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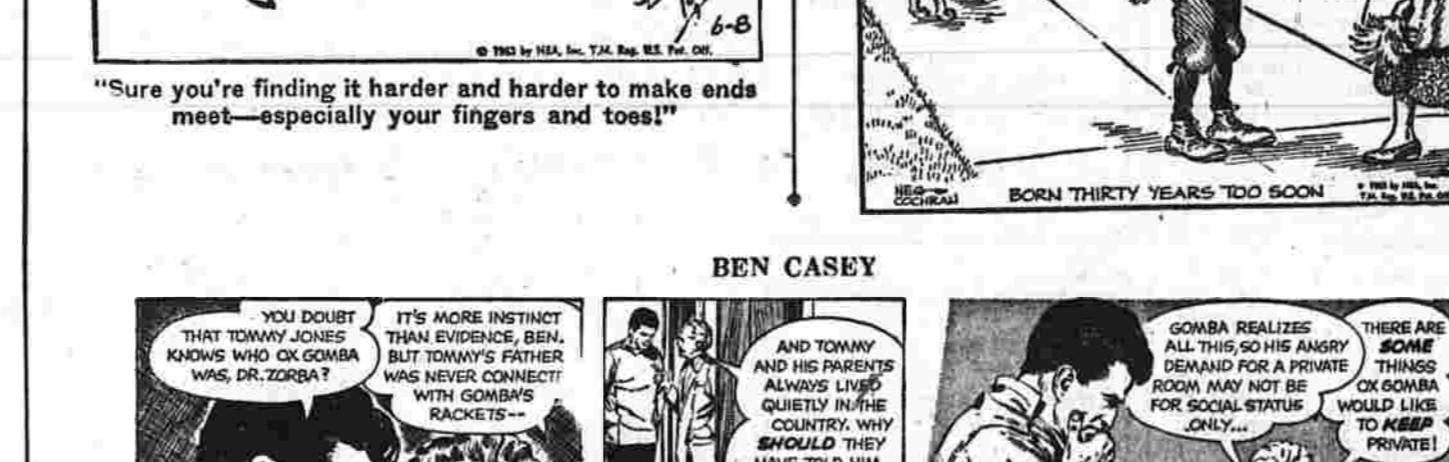
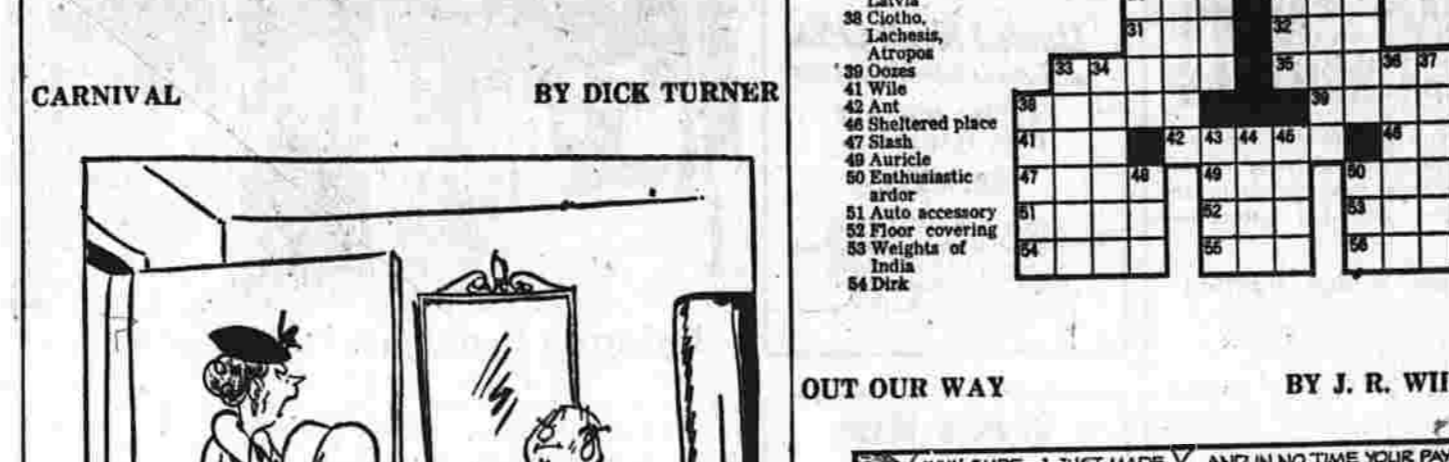

