

A school "should be built for 1964-65; but we can manage until 1965-66," he said. Projected enrollment for the five-year period from 1963-68 was shown based on/present population, and on a 5 per cent growth in the school population. This growth was based on the experience of the previous five-year period. A third tabulation showed the number of classrooms needed annually for each school, based on the larger projected enrollment.

"One fallacy in the projected enrollment is the assumption that (1) there will be an annual increase for each grade of five per crease for each grade of five per cent and (2) that the annual in-crease will be distributed evenly among all schools," Woodmansee

Questions Figures Madden questioned the projected figures as compared to figures the board had used in November 1962. It was explained that the 1962 figures were arrived at on a different basis, based on 200 homes per year. Woodmansee is now using a 5 per cent increase, the proa 5 per cent increase, the pro-iure generally used by school

Although 1964-65 "seems to be a critical year with respect to the need for additional classrooms," Woodmansee said a new school could be postponed to the next year if temporary measures were "It may be necessary to trans-fer some pupils from Wapping School (which is estimated to be two rooms short) to the Avery Street-Orchard Hill school area to relieve overcrowding. An alter-native plan would be to establish

native plan would be to establish to mporary classrooms. Also, Grades 7 and 8 in Pleasant Valley School will need to be housed in the high school.

In making his recommendation to the board for 1965-86, Woodmansee found himself "somewhat stymied" because of the growth in the Pleasant Valley-Avery-Wapping areas. He there-Avery-Wapping areas. He there-fore recommended: (1) that the town build a 24-room elementary school in the north central part of town to house Grades 1 to 8; (2) that Grades 7 and 8 from Pleasant Valley School be transferred to Wapping School; (3) that those pupils in Grades 7 and 8 and living in the area of Farnhan Estates be transferred to the new school; (4) that certain children in either or both Grades 7. dren in either or both Grades and 8 in the Avery Street School be moved to either the Wapping

School or the new school if experience shows that the projecte enrollments as estimated are con Who Would Walk? When asked who in the new ahool area (South Windson Heights) would walk, Woodman-see said this was not as yet deto decide if and where "hazardou conditions" exist. It was said that almost all of the new school area would be within one-half mile of the achool. In order to correct th hazardous conditions, sidewalls would have to be installed, and crossing guards stationed at stra-tegic points. Woodmansee said the Pleasant Valley area "bothers him." Twen-ty rooms are needed in that school




