
