Rockville-Vernon Fire Destroys Old Grist Mill

Only the charred skeleton of an old grist mill remains today after a fire that started shortly before 1 a.m. today destroyed the structure and its contents on Brooklyn St. The building is owned by the Lavitt family.

The fire was reported from Box 21 at Market and Brooklyn Sts. at 12:59 a.m. and was brought under control within an hour. Seymour E. Lavitt of Box Mountain Rd., Vernon, said today that the building was once an active mill and has been used for grain storage. The windows and doors of the wood structure were boarded up over a year ago, according to Lavitt, but had been broken open since. He said the building was not insured.

The mill was being used for storage of car and farm equipment parts. An old farm tractor was also stored inside. No estimate of the damage was available.

Firemen from the three volunteer fire companies battled to keep the blaze under control. There are buildings on both sides of the mill and houses are located nearby. Police kept back spectators who had left their beds to view the early morning fire. According to one witness, flames spouted over 50 feet high at some points.

New Law Makes It Easier To Transfer Voter Rights

After Aug. 1, a Connecticut voter who has moved into Manchester, and has lived here at least six months, will find it much easier to become a local voter.

Instead of waiting for a scheduled voter making session, and taking a new oath, he need merely to bring a statement from the town clerk, or a registrar of voters, of the town of his former residence, to the effect that he was an elector in that town before moving to Manchester.

He can then apply at the town clerk's office, with proof of six-month residency in Manchester, and the "previous elector" statement, at any time on any day that the town clerk's office is open, and become a voter in Manchester.

Provisions of the new law, Public Act 302, "An Act Concerning the Transfer of Voting Privileges Between Towns," were qualified by Town Clerk Edward Tomkiel.

The Act provides that "any individual who is an elector in any Connecticut town or city in the State of Connecticut, and removes his residence to another town or city in Connecticut, may, after a six-month residence requirement, make application to the town clerk of his new residence town, to become a voter in that new town, at any time, on any day, during regular business hours of the town clerk's office."

The Manchester offices of its town clerk are open from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m., Monday through Friday.

If the applicant wishes, at the time of his application, he may register with the party of his

choice, and his "voting rights will be effective immediately."

The town clerk said that the new statute provides that, "Effective Oct. 1, 1968, voter making sessions for new Connecticut voters will be held during the first week of each month, commencing with October."

According to Tomkiel, the new legislation is a direct result of the passage of the Connecticut Constitutional Amendments, in the state elections of November 1962.

Basically, the purpose of the amendments is to give Connecticut people more of an opportunity to become electors.

Jimmy Dean Readies New Variety Series

His opening day as guest-host of the ABC-TV "Tennessee Ernie Ford Show" (Noontime July 23, and he'll stay on the job through the following Monday, July 29) finds handsome Jimmy Dean living up to a song-cue by sitting on top of the world. And in real life, if ever a young man was, he is. Still on the sunny side of 35, Jimmy's currently reaping royalties from the three million sales of what is considered the all-time big selling recording (his own composition, "Big John"); has made himself an enviable eight-year track record at emceeing as well as singing; and is now at the top-most step of all—a new, hour-long nighttime variety show wearing his name. It bows on ABC Sept. 19.

The 6-foot-3 Dean has the chiseled cheekbones and arresting good looks that might tempt a director

to cast him as a heavy if straight acting were his forte. But aside from two turns (stage versions of "Destry Rides Again" and "No Time for Sergeants") he's not much interested; further, he simply doesn't have the time for acting. And as for playing the heavy, well it would be against his basic nature I found as we got into talking about the upcoming fall program.

I struck against the teasing edge of his humor fast. "Folk music? What's that?"

Though his background is the country field, the new show won't be limited to any particular style of music, dancing or comedy. "And to set your mind at ease, when we do have folk singing, you can be sure it'll be authentic."

"Before I tell you what we're hoping to have, let me tell you what we don't want. We don't want anybody with a star complex." (Seems fair enough since the star himself doesn't have one.) "We want nice people who can work together in harmony. This is going to be a real fun hour."

Proving the point, as it were, is the selection of Karen Morrow as Number One girl on the show. They don't come any nicer. Blonde Karen polished her natural talents by cross country, tours in musical comedy, guest appearances on major TV shows, and just this season dazzled New York critics with her performance in "The Boys From Syracuse." Star... she is, but complex about it, she isn't.

