demonstrations some time ago resulted in the quiet desegregation of lunch counters in the business district.

Plans remained unchanged for another massive protest of segregation at two white theaters tonight.

The mass arrests in Tallahassee provided the major development on the racial front Thursday, and anti-segregation activity was popping in many points across the nation.

Integrationists made plans to increase the tempo of demonstrations against segregation in Jackson, Miss.

A Negro spokesman said a massive Birmingham-type campaign will be launched in Los Angeles with total elimination of discrimination as its goal.

Cities experiencing racial demonstrations Thursday included Philadelphia, Chicago, Baltimore, St. Louis, Chattanooga, Tenn., and Cambridge, Md.

In Tallahassee, the 250 jailed by county officers were part of a first protest before theater. An hour later, city police broke up a second march of approximately 200 Negroes and arrested 37 on charges of unlawful assembly.

The police used two tear gas bombs and a determined line to turn back the second group. The demonstrators refused to leave a churchyard where they had taken refuge. The demonstrators were charged the demonstrations were hurting the business.

Two hours after the judge's ruling, 5 p.m., Negroes assembled before the theater in a quiet demonstration, the 10th in 10 days. Some carried picket signs urging desegregation.

Across the street, more than 100 white persons gathered.

Donors in the demonstration of officers watched both groups.

Twelve minutes after the Negroes arrived, Sheriff Bill Joyce ordered them to disperse. When they refused, he ordered the group arrested for contempt of court.

While being arrested, the Negroes chanted: "Freedom, Freedom, Freedom."

Members of the Congress of Racial Equality have said the demonstrations would continue until segregation is ended.

Mayor Sam Yegor said he would present to the city Commission a request by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People for a biracial committee to resolve the segregation.

Police at Jackson, Miss., arrested 27 demonstrators Thursday, including an integrated group of 14 who knelt on the post office steps to pray for racial peace and progress.

Pupils at a Negro high school spent the afternoon chanting "Freedom songs" but demonstrations in downtown Jackson were scattered, quiet and brief.

The NAACP accused police of brutality, but Detective Chief M. F. Hester said the police "did not beat more than 800 teen-agers were beaten, although they threw rocks at policemen, injuring one slightly."

The Philadelphia School Board and building contractors involved in a racial dispute agreed to work on five qualified Negroes to work on a school desegregation plan. The NAACP will halt picketing of the project.

Picketing has been staged since last Friday in support of demands for more jobs for Negroes in several classes, 14 policemen and five Negroes have been injured.

City officials in Memphis, Tenn., announced that all public recreational facilities except swimming pools and wading pools will be desegregated immediately. The pools will remain closed for the time being, they said. The action came three days after the U.S. Supreme Court knocked out the city's 10-year desegregation plan.

See President Lyndon B. Johnson's speech at Gettysburg, Pa., that all Americans, white and Negro, should "lead the way through this moment of challenge and destiny on racial problems."

More than 1,500 Negroes staged an orderly demonstration at a Chicago cemetery where 6,000 Civil War soldiers are buried, protesting the cemetery's alleged refusal to cremate the body of a Negro woman.

As an experienced bridge player you should memorize certain positions so that you can spot them at the table without having to think. Even a moment's thought at the table will give you away.

What do you say?  
Answer: Bid four spades. There should be a good play for game even if partner has a misdeal from the hand.

It started with J-10, however, South must lead the queen of spades (1 ♠ East had the A-J-10 South is down whatever he does).

As you see, West made the correct play when he refused to win the first trump trick. If West takes the ace of spades, South is compelled to lead the queen of spades next. East's jack will drop, and South is sure to make the contract.

There is a fair chance that South will make the wrong trump play if West refuses the first trick—but West does not want to appear foolish. When the hand played a low trump, South could see what was going on and no trouble deciding to lead the queen of spades to the meeting.

