### The Doctor Says

PINK EYE HAS MANY CAUSES FROM SLIGHT TO SERIOUS Wayne G. Brandstadt, M. D. Newspaper Enterprise Assn. You are not exactly "in the pink" if you have pink eye. This condition may be due to many causes, but all of them involve inflammation of the mucous mem-brane that lines the inside of the ds and is reflected back ove ne white of the eye.
Infections of this membrane conjunctiva) occur but they e remarkably rare because the tears are constantly washing germs and dust particles toward e inner corner of the eye. From ere they are either extruded onto the skin or pass through a small duct into the nasal passage and throat. In addition to this mechanical action the tears contain a substance that kills most of the common bacteria. Pink eye may occur with or without a mucous discharge. In children it is often due to eye sctrain or the need for corrective glasses. It may be due to a for-eign body in the eye and can be made much worse by unsuccess ful poking about in an attempt to dislodge it. If you know you have gotten something in your eye, you should first try washing it out with an eye dropper and eye drops. If this doesn't work let someone who has had experience turn back the lids and gently remove the offender with cotton wool wound around the end of a toothplek. The cotton should first be moistened with clean tap water. tap water. Pink eye may be due to rubbing the eye with dirty or sweaty (saity) fingers, to overindulgence in alcohol or to exposure to ul-traviolet light directly from the sun, from a sun lamp or reflected

even though no foreign body is present. In most cases eye drops or an eye salve placed in the eye two or three times a day for a day or two and resting the eyes will allow the condition to clear up. But if it doesn't clear up promptly you should promptly you should see an eye specialist because pink eye may e incidental to a more serious In true conjunctivitis there i always an associated mucus discharge which may cause the lids to stick together during the night. Allergic conjunctivitis is especially prevalent during the seasons when pollen is floating about in the air. You can't see it but if you have an allergy you know it is there. Pink eye of this type is almost always present with bouts of hay fever. For these conditions it is wise to have your doctor find the cause because without this cause because without this knowledge the most effective treatment cannot be given.

Another type of true conjunctivities is due to bacterial infection. In the warmer canth tion. In the warmer months epidemics of this type of pink eye may be spread by improperly operated swimming pools. Here again the offending organism should be identified so that an antibiotic eye wash can be reitibiotic eye wash can be pre-





Raffle Business In Connecticut

Shows Increase

HARTFORD (AP)-The reffie In 1962, a total of \$4,086,742 in chances were sold in Connecticut, \$568,186 over the previous year, State Police report.

Raffles, bingo and games of chance at bazaars are the only legalized forms of gambling in the state. Under a 1955 law, raffles and bazaars may be sponsored by church, charitable, civic and other organizations, subject to State Police regulation.

State Police Maj. Carroll Shaw, in a report yesterday, said 1,192 raffle permits were issued in 1962, compared with 1,139 in the previous year.

Shaw also said the old 10-cent raffle appears to be passing from the scene. Typical raffles, he said, now sell for 50 cents or a dollar.

The only 10-cent chances were sold by a Cub Scout Pack, he said. Sponsoring organizations made

sold by a Cub Scout Pack, he said.

Sponsoring organizations made a total net profit of \$2,436,544 from raffles and bazaars last year, Shaw said.

The raffle and bazaar business was best in Bridgeport last year with net profit running to \$235,622, followed by Stamford, \$201,549, New Britain, \$186,900, and Hartford, \$159,865.

The bazaar and raffles report did not include the profits from bingo. These are not reportable.

However, Shaw estimated the return from legalized bingo as about equal to that from bazaars and raffles.