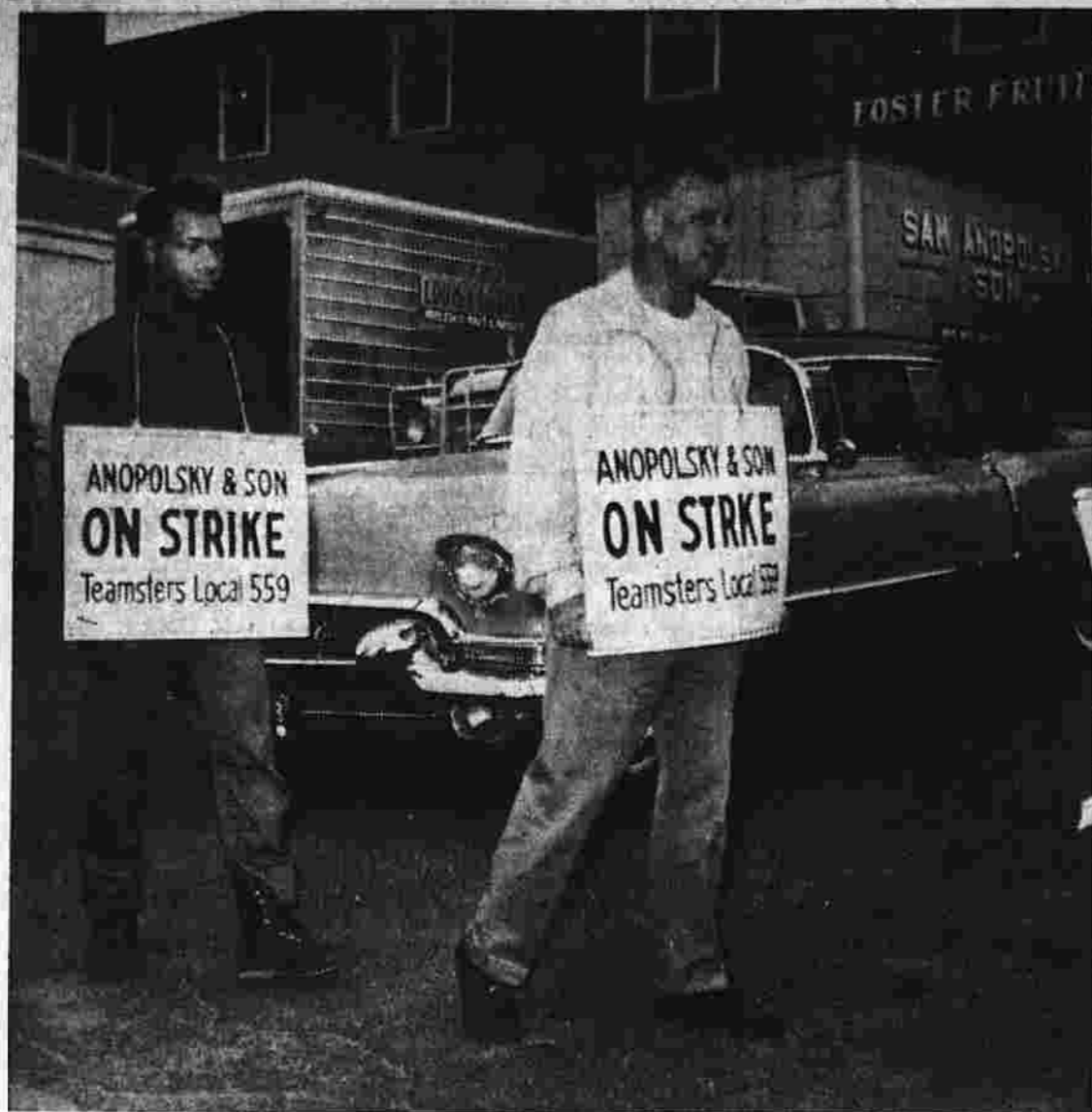

Supt. Philip C. Liguori signed a new three-year contract with the board of education at its executive meeting Wednesday night, although his present contract does not expire until June 1964, informed sources said today.