Remember this position now so that you will be able to make the right play at the table without having to do any obvious thinking. Dummy has a singleton trump, and you are behind declarer with A-K-Q. Don't win the first trump trick; and don't make it obvious that you "retesting" the trick.

There has been a voluntary desegregation in the city.

**Way Cleared to Plan Downtown Renewal**

The Manchester Redevelopment Agency (MRA) has received a tentative go ahead from the Federal Urban Renewal Agency to prepare a general plan for downtown Manchester.

Town Director Theodor Powell has asked General Manager Richard Martin to include the first meeting on Tuesday.

The directors will be asked to approve submission to the Urban Renewal Agency (URA) of an application for \$100,000 to finance a detailed planning study of the downtown area.

Before the federal government can advance funds for the project, it must have the approval of the town government. In this case the board of directors.

While the director's approval of the MRA may require an initial budget of about \$100,000 for planning, the federal government would be required to provide the balance of the project's cost.

The redevelopment area, which is about 113 acres including public land and streets, extends from the east side of Main St. to the west side of Spruce St.

It runs from the south side of Charter Oak St. to E. Center St. No town money will be involved in the project until plans are prepared and approved. The town is not obligated to fund the project, and if it is turned down will owe no money for the planning work.

The redevelopment project will be designed, Rybozyk says, "to improve and stimulate the growth of the Central Business District through off-street parking and improvements in traffic circulation. Property owners will be encouraged to redevelop their residential areas to the east of Main St. included in the area would be eligible for FHA mortgages.

to finance property improvements. If necessary, it may also allow the town to start street widening and improvement projects, such as water and sewer main changes, at least partially financed under the urban renewal program.

Rybozyk explained that "this will not be a clearance program where we will knock everything down, but that structures are in such too good condition for that."

Instead, the MRA will recommend improvements to the residential buildings in the project area that are basically sound.

The contract could make improvements on their own, or could apply for a federally sponsored mortgage loan.

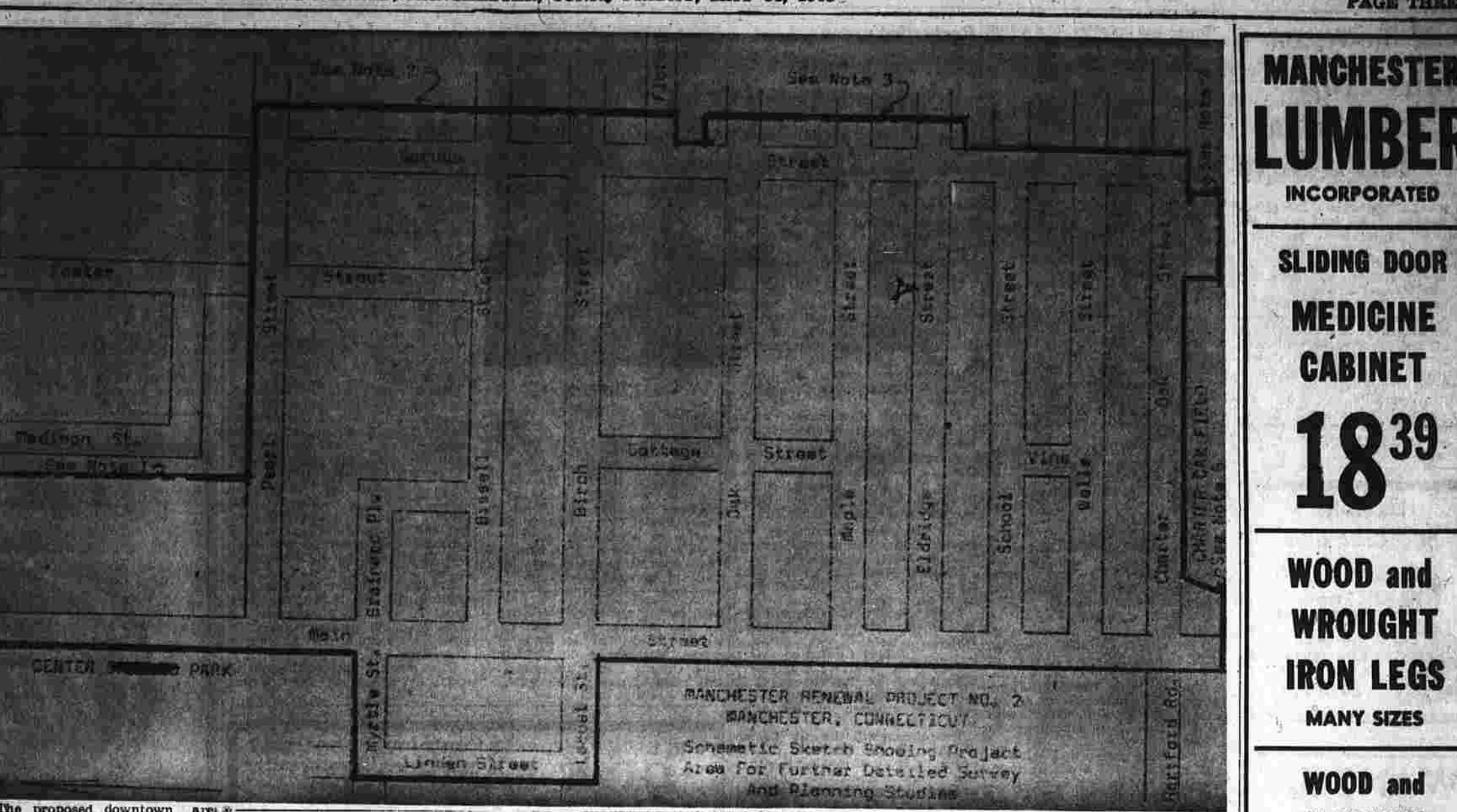
Houses will probably be required to meet the standards of the town's housing code adopted last year. If the property holder does not want to take advantage of the project to make necessary improvements, the MRA would offer to buy the property for resale to a party who would.