Who'll some of the early guests be? Jimmy, who was juggling the

ever present coffee container and going over plans for the necessary new and larger offices, said, "Well, you can be sure Ernie Ford is going to be invited. He's sure a good ole boy. You know I felt I'd known him for years before we actually met on a Dinah Shore show... It's like that with performers in the country field, though. We're very clamish and there's practically no jealousy."

Jimmy must be the target for a lot of other show biz jealousy, though, with that "Big John" smash of 3,000,000. The gold record attesting to it all furthermore is an "pure" as they come having been issued by the Recording Industry Association of America. What he really prizes, though, is the small gold disc affixed with the letters "C.I.A.A."—that's the one that means the total is not a guesstimate but is based on certified sales. Jimmy thinks, however, that the day of the more-than-million-sellers is past "so many new labels, so many people recording."

We digressed onto recording. "I've done some in New York, the musicians couldn't have cared less. Pretty unpleasant. But I just love to go to Nashville. And it's definitely not just for country music. Lots of pop artists record there, too: Connie Francis, Teresa Brewer, Burl Ives. There are wonderful musicians in Nashville, they're enthusiastic, interested and love to come up with something 'just a little better.'"

Jimmy's mother taught him a "little piano" back home in Plainview, Tex., and he "just picked up accordion and guitar" though he insists "what I play best, though, is the comb." Singing seems to have come naturally.

By a fluke, it was his stint with the air force that led to show business. His career began, inauspiciously enough, toward the end of his three-year service when he was stationed near Washington, D. C. When one member of a trio of his Air Force buddies who performed weeks ends at a nearby night spot got sick, the other too asked Jimmy to bring along his accordion and fill it. The salary? Variable. It consisted of tips split three ways.

Within a couple of months, though, Jimmy's star began its sure rise. The management hired him on salary—as singing emcee.

And after that did he play more night spots? "Heck, let's be more honest. Dives is what they were... fights every night but no TV."

Then a Washington radio-TV station nabbed him as regular, Jimmy married Washington-born Sue Wittaber and they settled down to life in the nation's capitol. From there, around 1954, he wrote and recorded a song which sold 700,000 copies and which he's determined to forget. Because of

bad business arrangements, he made no money on it.

Nowadays Jimmy, Sue and their three children, Garry, 11, Connie, 8 and Robert, 3, live in Tenafly, N.J., which is becoming a sort of "Beverly Hills of the East." Among the neighbors are Tony Bennett, Jerry Vale and Paul Anka.

Now a thoroughly seasoned, magnetic performer, Jimmy is as hard-working as he is easy going. And in addition to his own talents, another powerful force is at work to make a success of "The Jimmy Dean Show." It's Bob Banner as executive producer. Like Midas, everything Banner touches (the early hour-long Dinah Shore show, "The Garry Moore Show") turns to gold.

Yup, that's Jimmy Dean up there, sitting on top of the world.

The ordinary public sometimes gets the wrong idea about jazz musicians. Listen to the experience of Georgia Brown.

"I went to a party with Wally Cox," she says. "He's a love. The hostess found out that I sing jazz. I guess she felt that all jazz musicians are on dope or something. She offered to send out and get some."

"People automatically think that a jazz singer must be a swinger. They assume that my private life is wild. But a jazz singer can be a very normal person. I hate vile language, for example; when I hear it, I freeze inside."

Georgia Brown is the black-haired British better now starring on Broadway in "Oliver!" While there is a difference of opinion about the show, there is none about Miss Brown. She's a solid performer and her singing of "As Long As He Needs Me" is one of the memorable moments of this backluster Broadway season.

She breathes fire into the song, which reflects her feelings about music in general.

"Lyrics are the most important thing to a song," she says. "I've changed them and sometimes taken out lines when I've done certain songs, if I felt that they got in the way of a particular thought."

"Words have an almost sensual appeal," she says. "The sounds made by lips and tongue and teeth are really quite sensual. Noel Coward knows this and knows how to use sounds. Take the opening line of 'Mad About the Boy'—you could almost know what he was talking about even if you didn't understand the language."

Napier co-stars on NBC-TV's "Ben Jerrod" daytime color series as District Attorney Dan Joplin. "I studied for a business career, but I discovered that I didn't like being chained to a desk," Napier explains.