The action, taken in a session labeled "personnel," came as a surprise to all board members. Chairman John McCarrick evidently intended the contract vote as a vote of confidence in the superintendent. The vote by secret ballot was 4 to 3 in favor of renewing the contract. 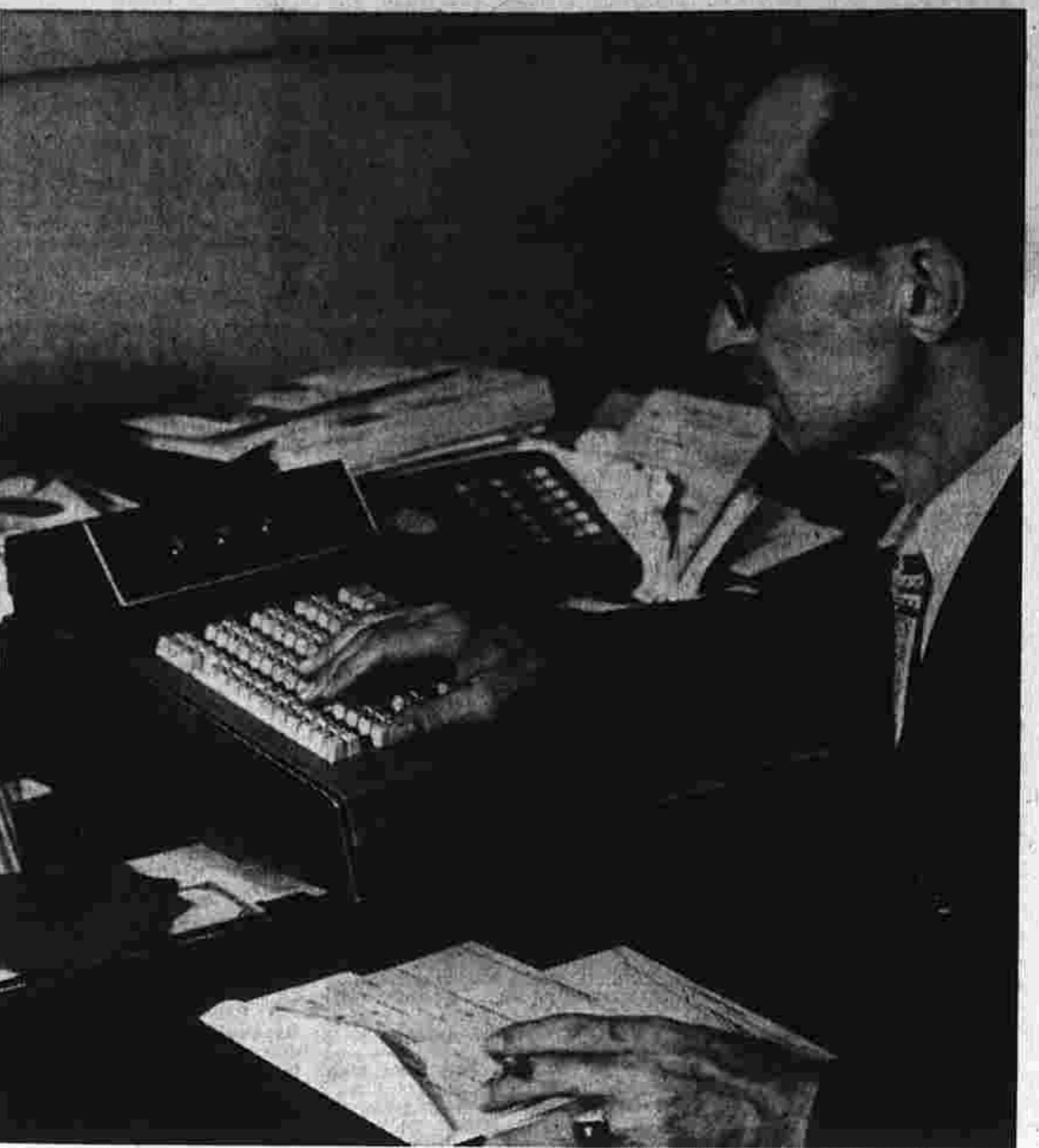

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School Starts Now For TV Principal

"No more teachers, no more books," the freedom bell will be ringing out any minute now for the nation's pupils; and teachers, too. But for many school administrators and department heads, summer is all too apt to mean work, work and more work getting ready for the fall term. Beating them all to the gate, though, are the principal and staff of Jefferson High, mythical setting for NBC's forthcoming series, "Mr. Novak" (already the recipient of warm praise from the National Education Association) which is now afflicting in Hollywood.

I latched onto an interview with Jefferson's "principal," Oscar-winning actor, Dean Jagger, after the pilot film had been previewed to educators and before the "first semester" got rolling. (The title role—that of an able young teacher on his first job—is being portrayed by James Franciscus. And the first telecast is set for September 24, 7:30-8:30 p.m.)