Rybozyk has not estimated the overall project cost. The present project in the North End, with about 30 acres, will cost a total of about \$1.5 million, of which about \$300,000 will come from the town.

The federal government will reimburse the town for the project. In the past the state has financed one-half of the remaining costs.

Director Powell said he received notification from Rybozyk of the federal government's approval to proceed with the project. He said he has asked General Manager Martin to include consideration of the proposed application on the agenda for the directors meeting on Tuesday.

"We are very pleased to see the proposal progressing so rapidly," he said, "and hope to see it acted on immediately. I am going to ask for approval on Tuesday so the project can get under way."



The proposed downtown area renewal project for Manchester will encompass about 131 acres of land, within the heavy line extending from E. Center St. to Charter Oak St. and from as far west as Linden St. to as far east as the east side of Spruce St. The project line west of Madison St. excludes houses facing Madison St. Along Spruce St. the line runs behind houses facing the road, with the exception of the houses on the east side of the road, and also excluding houses at numbers 173 through 245. All the properties on the east side of the road are included, as are properties numbered 1 through 17 on South Main St. All other project boundaries correspond with street lines.

"It is our hope that the entire area will be cleared; instead redevelopment agency will encourage property owners to perform major improvements on houses themselves with federal mortgage loan assistance if necessary. Business on Main St. will be encouraged by new parking facilities and improved traffic circulation on widened or altered streets."

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## Where "Fire of Passion?"

We find a British columnist, Lord Altrincham, in the Manchester Guardian, taking a view of the American racial conflict which ought to receive its prayerful consideration in the thoughts of many Americans, both low and high.

"No longer," writes Lord Altrincham, "is the problem concentrated in the South, even though 90 per cent of all American Negroes live in the South, today only 10 per cent of them live there. The balance of population has shifted, especially towards the great industrial cities of the North."

