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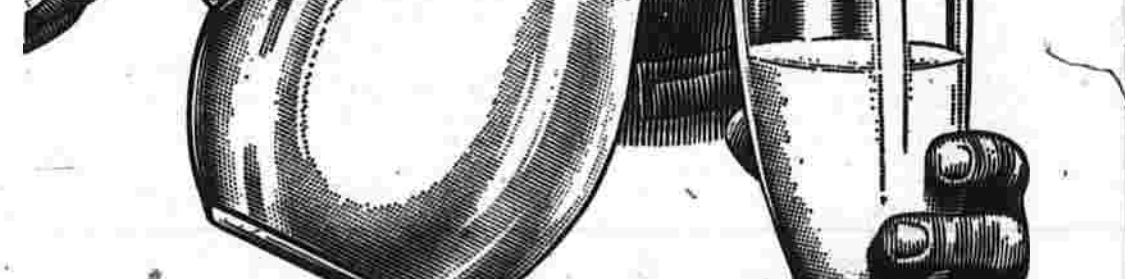

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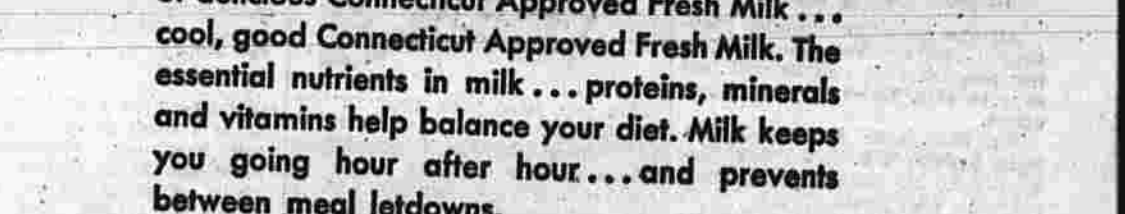
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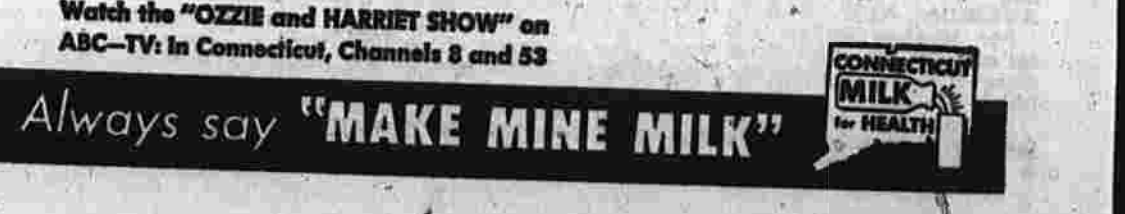

Columbia School Wing Cost Figured At \$431,000

The planned addition to Horace Porter School will cost an estimated \$431,000, according to the school building committee which met last night.

The plans will be presented to townselects at a special town meeting June 29 in Yonnah Hall. Included are 10 classrooms, a library, a music room and a teacher's room. There will be extra toilet facilities and a janitor's supply room. The alterations to the kitchen and the cafeteria in the present building make up a sizable part of the expenditure.

Three of the upper grade rooms will be changed to make them suitable for Grades 3 and 4. All grades will have three rooms available. The present building will accommodate Grades 3, 4 and 5. The proposed new wing will accommodate Grades 6, 7 and 8.

Present plans call for the new wing to be on the southeast side of the building, with a two-story arrangement.

The plan calls for a drastic change in the heating system which has never been adequate. There will be a new boiler room and a heating unit for the whole building. It is expected to try for an altitude record in the next two months.

The present record for winged construction is \$1,700 per square foot. The new wing will be built at a cost of \$100 per square foot. It is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Sheinwold on Bridge

IMPORTANT BUZZ IS HARD TO FIND BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD

Once again we have ruffled the subject of our discussion. Many players will probably find it hard to believe that the first ten tricks will be played at all.

East deals 3 of Spades. Both sides vulnerable.

North plays the hand at four notrump. He will be unable to ruff, course. This will not bother him since he can take the first ten tricks without any trouble at all.

Should South bid four notrump instead of five clubs? Many experts would do so in tournament play, but most rubber bridge players would prefer a contract of five clubs.

West would defeat the contract if he had a heart, but South has a chance to make the game and the normal spade lead.

South goes down if he puts up the ace of spades. Drives trump and leads diamonds in the hope of bringing in dummy's long suit. West is sure to get in with a diamond and lead a heart through dummy's king. The defenders thus get one diamond and two hearts.

Where is this mysterious ruff that South has? Is it a ruff in dummy's hand? To begin with, declarer must play the ace of spades from dummy at the first trick.

East wins with the jack of spades, and South later discards a diamond on dummy's ace of spades. Declarer can draw one overtrick unless East is cautious enough to cash the ace of hearts at the second trick.

Daily Question: As dealer, you hold: Spades, A-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1; Hearts, K-7; Diamonds, K-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1; Clubs, J-10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1. What do you say?

Answer: Pass. You have 11 points in high cards and 3 points for the distribution. A 13-point hand is an optional opening bid. You would open with one diamond if the suit were bolstered up with the ten and nine, but that is no great virtue in itself, and to open on a very ragged suit.