What does Dean Jagger think about education today? Acting? Life in Hollywood? Jagger walked me to a quiet corner at the NBC studios where we could talk. At six feet, three inches, Jagger seems even taller because of his trim figure and erect bearing. When he's through playing principal, I thought, he'd be dazzling as a general. In fact—though he doesn't resemble him facially, he does remind me of ex-President Eisenhower.

from college, you see, in my sophomore year." "Wait a minute! Let's retrace. You'd run away from college, then you taught school and all this before you were 17?" "Deliberateness is a charming art with Dean Jagger. His bright blue eyes carry the full force of his smile. "In those days," he said, "after finishing high school you could take a 10-weeks normal school course after which, if you passed your state teacher's exam, you could teach. I knew more than my students because I taught the elementary grades . . . and I mean grades, all eight of them. "I got the unruliness under control fast," he noted. "Then as now I'm a believer in strict discipline. Jagger is still grateful for a discerning professor's probing "over tea and oaks" which helped him discover what he wanted. "I discovered," he recalls, "that I had always been happiest when I was doing orations or poetry readings at churches and clubs."

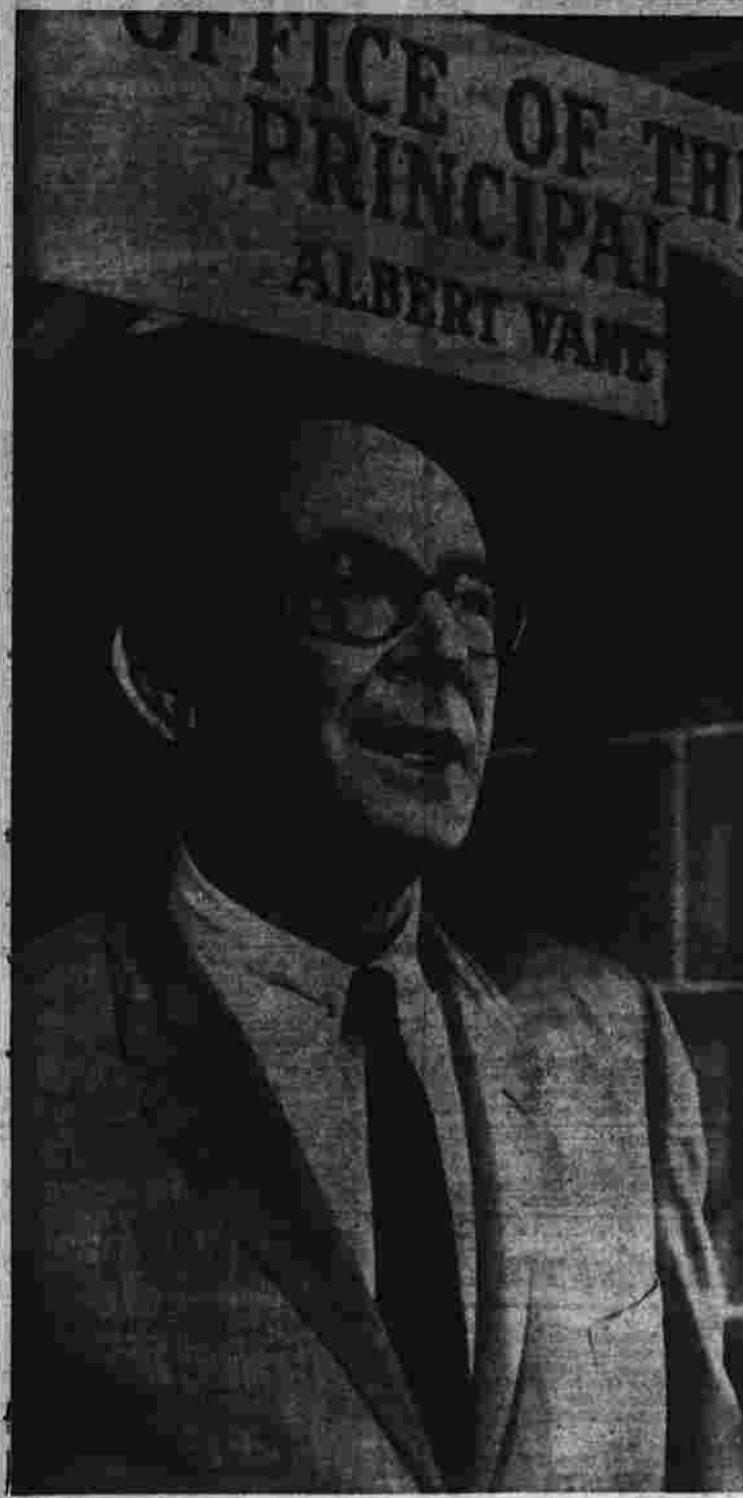
Thus enlightened he wasted no time borrowing \$60 from an uncle and, accompanied by a classmate, running away to Chicago.