"Wherever they are," the races do not mix. The Negroes live in their separate ghettos. From the best neighborhood Negroes are excluded by social and economic sanctions which are more potent than any law. In marginal districts, where white families move out as soon as a single black family moves in. In such conditions, the integration of schools is a mockery. If people do not live in the same catchment areas, their children cannot go to the same school."

"There is a growing conflict between black and white in the United States. It is not an open conflict, like the struggle between North and South a hundred years ago; it is a conflict which neither side may yet be fully aware of. A concealed civil war... 'Racialism in the United States will not die of its own accord. All the indications are that it will become ever more widespread and intense."

"A heavy responsibility rests upon the Federal Government—that is to say, upon the President. Few would doubt that, on the racial issue, Mr. Kennedy's head is in the right place. But what about his heart? Intellectual conviction is not enough. The man who will change the attitude of white Americans towards their darker-skinned compatriots must be able to illuminate the arguments of reason with the fire of passion."

"Mr. Kennedy has taken at least one enormous risk in foreign affairs—a risk which quickly paid off. In taking it he had the overwhelming support of the American people. An all-out crusade against racialism in the United States would be an even riskier operation, in the same sense that it would jeopardize Mr. Kennedy's electoral prospects in 1964 and might keep him in the wilderness for a decade or more. But he is still a young man. Under the Constitution he can serve only one more term as President. Most worry so much about immediate popularity and short-term results that they forget the long-range glory of his career in a slow victory at home over the taboos of centuries—a victory in which his weapons would be neither force nor guile but precept and example."

This British columnist thus asks, in effect, the same question we asked at the time of Little Rock, that of whether there might not have been some personal heart-to-heart employing thing. Mr. Eisenhower might have done instead of sending his federal troops to the scene. We have always wondered whether some such act of personal leadership, then, might not have won the whole nation in behind him, and out decades of the time we might need to win our way out of life on the racial problem. We have thought that, for such a possibility—for illuminating what Lord Altrincham calls "the racial fire of passion," Mr. Eisenhower had much more potential and more equipment and prestige than Mr. Kennedy can yet claim.

Yet Lord Altrincham asks the question with regard to Mr. Kennedy. He is the individual in position to make such an effort, if it is to be made. Would he or should he take the risk? If he did, how many of us would move forward to share those risks?

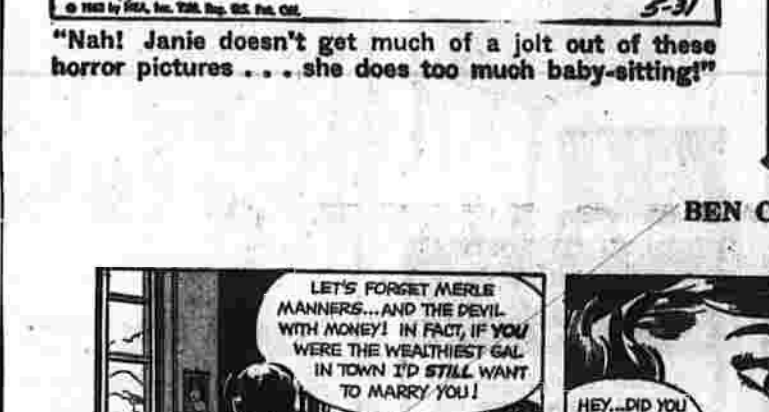

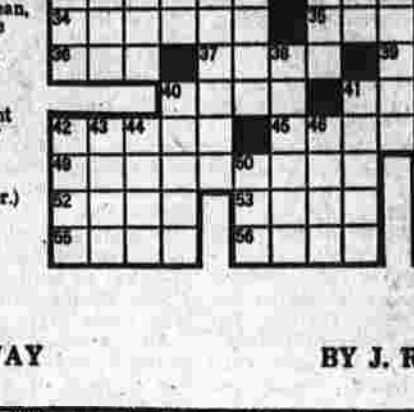