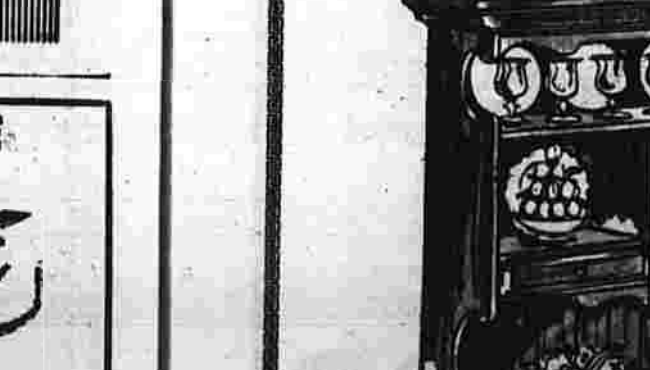

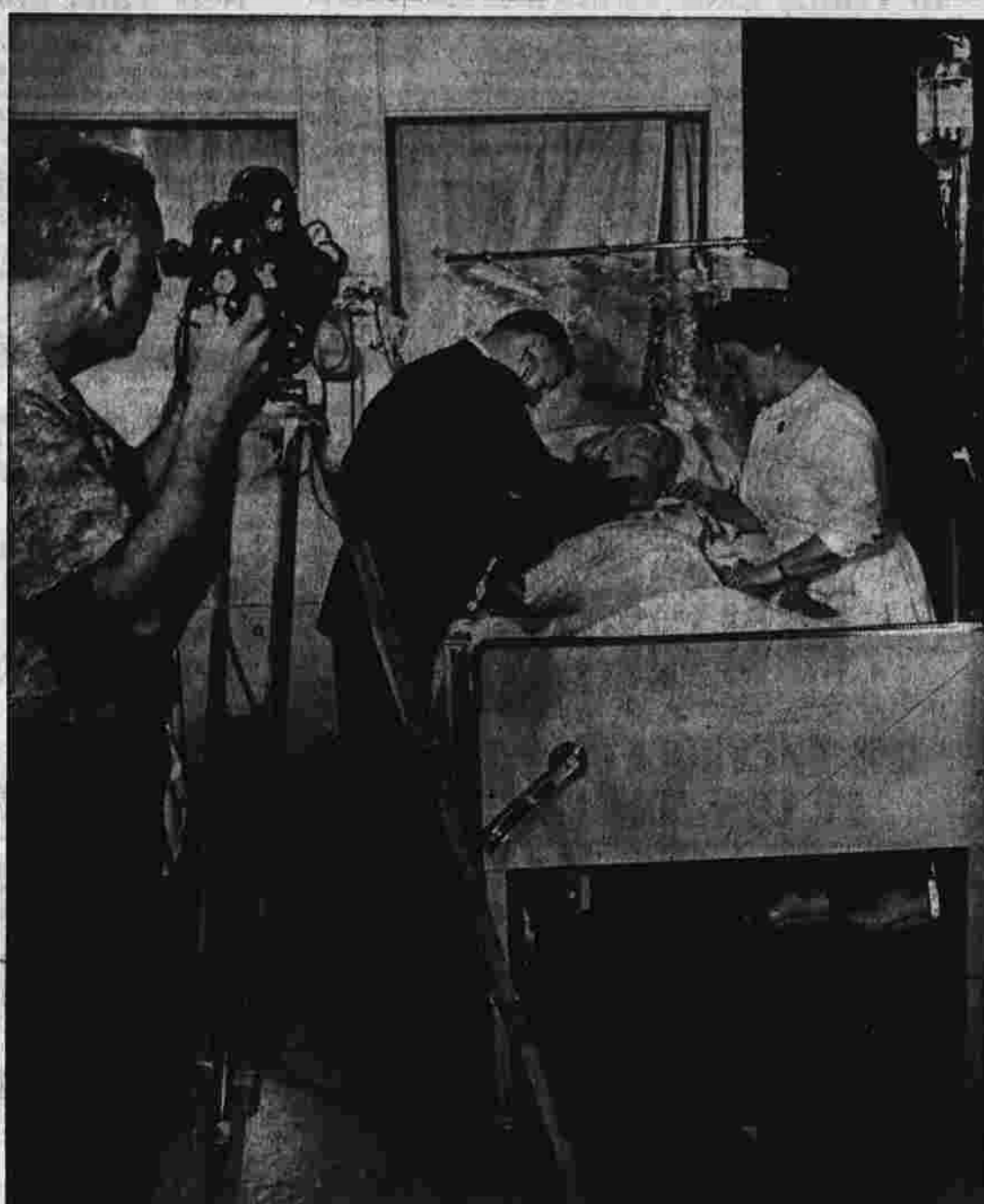

Two Works Programs Presented to Board

Two proposed capital improvement programs were presented to the town's directors at an informal meeting last night to help them map out major improvements in town during the next five years.

Both the general manager and the town planning commission offered improvement schedules, while Superintendent of Schools William Curtis put in a request for an allocation of about \$25,000 from the 1963-64 Capital Improvements Reserve Fund.

The directors had already indirectly acted on any proposed improvements schedule by allocating only \$140,000 to the Reserve Fund from anticipated current revenues, instead of the \$200,000 that General Manager Richard Martin had recommended.

This cut the amount available to the board of education and to the town planning commission from the 1963-64 fiscal year to an estimated \$200,000, including about \$60,000 in the fund.

During the 1963-64 year, projects to be financed from current levies had been estimated by Martin at \$32,000 for town projects and \$73,700 for school projects.

The town planning commission has suggested expenditure of \$47,000 on town projects and \$73,700 on schools.

Curtis requested about \$35,000 of the \$200,000 available, for the school project, and \$17,000 to rewrite the Beasley Lincoln, Manchester Green and Nathan Hale Schools \$15,000 to install a language laboratory at the high school, and \$2,000 to put in new shop exits at the high school.

Republican Director Harold A. Thurlington said that, while he had no objection to financing non-recurring school expenses from the town's capital improvement budget, that "I don't think that there are real capital improvements."