Then came Pop's slow answer, "You know best." To the lasting

TV Notebook

NEW YORK — (NBA) — Here, right from the Boone's mouth, are the facts about next season's most intriguing television experiment, The Richard Boone Show.

In case you missed the announcements, this hour-long NBC show will be an anthology series with a difference. The difference is that it will be acted by a repertory company — the same actors and actresses each week, in different roles.

"There are two advantages to a repertory company," Boone says. "The first is that we will have continuity of actors. I think the reason why television anthologies have so far not been as successful as ordinary series is that the public does not get to know and like the actors. On our series, they will, because they will see them every week."

"Secondly, we'll have more rehearsal time through this device. One week I may have a small part — I'll only be on camera for one scene that takes one day to shoot. The rest of that week I can be rehearsing for a bigger part the next week."

"On most shows, the actors get one day of rehearsal. This way, we'll get four or five."

Boone says he's been "fiddling" with this idea for four years, and "trying to sell it" for three. CBS turned it down, but NBC said yes quickly.

He has already assembled 11 of the 14 performers he wants for his company. He used two criteria for picking them—the range of parts they could play and "their emotional compatibility."

Huntley on Slums

Mobilization for Youth, a demonstration project to help the underprivileged residents of a New York City slum area cope with the enormous problems of their environment, will be the subject of "Chet Huntley Reporting" Tuesday, June 11 on NBC-TV (10:30 p.m. EDT).

Funds provided by the Federal government, New York City and the Ford Foundation are being applied intensively to a section of New York's Lower East Side—the classic "melting pot" area—housing 50,000 families. The project, over a three-to-five-year period, seeks to develop new techniques in attacking the problems of unemployment, sub-standard housing, illiteracy, language difficulty, mental illness, juvenile delinquency and narcotics addiction.

NEW YORK (AP)—It is accepted as show business gospel that in every comedian beats the heart of a hidden Hamlet.

But Nanette Fabray, one of the blithest comedienne of our day, harbors no frustrated hopes of playing Lady MacBeth. No tragic tears for her, thank you.

"I adore light comedy," said Nan, who is winding up a nine-month role as First Lady in Irving Berlin's Broadway musical, "Mr. President," in which she is costarred with Robert Ryan.

"The only thing is that musical comedy is looked down on as a second-class citizen in the performing arts. Drama is considered the grand lady, the matriarch, of the theatrical world.

"Actually, I've found that most musical comedy performers can do a good job in drama. Look at Gertrude Lawrence, Mary Martin, Red Buttons. But the step the other way is rare.

"In the theater you have to start with drama. You can graduate to comedy only if you're well-trained. To me, comedy is the highest form of theatrical endeavor, requiring more understanding and a better sense of timing."

Nan, who started as a tap dancer at the age of 3, played in the old "Our Gang" comedies, and learned mimicry from that cross-eyed master of the silent screen, Ben Turpin.

After growing up, however, she switched to ingenue roles in dramatic plays. It was producer George Abbott who advised her to return to light comedy in "High Button Shoes."

Miss Fabray went through an emotional ordeal a few years back, complicated by a divorce, career crises, and fear of encroaching deafness.

Today all those troubles have melted away. Nan is profoundly happy with her second husband, screenwriter Ronald MacDougall, and their 4-year-old son, Jamie.

"Because of my hearing loss," she recalled, "I used to try to make people adjust to my world.

"A friend suggested the difference between Dick and me," said Jerry, who is 5½ years the younger. "He said Dick is an actor who does comedy and I am a comedian who does acting.

"That about captures it. Dick is more the college graduate type—smooth, polished. I'm less smooth, more of a country type. I couldn't possibly do the heavy acting that he can do. On the other hand, he couldn't do 10 minutes of standup comedy, as I do."

The two Danville, Ill., boys went their separate ways professionally until Jerry did a two-partner on Dick's show last year.

"That did it for me, and I'm extremely grateful," said Jerry. "It was a perfect showcase and I started getting bookings I could never get close to before, shows like Ed Sullivan and Garry Moore.

"It plays beautifully," said Jerry. "It is simple, which is the way quiz shows should be. It also gives me a chance to get in a little comedy, which shows like 'Password' seldom do.

"I have to remember to be myself, otherwise I could fall into the quizmaster trap and play it dead serious, like Bud Collyer or Dennis James."
