"I had accumulated so much colored thread that I felt I just had to find a use for it," is how Martin Unden of 85 Summit St. explains getting started on his unique hobby, which he calls "thread painting."

Since starting his hobby, about two years ago, he has made more than 15 pictures. The average size takes about 125 hours to complete, and is made up of about 15,000 hand tied knots on a cloth background. He believes that he is the originator of the art, after doing extensive research trying to find whether or not it had been done before. Helping his wife overcome a physical disability really started Unden doing needlework, which eventually led to his unusual art. About 26 years ago Mrs. Unden became paralyzed. A therapist advised that she exercise her hands by doing crocheting. "She was unable to hold the hook," her husband said, "and I had to try and direct her hands. I became so intrigued with crocheting that before I realized it I was making doilles and table runners." He now has handmade afghans, bedspreads, and even chairs upholstered in crocheting of his original design. He uses crochet thread, accumulated through the years, for his thread paintings.

Forced to retire from his work as painter-contractor when his wife became bedridden, Unden knew he would have to find some outlet for his active hands and creative fingers. "Being confined to home for long periods without something creative to do would have been unbearable," he said.
